

Our by-laws provide that a member who has paid dues to the Lodge for 25 years shall become a Life Member, subject to Life Membership Dues thereafter. A Life Member was unaffiliated for N.P.D. He now wishes to be restored to membership. Is he restored as a Life Member or as a regular member?

The Handbook of Masonic Law (Sect. 649) states that "a Lodge in its by-laws may create life or privilege members. Such a by-law, however, must treat all brothers in the same general category alike, and the privilege when earned must come automatically." The brother in question has attained Life Member status by complying with its provisions, and has acquired a vested right to pay only Life Member dues. Unless the by-laws of the Lodge specifically provide that unaffiliation of a Life Member terminates his Life Membership, the brother retains his vested right to Life Membership, even though he may have been unaffiliated for a number of years.

It should be noted that restoration after unaffiliation is a privilege which the Lodge may or need not grant. If the request is within 5 years from date of unaffiliation, the vote is by majority, by show of hands. If unaffiliated 5 years or more, a unanimous vote by ballot is required.

The brother applying for restoration must pay the amount

owing at the time of unaffiliation (or have it remitted by action of the Lodge.) If the vote is for restoration he is restored as a Life Member, and continues to pay the Life Member dues, effective at unaffiliation (unless modified by the by-laws then in effect.)

If the request is denied by the vote, the money paid which was owing at the time of unaffiliation is not refundable. Dues paid for the current year must be returned, and the brother should be granted a clearance certificate (dimit), making him a non-affiliate. He can then apply for affiliation to any Lodge anywhere.

Q.
My nephew is being raised soon. I have not attended a Lodge meeting since I was raised, and have forgotten all I ever learned, and wouldn't know how to work my way in Can You help me?

It is regrettable the large number of men raised who fail to attend meetings, and the longer they stay away,

the more difficult it is to get back.

You do not state whether it is your own Lodge you wish to attend or another. If it is your own Lodge, the Secretary or an older brother would probably be able to vouch for you. Arrive at the meeting early and make yourself known, and you should have no trouble.

If the meeting is to be in another Lodge in this District, you should prepare yourself. I suggest that you contact your Master or Secretary and arrange with them to meet some brother who will refresh your memory on the few modes of recognition which will help you to identify yourself as a Mason. When you attend the meeting. Be sure to have your dues card with your, which should be no earlier than 1969.

If the meeting should be outside the district and especially if it is outside the state, you will need much more preparation. I suggest that you obtain from the Secretary the Lecture pamphlets for the degrees, and review with a "well informed brother" the Lectures and the secret work. Do a little studying of the pamphlets, and preferably if time permits attend one or more meetings locally. Be sure, again, to have your dues card with you.

If there is no time for any of these, you should at least remember the "mode of recognition" of the Third Degree. If it is not possible to get assistance, I can only suggest that you go for inspiration to the great source of inspiration, the Holy Bible. A good place to begin is with the events in early Biblical history as told in Genesis. You

GANNETT SQUARE CLUB would probably find Chapter 4 very instructive.

One of our members was unaffiliated four years ago. He has paid his indebtedness, and applied for restoration. The Master refuses to accept the request, and has not presented it to the Lodge. Does he have that power?

A.

The Book of Constitutions (Sect. 367) states, "any unaffiliated brother may be restored to membership at any stated communication ... by a majority vote taken by a show of hands, provided the amount due at the time of such unaffiliation shall have been paid." It further provides that if the brother had been unaffiliated for five years or more the vote must be unanimous.

The Handbook of Masonic Law (Sect. 821) quoting a number of Grand Masters' decision, states that the Lodge is bound to act upon a petition for restoration. In 1952, Grand Master Ward Arbury further ruled that "No member of the lodge, even the Master can validly interpose an objection to a vote on a petition for restoration." The Master may appoint an Investigating Committee if he so desires, but its report is informative only, and no discussion on the petition

In the present situation, the Master must put the petition to a vote by show of hands, with a majority vote deciding.

"OPERATION LIFEGUARD...

Civilian ambulance aircraft carrying patients to Shriners Burns Institutes are now classified as priority aircraft nationally in the Air Traffic Control handbook, which the FFA calls its "flight Bible."

The priority name is "Operation Lifeguard," meaning ambulance flights that are rushing critical burns cases to any one of three Shriners Burns Institutes. They are given maximum possible priority in terminal areas when requested, thus saving precious life-or-death minutes from the landing time.

Cincinnati Idea

Developed by Noble Bruce MacMillan, Chief of Staff of the Cincinnati Burns unit, and Wesley Schafer, Chief Controller for the Federal Aviation Administration tower at Lunken Airport, Cincinnati, the plan is now in effect nationally.

Schafer requests Temples to notify their pilots that they must do the following to gain full benefit of the "Operation Lifeguard" priority:

Follow Plan

1—File a VFR flight plan from departure to arrival point.

2—In "remarks" section of flight plan state "Lifeguard Shrine Burn Patient" and ask the flight service station to forward these remarks.

3—In event of mechanical, or other unforseen delay, contact the nearest FSS and forward the revised ETA at airport of arrival.

4—If you must fly IFR because of inclement weather phone collect to the Shriners Burns Institute of arrival and let them know your ETA at arrival airport.

Avoids Delays

The above information enables both the Control Tower and the Shrine Burns unit to arrange to have an ambulance meet the plane, to avoid delays transporting the patient to the hospital.

Lunken Airport and the Cincinnati unit have had the above plan in operation since February, 1964.

Fly 2000 Miles

Flights have arrived in Cincinnati from as far away as 2,000 miles, and 90 per cent have come from cities 50 miles or more away.

Of the 300 cases handled by the Cincinnati unit since 1964, 64 per cent were airlifted; two-thirds were made by air ambulances maintained on a 24-hour standby basis by Shrine Temples, the balance by military aircraft.
