Dear Brother Herman

Correction: Our dear friend, Dr. Merritt Vaughan, Secretary of Charlotte Lodge, who knows the Book of Constitutions as few brethren do, has called our attention to the inadvertent use of a word, which may lead to misunder-

In our column in the February issue we answered the query of a brother whose Master refuses to accept and present to his Lodge, the request for restoration of a former unaffiliate. In explaining that Masonic law clearly prohibits such action by a Master, we concluded with the statement: "In the present situation, the Master must put the petition to a vote by a show of hands, with a majority vote deciding." In this statement we thoughtlessly used the word 'petition' in its ordinary meaning of "request," ignoring the fact than in Masonry we use the word Petition (usually spelled with a capital P), to denote the special formal application required by our Grand Lodge for Initiation or for Affiliation.

A request for restoration does not require any kind of Petition, but merely a statement, preferably in writing, asking to be restored to membership. A prerequisite is, of course, that the debt owing at the time of unaffiliation is discharged.

I would like to know if Negroes can belong to a Blue Lodge, and why some lodges are prejudiced against them, especially in the South. If I were to bring a Negro (Mason in their Lodge) to any Rochester Lodge, and providing he could pass the entrance exam, would he be allowed to attend the meeting? Also, Masons with whom I work tell me that "white" is included in their petition .. (21 years, God, etc.) in a Lodge in Montana. Is this true.

First, let me state that, unfortunately, prejudice does exist. We encounter prejudice not only against Negroes (Blacks), but against Catholics, against Jews, against Italians, against Puerto Ricans, against Northerners, against Asiatics, etc., etc. It is called, as you probably know, "the dislike of the unlike." We believe there is far less of it today than there was a generation ago. Our own fraternity, particularly in our State, has a minimal of prejudice. For ex., the Shrine Temple in New York City (Mecca Temple) has a Chinese brother as Potentate in 1968, and the same brother was elected by the Supreme Council, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, to receive the 33rd degree at its meeting this fall. But to answer your specific questions:

1. Can Negroes (Blacks) belong to Blue Lodge? There is nothing in the Masonic Law of our Grand Lodge which restricts a Lodge from accepting the petition of any person of whatever race, creed or color. All that our law requires basically, is that he believe in a Supreme Being and in the immortality of the soul, that he is a male (no woman can be a Mason), over 21, not feeble-minded, and "of good character." Once the petition is presented, it is investigated and then subjected to the ballot, which must be clear. Could a black be elected? Alpha Lodge, under the Grand Lodge of New Jersey, consists entirely of Negroes, and one of their number is a Grand Lodge officer. Last week, our Grand Master, Charles F. Gosnell addressed the annual convocation of the Grand Chapter of New York, Royal Arch Masons. In the course of his remarks, he told us that a number of Lodges in Manhattan and Brooklyn have Blacks (Negroes) as members, and also that he has issued a dispensation to organize a new Lodge to a group of Black brethren, most of them members of Alpha Lodge presently residing in New York.

2. Is there prejudice against blacks in the South? Unfortunately, yes. We have even heard of instances where brethren (white) from the North, were refused amittance to a Lodge in the South. I fear it will take quite a while for the Lodges, and even Grand Lodges in the South to overcome their prejudices, but I am sure that the day will come. It is probably also true that there are many lodges in the North, including Lodges in our own Grand Lodge, which would reject by ballot a worthy black applicant. (Remember, it takes only one blackball). 3. Could you bring a Negro (Black) as a visitor to a Lodge in Rochester? If you are referring to a member of Alpha Lodge in New Jersey, or of one of the regular Lodges in Manhattan or Brooklyn, there is no reason why the Master should or would exclude the visitor. But if you are referring to a member of a Prince Hall Lodge (Negro-Freemasony), the answer at the present time, "No, he cannot be received

Under our system of exlusive jurisdiction, only lodges chartered by our Grand Lodge or by a Ground Lodge with which we have fraternal relations (the 49 Grand Lodges in the United States, England, Scotland, Ireland, Canada, etc.). A Prince Hall Lodge is, therefore, legally classified as "clandestine," and hence its members may not visit our Lodges, nor may we visit theirs. May I add that our Grand Lodge now has a committee studying the possibility of declaring Prince Hall Lodges as "legitimate," instead of "clandestine." This would be a first step. In time, it is possible, that inter-visitation will result.
