"The Girl in the Freudian Slip" is two acts of comedy strictly for fun. Sex is the theme, but lighthearted good-taste is the rule! The time of the play is the present, and in the author's words, "If there is any resemblance to persons living or dead, it is because we're all in this thing together."

Dr. Dewey Maughan is a psychiatrist who becomes more than professionally interested in a sexually emanicipated woman patient, Barbara Leonard. He hasn't told her and never intended to, but he makes the mistake of putting his feelings on paper in the form a psycho-drama. When Dewey's seventeen year old daughter, Leslie, finds the manuscript, she thinks it is a play. She shows it to a family friend, Dr. Alex Rice, who shows it to a literary agent, who just happens to be - Barbara Leonard.

Thus the eternal triangle develops. Barbara gives the frightened Dewey a merry chase, aided by Dewey's unsuspecting wife, Paula, and Alex Rice. The hilarious climax to the chase sets the stage for a fast-paced final act that builds to a cresendo quickly and sustains it to the end of the play.

Dewey is further tormented by Mr. Wellman, a kook from the word go, who periodically graces the psychiatrist's couch. The delightfully obnoxious Mr. Wellman seems to to have the Doctor figured out, which is more that can be said for the Doctor's analysis of Mr. Wellman.

The audience is found to find a favorite among these six characters, for they all get their chance to shine, and there are plenty of funny lines to go around.

We have no record of any persons' achieving success in any walk of life without putting his hand to the plow and toiling, as all have had to toil who have been useful and profitable members of society.

We are asked to do only what we can; and by intense industry we may accomplish more with small gifts than many less industrious achieve with greater natural ability.

Our society today seems to put a premium on doing as little as possible. Masons should be the leaven making honest, hard work attractive and interesting.

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, % Masonic Service Bureau, 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605.

A certain Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, in a town near Detroit has a minister who preaches and teaches that Masonry is unchristian. Is this the attitude of the Lutheran Church? Perhaps you would share with us of your wisdom on this question.

You raise an important question. Why are certain religious groups, in this case the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, opposed to Masonry. Rather than make a general statement, I decided to get an official statement, if possible. Unsuccessful in getting information from local ministers of the Missouri Synod, I wrote to Church headquarters at St. Louis, and received a reply from the Executive Secretary of the Lutheran Commission on Fraternal Relations. The following represents the attitude of the Church, as contained in his letter: The Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, maintains that Masonry is a religion, basing their argument upon the fact, so they say, that Masonry has a set of creeds, rites and ceremonies. They emphasize particularly the fact that Masons have a "religious" service to commit the body of a deceased brother. From this premise, they then argue that the "religion" of Freemasonry is "not compatible with Christianity in the Lutheran perspective ... The Lutheran Church believes in an exclusive way of salvation, not by virtue or character, but soley through the blood of Jesus Christ." Freemasonry eliminates any mention of Christ, and refers only to a Supreme Being.

Another reason for opposition to Masonry is "the pro-hibiting of membership to men of the Negro race." Comment - To support the contention that Masonry is a "religion," Rev. Lochhass quotes from Coil's Masonic Encyclopedia which discusses this matter. Coil, quotes the definition of "religion" from the "New Standard Dictionary," as "a belief in an invisible superhuman power (or powers).. on which (or whom) man regards himself as dependent, and to which he thinks himself to some degree responsible. Coil them makes the following statement: Freemasonry certainly requires a belief in the existence of, and man's dependence upon a Supreme Being to whom he is responsible. From this Coil concludes that Masonry is a "mild religion." differing only in degree from other religions.

Ill. Brother Coil is a very eminent Masonic authority. We disagree, however, with Coil's conclusion and with the attitude of the Missouri Synod, which equates Masonry with religion. It is true that the Masonic Lodge places a Bible on its altar and opens its meetings with prayer. But a Masonic Lodge does not meet for the purpose of worshipping God, of uttering praises to His holy name, of singing hymns, of reading from the psalms and from religious writings, and performing rites and ceremonies to religious

Coil and Rev. Lochhaas both refer to the Masonic funeral service in evidence of their position. The Masonic service is usually performed in the evening before Masons and the members of the immediate family of the deceased Brother, and (at least in New York State) represents a desire on the part of Masons to pay the last respects and say farewell to a deceased Brotherh, and extend sympathy to his family.

We have indicated that religion concerns itself with the relationship of man to God. Freemasonry, accepting the Fatherhood of God as a basic principle, leaves to religion the relationship of man to God, and his mode of worship, and concerns itself solely with his services to his fellowman, with brother love, relief of distress, justice, equality,

self restraint, and all those other principles of his relations toward his fellow man, taught in the various degrees. Freemasonry, then, rightly claims (in our judgment) that is "religion," but not a "religion." The best evidence is furnished in the fact that Masonic leaders, and active Masons are usually leaders and active workers in their

particular Churches. In our judgment, there is no reason why a member of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, should feel hesitant about becoming a Mason. He may serve God, and cherish his Theological beliefs in accordance with the tenets and dogmas of his Church, and yet should be comfortable in a fraternal order which is religious, but which is universal in its scope and concept. The so-called Bible Lecture is our ritual expresses the Masonic attitude very clearly: "Adopting no particular creed, forbidding sectarian discussion within its Lodge rooms, encouraging each to be steadfast in the faith of his acceptance, Freemasonry takes all good men by the hand, and leading them to its alters points to the open Bible thereon, and urges upon each that he faithfully direct his steps through life by the Light he there shall find and as he there shall find it." May we add that in such a universal and non-sectarian setting, any reference to "Christ," (the omission of which the Synod deplores), would render it sectarian, and rule out members of non-christian religions. In the Masonic setting, there is nothing to prevent the individual Mason from believing "salvation through the blood of Jesus Christ." and doubtless tens of thousands of Masons hold this belief.

Dr. Lochhaas also makes an important point in the Lutheran attitude that Masonry "prohibits membership to men of the Negro race." This is not true, at least as it relates to Northern states. There is a Lodge in the Grand Lodge of New Jersey composed entirely of Negroes (Blacks). One of them is a member of the Grand Lodge of New Jer-

What the College will try to do is to provide a fraternal forum where Grand and Past Grand Officers, local Presiding Officers and others qualified to consider our Masonic plight, may arrive at solutions agreeable within their jurisdictions. At the same time we wish to recognize and reward outstanding service of York Rite Masonry by the conferral of the Purple Cross and Gold Honor Award.

We recognize that this cannot be done without the approval and cooperation of the Grand Lodge. Actually there is no higher Body than the Lodge. It is the Lodge that can open the door to "Further Light". POLLUTION AND OUR FUTURE

By Noble Hubert H. Humphrey



Conservationist

There is a growing concentration of our people into a few contiguous urban communities. The popluation shift will make available to more people the economic and cultural advantages that only urban life can provide. Yet, it is also likely to limit each man's sense of the living space necessary for healthy personal development. Exposure to the hostile and continuous pressures of urban stress, crowding and social conflict can only upset the psychological balance which most people require for happy and productive lives.

Tragic Example

We now maintain an economy that is rapidly approaching a gross national product of a trillion dollars a year. Yet we have paid for much of this growth in the destruction of our world. We have polluted the air of our cities, poured chemical wastes into our rivers and lakes-to the point of destroying such priceless natural treasures as Lake Erie and the Hudson River. We tolerate the intrusion into our private lives of urban noise, and the congestion that results from sheer, uncontrolled mass. This destruction of our natural heritage, this assault on man's personality-even though much of it has been unintentional — is basically immoral—a tragic example of man's inhumanity to man.

The problem of pollution is basic to our future. For the first time, we may be on the threshold of controlling the most powerlful of all the natural forces, the weather; but at the same time we are failing to control the nature of the air we breath, to protect our food and water from accumulating poisons, or to insure the survival of a natural environment at all.

No Equilibrium

The eradication of social evils requires self-discipline and commitment. And, at the moment, we are quite a ways from a working equilibrium, with self-discipline and commitment in shorter supply

than indignation. Our worth as a nation and as a people—valued in terms that go far beyond material accomplishment — depends upon securing for everyone to the greatest extend possible, not as benefits but as rights, the basic prerequisites of personal development: health, education, and security against misfortune. But we also need something less tangible; a sense of identity and a sense of community.
