Dear Brother Herman

The following is a portion of a question and about the episode in Italy, prepared for the June issue, and interrupted due to my sudden exit to the hospital.

I believe it will supplement the statement of our Grand Master in the September issue.

There is nothing to prevent any organization from calling itself "Masonic". Such an organization is the so-called Masonic body in Italy, called P-2, or to use its full name, "Masonic Lodge, Propaganda Due, Oriental Rite."

A friend Past Master of a Lodge traveling in Europe sent me a clipping from the International Herald Tribune published in Zurich, dated May 22, which gives the following information.

The so-called Masonic Lodge P-2 was organized about 100 years ago, and apparently was never a member of the Grand body, the Grand Orient of Italy. About 5 or 6 years ago it became a secret organization and has been under investigation ever since. The government has now published a list of its members consisting of 935 names, which includes cabinet ministers, legislators, judges, journalists, police officials, party leaders, leading bankers and business men, the officers of a leading financial institution, several present and former generals and about 20 members of the government's police force.

The so-called "Grand Master" of the organization, Signor Licia Gelli, escaped to prevent arrest, but several others have been jailed. About 50 whose names are on the list claim they were not members.

To summarize, P-2 apparently was never an organization consisting of Freemasons. It probably adopted the title "Masonic" which was held in high esteem in Italy despite the opposition by the Church (which is no longer so) as a cloak to conceal its anti-social and anti-government activities.

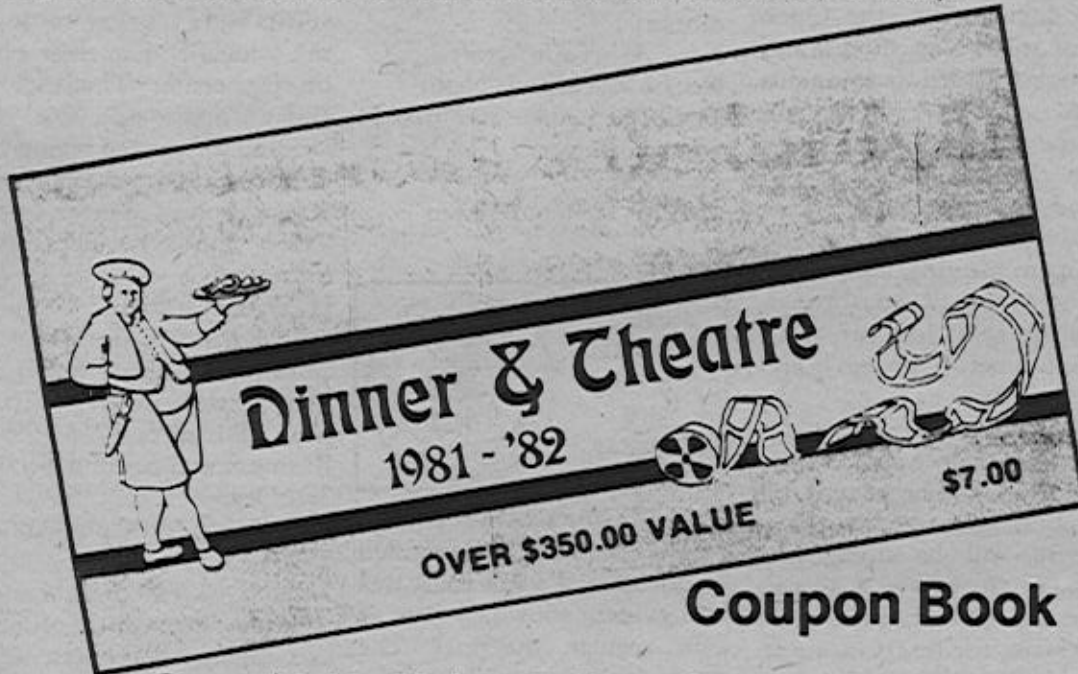

SPEAKING OF MASONRY



October has been a busy month for our Lodge. On October 5 the members enjoyed a panel discussion of the organization and work of the Scottish and York Rite bodies. Your Master acted as moderator, the Scottish Rite side was represented by Brother Lawrence Hood, Illustrious Commander in Chief of Rochester Consistory, and the York Rite responses were ably given by Rt. Wor. Brother Stanley V. Peterson, District Deputy Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons. For the benefit of those members who did not attend, some of the highlights of the presentation are given here:

1. The Scottish Rite apparently got its name from the degrees developed in France about 1600 A.D. by a group of Scottish Masons who had migrated to that country. The York Rite dates back to 926 A.D. when a charter was issued by the English King Athelstan in the city of York as a guide for members of the various crafts to live in harmony and to adhere to those principles which we now recognize as Masonic in nature.

2. While there are four separate Scottish Rite bodies, each with its own set of officers, in practice the four bodies meet together, thus giving name to the term "coordinate bodies". In the York Rite there are three separate and distinct bodies, namely, the Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, the Council of Cryptic Masons, and the Commandery of Knights Templar.

3. The Scottish Rite has 29 degrees covering scenes from the building of King Solomon's Temple up to the present day. The Chapter and Council of the York Rite deal primarily with the building of the Temple, and the Commandery is the Christian branch of the Order.

4. The two Rites donate substantial funds to the research for and treatment of various diseases, including: schizophrenia, respiratory diseases, Parkinson's Disease, and eye surgery and treatment.

5. There are about 30,000 Scottish Rite Masons and the same number of Royal Arch Masons in New York State. The numbers of Council and Commandery members are somewhat smaller.

The Temple Open House on October 11 found officers Porter, Steene, Whitwell, Smith, and Ellender on duty setting up and caring for our exhibit in the first floor lounge. Our exhibit included: aprons and news articles of our first Master, Charles

Baker (1893) and of our Grand Lodge officers since that date, working tools and gavels presented over the years, and news articles describing special events; all of these materials displayed on our beautiful altar cloth bearing the name of the Lodge. Special credit goes to our Secretary, Rt. Wor. Bertram Steens for planning and arranging the exhibit. We were proud to be one of six Blue Lodges having exhibits for this occasion.

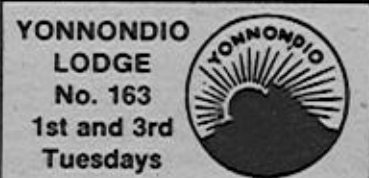

December communications will be held on the 7th and 21st, the latter being our annual meeting and election of officers. At the present writing Chrm. Jim Smith reports that the Brotherhood Fund Drive is off to a good start for the coming year.

I believe it is in order to report that at our last communication, the Lodge voluntarily and unanimously voted to subscribe a substantial amount of money to the TCC fund drive, the interest from which will be used by the TCC Board to operate and make needed renovations as available funds permit. We, as members of Corinthian Temple Lodge, have every right and should feel proud to be a part of this worthwhile project.

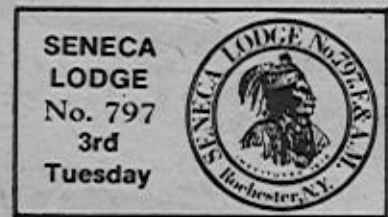

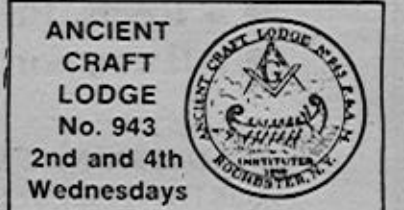
