

This meeting was called to order at 7:30 and prayer was offered by Charles Jutsum of



PURPOSE:

The MMN is established for the purpose of providing a means of communication to and among the members of Masonic organizations in Monroe County at the lowest possible cost to those organizations who subscribe. SPONSOR:

The MMN is a function and under the immediate control of the elected Board of Directors of the Masonic Service Bureau, Inc., 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605, to whom the Editor and Business Manager report operating conditions regularly. The MMN is to be self sustaining with no funds available from the Bureau. The Business office is to be located at 153 Monroe Ave., Rochester, New York 14607. The Address files of subscribers are to be located at 875 Main Street East and are used only for mailings of Monroe Masonic News purpose. The Masters & Wardens Association will be the Advisory body.

The Editor, (Presently, W.B. George L. Wetzel) is to be appointed by the Board of Directors of the Bureau and may be replaced at any time by action of the Board. The Business Manager, (Presently, W.B. Emery H. Carey) is charged with the financial condition of the operation as well as production and advertising. Other Staff members may be appointed as needed. PUBLICATION:

The MMN is to be published monthly except July and August and is to be ready for delivery each Month to arrive DEADLINE for submission of articles to be publication. DEADLINE for submission of articles to be published will be ON OR BEFORE the 15th of each month prior to publication. Extension of up to 72 hours may be made by extenuating circumstances and by prior notification to the News Office. Articles should be written according to good literary style and include only news of current value for the month of publication or of future important event dates. Although no maximum space allottment is at present required for each organization, it is suggested to keep articles short and to the point.

Rate cards are available at 153 Monroe Avenue. Advertising obtained by each organization will be credited against subscription charges at 10% of cost of Ad. Advertisers may designate where credit is to be given. Right to deny space is reserved. SUBSCRIPTION:

All Masonic affiliated organizations are eligible to subscribe by total membership at a charge of 50 cents per member as of January 1 each year. Individual subscriptions for 10 issues will be \$1.00. New members added during the year will be added to mailing as soon as reported by Secretary. Widows may continue to receive the MMN if contained in organization subscription. Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, % Masonic Service Bureau, 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605.

Our installation is held at the first Communication in January. This year the first communication falls on January 1st, and we plan to open and close Lodge on that date, and hold installation on January 15th. Some of our Past Masters say that we must install on January 1st. Will you set us straight?

A.

The Book of Constitutions is very clear on the subject: Section 302 states that election of officers shall be held at the last Stated Communication in December, and "installed at or before the next stated communication." The Handbook of Masonic Law (Sect. 910) further clarifies this: "even though such communication falls on a legal holiday."

The the present instance the Ladge should request a

In the present instance the Lodge should request a Dispensation from the Grand Master to hold installation on January 15th, giving as a reason the difficulty of getting not only members but the officers to attend on the legal holiday.

May we suggest, in general, that if the date of the annual communication or the date of installation may at times fall on a legal holiday, the Lodge should amend its by-laws to specify that "if the last Communication in December (or the first communication in January) falls on a legal holiday it shall be omitted." The Lodge may then legally omit the communication in question legally omit the communication in question.

When the Master calls for the report on petitions, and the name of each candidate is read, is it legal for any member to leave the meeting room before balloting begins?

The legality of a Masonic act can be determined only by the Grand Master. All we can do is give our opinion. The Book of Constitutions (Sec. 355) states: "Every member of a Lodge present at any balloting ... must vote." The Handbook of Masonic Law (Sect. 546) adds: "No one can be excused, ask to be excused or state any reason for voting or not voting," and Sect. 1167 states: "Refusal of a brother to cast his ballot...constitutes a Masonic offense."

What is the purpose of these purpose and the second of the s

What is the purpose of these regulations? Isn't it, to prevent a brother from avoiding or circumventing his Masonic responsibility, which is to elect by a unanimous vote of the brethren. When the name of a candidate has been announced, the ballot procedure has actually begun. The remainder is routine prescribed by the ritual. If a brother retires after the announcement, he may be leaving to avoid balloting, or at least the brethren will suspect that this is

Hence, it is my opinion that no brother may leave the Lodgeroom once the names of candidates has been read on which a ballot is to be taken. We, of course, except an emergency where a brother becomes ill.

I am really mad. About a month ago I paid my dues to the Consistory, and received the card for 1970, and now I receive a notice that I am no longer a member because I dropped out of one of my Blue Lodges. I am still a member and have my 1970 dues card from the other Blue Lodge. What right has the Consistory to drop me from membership?

Evidently you have been a member of two Lodges under dual membership, and were dropped by one of the Lodges. This Lodge was then in duty bound to inform all concordant and related Bodies that you had dropped out of your Blue Lodge, since membership in Scottish Rite, York Rite, Grotto, Shrine is contingent upon membership in good standing in a Blue Lodge.

You do not state whether you dimitted from one of the Lodges of which you had been a member, or were un- sure to find something to affiliated. The two cases are different.

The situation is different if you ceased to pay dues in one of the lodges, and were unaffiliated by that lodge. Our Constitutions are clear and specific on this point. "Involuntary loss of membership in any Lodge, shall work loss of membership in all Lodges." (Sect. 349). Hence, if you have been unaffiliated in one lodge, the second lodge must drop your name from the active rolls, and suspend your membership until you take care of your indebtedness to the lodge which unaffiliated you, and secure a dimit or "Clearance certificate." This is true, even though you may have paid your dues for 1970 in the second lodge, and hold a dues card. Upon being notified that you had been unaffiliated by a Blue Lodge, the Concordant and related bodies are required by their Constitutions to drop you from the rolls. drop you from the rolls.

My advice to you is as follows: - If you have dimitted from one lodge, present your "dimit" and dues card from the second lodge to the Secretaries of the Concordant and related bodies, and you will be immediately restored

to membership. If you have been unaffiliated by one of the Lodges, take care of your indebtedness immediately, and secure the "dimit" or "clearance certificate" which you can then present to the coher lodge and to the concordant and related bodies. Otherwise, you will remain off the rolls in the second Blue Lodge, as well as in the other Bodies.







1. When and where was the first Shriners Hospital opened? Shreveport, Louisiana, September 16, 1922.

2. How many hospitals are there today? Twenty, of which seventeen are in the United States, two in Canada, and one in Mexico. Seventeen hospitals provide orthopedic care and three Shriners Burns Institutes provide care for severely burned children. 3. What was the construction of these hospitals? They represent a construction investment of over \$40 million. 4. What is the cost per year to operate them? Approximately \$10 million.

5. How many children are being cured or materially helped annually? Over 5,500. 6. How many children have been hospitalized since the hospitals opened? Over 145,

7. How many children are now on the waiting list for admission and re-admission? Over 2,200.

8. What is the average number of days stay in hospital per patient? Approximately

9. What is the current average cost per patient? Over \$1,400.00 for orthopedic patients.

10. How much has been spent to date for operating expenses? Over \$113 million. 11. Who is eligible for admittance? Children under 15 years of age-regardless of race or religion-who parents or guardians are unable to pay for treatments.


