Most Worshipful Bruce Widger, Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York, has accepted an invitation to visit Damascus Shrine Temple on Wednesday evening October 7, 1981. According to an announcement by Charles R. Frear, Potentate, the Grand Master will be here to help the Shrine celebrate MASTER MASON NIGHT AND HARVEST FESTIVAL.

Damascus Temple is the second oldest Shrine Temple in the Ancient Arabic Order of The Nobles of The Mystic Shrine, commonly known as The Shrine. The Shrine is a North American Masonic organization, founded in the second half of the 19th century, with over 1,000,000 members. The Shrine operates 18 orthopedic hospitals for crippled children and 3 burns institutes in Canada, the United States and Mexico. At these hospitals children up to the age of 18 years are treated without regard to race, sex, religion or relationship to a Shriner.

To become a member of the

Shrine, a man must be a member of a Masonic Lodge, and either the York Rite or the Scottish Rite. Grand Master Widger is a member of Tigris Shrine Temple in Syracuse, New York.

Master Mason Night is an annual membership information and recruitment effort; the Harvest Festival is the Temple's official welcoming of the fall Shrine program and is generously assisted by Roland Orbacker and Sons, Wayne County apple growers and members of Damascus Temple.

The October 7 meeting will be open to all Masons in the Finger lakes region of Western New York. The meeting, at which Grand Master Widger will speak, will be preceded by dinner and a band concert. Reservations for the dinner are required and can be obtained from the Shrine office. The deadline for dinner reservations is **October 2, 1981**, according to J. Rayford Whitley Chairman of this event.

Many organizations use the words "Lodge" and "Grand Master" and "Masonic" without in fact having any legitimate connection with regular Freemasonry. This is true of P.2, and we condemn the misconduct with which it is charged.

We stand on our own principles of non-political, non-sectarian, law-abiding Freemasonry.

New York Masonic BICENTENNIAL 1781-1981

Brethren all:

As I am writing this column, I am thinking about my first Official Visit a few nights ago, and the outstanding co-operation meeting with the leaders of our craft in 1982 held the end of August. Our Grand Master has given us many challenges and programs to cover during the following year. As his Motto for this year is RESPONSIBILITY, I feel responsible to cover them all. So each month in this column I will talk about one of these challenges and programs. It will cover Community Service, Membership, Benevolence and Brotherhood Fund, Fellowship, Look to the Future and our Youth, and Attendance and Ritual.

Being a salesman I have been taught over the years that to be successful one has to take time to analyze and study the goals, then make a workable plan, starting with basics, then on to success. I deeply feel that to get any program going in our Masonic Family we first must get our entire family Co-operating together. Therefore this column will be all about co-operation. I remember well the speech at the last Apron Presentation dinner by our Deputy Grand Master R. W. Ernest Leonardi. He stated that our Masonic Family is like a great Orchestra, and can only make outstanding music when all the instruments are playing in the same Key. Our job therefore in this Monroe District is to get every Mason, and every Masonic organization planning, thinking and working together for common goals. Also to understand each other, and help each other whenever possible.

The first meeting dealing with this venture was held at the end of August in the Shrine Oasis Room. It was heart warming to see almost every branch of our Masonic Family present, and even better with a feeling of cooperation. Many things were discussed, and the following was put into operation. 1st a Calendar of Masonic Events of the Entire Monroe County was started. This Calendar will be displayed on the first floor of the Masonic Temple for 1982. Items can be added to this calendar by dropping them off at the Temple office. All of Masonry should consult this Calendar before planning any large affair in 1982. We know that we cannot prevent duplications, but at least we can keep the entire Family of Masonry knowledgeable of what is going on. This calendar will be published in this Masonic News, and encouraged to be published in other Masonic newspapers. 2nd it is planned for our entire Masonic Family to get behind, and be a part of Masonic affairs that are for every Mason, such as a GRAND BALL OF MASONRY, MASONIC COMMUNION BREAKFAST, MASONIC DAY AT SILVER STADIUM. This means be a part of it, encourage the sale of tickets, and help in any way to make it a success. We dreamed of a future Grand Ball in our Community War Memorial, with 5 to 7,000 people attending, a great Band playing, a world reknown entertainer or speaker, and our entire Masonic family with its leaders attending. What this would do for Masonry only one can guess, but it would be outstanding. Lets look to 1983 for this to come about. 3rd, a form is going to be developed for the entire Masonic family, covering how to get any demited or unaffiliated Mason back into the Masonic family. This will cover from the Symbolic Lodge right up to the Shrine, and will be available in 1982. This should give everyone a chance to get a brother who dropped out of Masonry for whatever reason, to consider coming back. There are many other co-operate programs that can be considered in the future, but the above seemed the best to start with. Everyone there seemed both pleased and enthused, especially the Ladies and Youth organizations. The cooperation the Ladies showed to get this program going was just great.

The BI-CENTENNIAL OPEN HOUSE on October 11 Sunday from 1 to 7 P.M. at the Masonic Temple took up the rest of the evening. This is the only co-operate venture planned for 1981, and it looks like it will be a winner. It is so well covered in this issue I will only urge everyone to not only come to this affair, but please bring along as many friends and neighbors as you can. And if ASKED TO HELP please do so, with a sense of Masonic Cooperation.

In closing let me remind you that October starts the new Brotherhood Fund. Get behind your Lodge Chairman and see to it that in the coming year we get more dollars, and even more important more brothers to contribute to this most important fund.



Also to show a spirit of cooperation I would like to urge those brothers that would like to go on and receive more light in Masonry that the York Rite has a Chapter Festival on October 24th Sat. 12:00 and a Commandery Pilgrimage on Sat. October 31st 12:00. You can receive all the degrees and orders in those two days and become a Knight Templar. Also the Scottish Rite has a Re-union during Nov. 12th, 13th, and 14th. Thursday, Friday and Saturday. During that time all the necessary degrees will be given for one to become a 32nd Degree Mason.

Let's all of us look to the future with a feeling of co-operation.

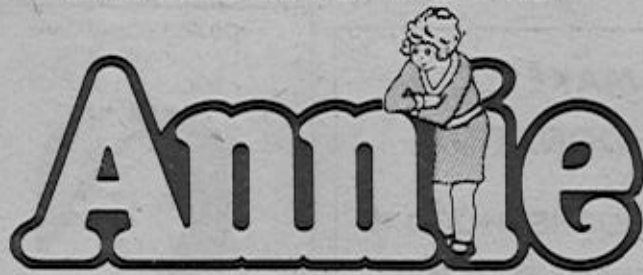

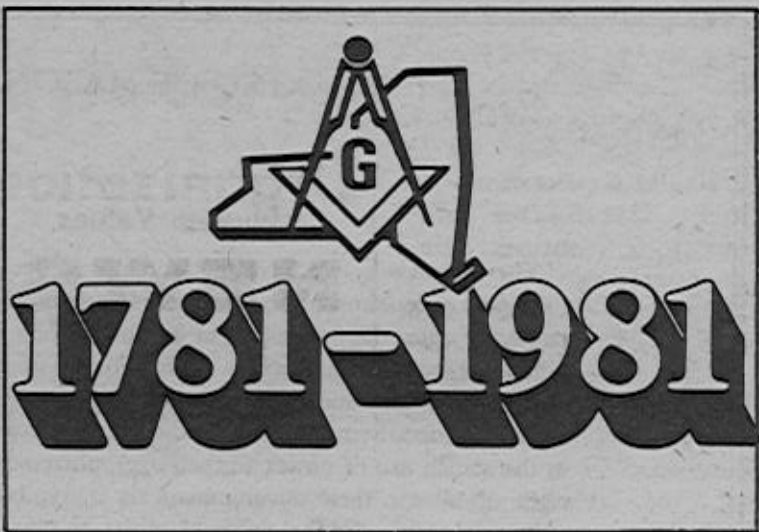

gracious and numeous blessings.

Be proud to proclaim that Freemasonry is a band of men bound together in the bonds of Brotherly Love an Affection that extends throughout the World.
