In 1976 he was appointed District Grand Lecturer of the Monroe District (OES), and he is currently president of the Monroe District Past Grand Officers Association. R. W. Bro. the only grandfather among this year's grand officers. Their younger son, Bryan, is a fireman in Atlanta, Ga. R. W. Bro. Goodridge has worked more than 20 years with the 3M Company at Mt. Read and Ridgeway, where he is general maintenance supervisor. A member of the Spencerport United Methodist Church, he and his wife have worked extensively with the Spencerport Senior Citizens group. He indicates that his interests include woodworking, travel and camping, and he is a member of Genesee Chapter of the National Campers and Travelers. His RV is widely known as the Etolian Lodge bus, transporting his brethren to capture the Traveling Gavel or attend Schools of Ritual. Among other business conducted by this session of Grand Lodge was the adoption of amendments to the Book of Constitutions permitting plural as well as dual membership in lodges, and adding the Shrine to the list of organizations to be recognized to be Masonic.

Perhaps the most exciting business, however, was the election of officers to serve the Grand Lodge for the coming year. To everyone's immense pleasure, but to no one's surprise, M. W. Ernest Leonardi was elected to the exalted office of Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York. R. W. Calvin G. Bond was elected to the office of Deputy Grand Master over three other candidates in a very interesting contest. Other elections of interest include the election of R. W. Frank M. Chupp from Binghamton as Senior Grand Warden, R. W. H. Joseph Heath from Champlain as Junior Grand Warden, R. W. Robert Singer of New York City as Grand Treasurer, and M. W. Wendall K. Walker for his 20th term as Grand Secretary.

Following the conclusion of Grand Lodge, M. W. Leonardi announced the following appointments for the Monroe Districts: R. W. Donald M. McTarnaghan, D.D.G.M. of the 1st Monroe, R. W. Robert C. Pettit, D.D.G.M. for the 2nd Monroe, R. W. Willard L. Goodridge, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and R. W. Dennis A. Livingstone, Grand Steward. These new officers will be invested with the appurtenances of the offices at St. John's Day in Utica on Saturday, June 19th, and will be formally presented with their Grand Lodge aprons at a dinner on Friday evening, October 1.

The immediate past Grand Lodge officers will be feted at a dinner on Friday, June 4th at the Party House on Beehan Road. Plan to attend and salute them for a job well done.

Dear Brother Herman

Dear Brother Herman

QUESTION: This year is the 250th Anniversary of the birth of our distinguished Brother George Washington. What were some of his actual contacts with Masonry?

ANSWER: George Washington was born February 22, 1732. He was initiated in Fredericksburg Lodge, Virginia, on November 5, 1752 at the age of 20. He was passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on March 3, 1753, and raised a Master Mason on August 4, 1753. His last visit to the Lodge was recorded in the minutes on September 1, 1753, shortly before he entered military service.

During the French and Indian War, he visited a military Lodge in Halifax, Nova Scotia. The most cherished possession of the Lodge is the Bible on which George Washington took an obligation or recited the Tiler's oath that he was a Master Mason.

When the lodges in Virginia met in 1777 to form a Grand Lodge, they wished to elect Washington to be Grand Master, but he declined as his duties as commander-in-chief of the continental armies would allow him no time to serve as Grand Master. The minutes of American Union (a military Lodge) during 1779 to 1783 record a number of visits by George Washington.

In 1779 a petition was sent by the Grand Lodge of New Jersey to the Grand Masters of the other Grand Lodges, for the formation of a National Grand Lodge with Washington as National Grand Master. This was not approved, nor were several others in succeeding years. Each Grand Lodge wanted to retain complete independence. In succeeding years other attempts were made without success, the last one in 1862. Today there is a Grand Lodge in each state and in the District of Columbia (except Hawaii) each sole and sovereign within its jurisdiction. Each year, however, the Grand Masters meet to exchange experiences and ideas.

In 1789, when George Washington was sworn in as the first president, General Jacob Morton, Master of St. Johns Lodge (now St. Johns No. 1) who was Marshal of the day, secured the bible from the altar of his Lodge, on which the president took his oath of office, administered by Chancellor Robert R. Livingston, who served as Grand Master from 1784 to 1800. The Bible is the prized possession of St. John's Lodge No. 1, and on it each of its candidates have been obligated to the present day.

In 1788 he was elected Master of Alexandria Lodge No. 39 (Now Alexandria—Washington Lodge No. 22) Alexandria, Virginia, and was reelected in 1789.

On August 22, 1790 he wrote to King David's Lodge, Newport, R.I., "Being persuaded that a just application of the principles on which the Masonic fraternity is founded . . . I shall always be happy to advance the interests of the society and to be considered by them a deserving brother."

In 1791 he wrote to the Grand Lodge of South Carolina, "I recognize with pleasure my relation to the brethren, and shall be happy on every occasion to evince my regard for the Fraternity."

In 1797 he wrote to the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, "My attachment to the society of which we are members will dispose me always to contribute my best endeavors to promote the honor and prosperity of the craft."

In 1799, George Washington, at the age of 67 out in the rain caught cold which developed into a fever. The medical profession at that time believed that fever was caused by "bad blood" which had to be removed, for which they used leeches. As he showed no progress, they repeated the process until he was literally bled to death. He died on December 14, 1799.

George Washington has remained in the minds and hearts of the people of this country as the greatest American, and to the Masons of this country also as their greatest Masonic brother.

W.: Bro. Joe Dimino has been under the weather and we hope that by the time that this is in print he is feeling much better.



METROPOLITAN ROCHESTER POLICE AND FIRE SQUARE CLUB

Dear Brethren;

The term 'living masonically', has many meanings. Primarily it means doing our best to help each other and all Mankind. We have a number of members of the Square Club, who have exemplified themselves by performing deeds that deserve recognition.

On October 1, 1981, while on official business in the Rochester City Hall Complex, Lt. ED BASTIAN was alerted by a staff member that a City Hall employee had just collapsed in an office. Bastian responded to the scene and utilizing training he had received, began Cardiac-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). Upon arrival of the ambulance, he continued CPR all the way to St. Mary's Hospital. The employee died three days later, due to an additional heart attack. Doctors at St. Mary's believe that if it was not for Lt. Bastian's quick assessment of the situation and knowledge of proper CPR techniques, the employee probably would have died while waiting for the ambulance. Lt. Bastian has been awarded the Rochester Police Department's Life Saving Award. He is a member of Craftsman Lodge, Rochester Consistory and is Captain of the Damascus Temple Provost's Unit.

JONATHAN BELDUE is a Fire Investigator for the Rochester Fire Department Arson Squad. In July of 1979, RFD Chief Leonard Heuther approved Jon's request to examine the need for a program to help young people who are involved in arson. Jon's research showed a definite need and a program called Fire Related Youth was set up with Jon as the first full-time investigator to be assigned to work with young people. Since the inception of the program in July 1979, through December 1981, a total of 720 contacts were made. The FRY program is one of only four in the nation of its type. It was featured in an article in the March 1982 edition of FIRE CHIEF MAGAZINE. Last month, another full-time investigator was added due to the rapid growth of the program. Jon is a member of Zetland Lodge and Rochester Consistory.

On August 18, 1981, Sgt. JON EYGABROUT was involved in the largest drug bust in the country. The incident took place at the Monroe County Airport. Three officers were wounded, including Jon who was shot in the stomach. He received the Rochester Police Department's Purple Heart. Due to the cooperation of the many agencies involved and Jon's personal involvement, police were able to seize three million dollars in heroin, just flown in from Lebanon. On January 10, 1982, Jon responded to a burglary-in-progress call at an address where there had been a burglary and a rape a

week previous. Jon took a position in the rear of the address in -15 degree weather and stopped the suspect when he exited the rear and chased him back inside and apprehended him with two other police officers. Jon suffered frostbite due to lengthy outdoor exposure. On January 14, 1982, Jon was called to an address where another burglary had just occurred. Jon began looking around the area and found a set of footprints in the snow. He followed those footprints to another house where he found the suspect hiding. He placed him under arrest. For these two incidents, Eygabrouit was awarded the Excellent Police Service Award from the Rochester Police Department. He is a member of Yonondio Lodge.

GEORGE KIEN is an officer with the Rochester Police Department. Last December, when leaving a restaurant after his lunch break, he noticed a man holding a child aloft. He ran to the scene to see what the problem was. He saw the child was choking and had turned blue. He hit the child on the back a few times and tried mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and hit her on the back again. Kien's actions dislodged some food that was clogging the child's throat. He started Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). The child started to move and was then removed to Genesee Hospital for treatment. For his deed, George Kien received the Rochester Police Department Life Saving Award. George is a member of Flower City Lodge, Rochester Consistory and a member of the Damascus Temple Provost's Unit.

MICHAEL E. POLLOCK is a member of the Rehabilitation Division of the Monroe County Sheriff's Department—Jail Bureau. He was chairperson and an instructor in the seminar, THE LEARNING DISABLED YOUNG ADULT IN THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM, sponsored by the Square Club and the Monroe County Learning Disabilities Association (MCLDA). He was appointed to the Jail Services Task Force by Sheriff Andrew Meloni. After completing its initial research, the Task Force made recommendations concerning a referral system for sentenced minors with learning handicaps housed at the Monroe County Jail. The Jail made its first referral in early May using the Task Force's guidelines. Michael has just been elected to the Board of Directors of the MCLDA. He is currently Vice President and Special Projects Coordinator for the Square Club as well as Editor of the newsletter, THE MONITOR. He is a member of Phoenicia Lodge (Detroit), Rochester Consistory and Damascus Temple.

NORMAN H. SELKE received the Distinguished

Community Service Award for 1982 presented by the Masonic Service Bureau. He is a Past Master of Seneca 797 and served as a District Deputy Grand Master. He was Thrice Potent Master of Rochester Lodge of Perfection, Commander-in-Chief, Rochester Consistory, was Coroneted 33° in 1958. He is currently Treasurer of both the Scottish Rite Bodies of the Valley of Rochester and Damascus Temple and Past Potentate. He is a member of many other concordant masonic bodies. He is a former Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Monroe County, and served a term as a Family Court Judge.

We of the Metropolitan Rochester Police and Fire Square Club can all be very proud to have these persons as brothers in the Club as well as in the Craft.

TEMPLE CIVIC CENTER TRUSTEE NEWS

RUMORS

To begin with, one unfortunate misstatement which shocked the board of trustees was the one which appeared in the May, 1982 Masonic News that "our beautiful Temple is officially up for sale."

This is simply not true!! Several months ago, the board was approached with a proposal by some unnamed persons to acquire an option to purchase the Temple for a price

in the range of \$700,000. After investigation and deliberation, this proposal was rejected.

As mentioned above, WE are approached, and in good faith, we investigated the matter.

Rumors such as this should be verified before they get out of hand, as this one has.

Before anyone gets involved with these stories, please check it out with the proper person. Better yet, write a letter to the Temple Trustees in care of President Walzer or this column, and you will receive an answer.

FACTS

There is one truth which no one seems to like talking about. That truth is that WE

NEED YOUR FINANCIAL SUPPORT.

The trustees have decided that a new heating plant is required, since the heating bills of the range of \$70,000 per annum, and rising, are killing us.

The cost to accomplish this is estimated at \$14,000 and we should save 25 to 40 per cent of our heating bill and recover this cost in four to five years, but we require a means to pay for it.

As you know, there is a Temple Fund Drive to raise funds to renovate the Temple and help maintain it, until we can turn the corner and make our Temple self-sufficient.

We, also, have prophets of doom on our board, just as you out there have them in your

lodges. This is a fact of life, but there are those who feel that we will be successful, and therefore, we keep pitching.

This capital fund drive depends upon one person, and that is YOU.

We cannot personally approach the 7,000 "yous" who are out there. You have to take the initiative and get your help to us.

As this writing, three possibilities are suggested:

1. Loan us some money interest free for ten years.
2. Give us a gift to use as we see fit.
3. Give us the interest on a potential loan.

Remember, it all depends on YOU.

Together, it can be done, but the main ingredient is YOU. **PROBLEMS**

There are some problems in the Temple, mainly due to the increased activity.

Do you remember when there were few problems and very few people and masons frequented the temple?

Now we have lots of activity and more problems, but we are attempting to get them resolved, and, in fact, we feel that we are succeeding.
