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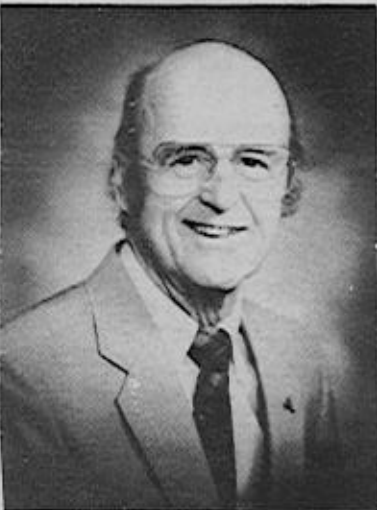

The Masters and Wardens group, under their excellent
leadership and tremendous labor effort, have recently raised
over \$20,000.00 towards the Ronald McDonald local
project, and indications are that these efforts will continue
for at least two years, which is really fantastic and should be
supported.

Question:
Can you please tell me whether or not the Bible should be open on the Altar at a Public Installation?

Answer:
Until a few years ago, the instructions were that the Bible should be placed on the Altar, unopened. In 1982, Grand Master Leonardi issued a directive that the Bible should be opened during a Public Installation, at any undetermined place, and that the Square and Compasses should be placed on the Altar at the right hand side of the Bible, the Compasses unopened. This is now the authorized manner in which the Bible should be displayed at a Public Installation.

In putting this column
together, I realize you
haven't received the February

month. Therefore, the

April dates! Who's on first?

In any event, one date
we're sure of was Saturday,
February 27 - the day of the
Widows Luncheon held at
Logan's. When Past Grand
Master Bond put this idea
into motion he came up
with a winner. This one
event creates so much good
will and happiness it's hard
to imagine. With a year's

Sunday School class at the

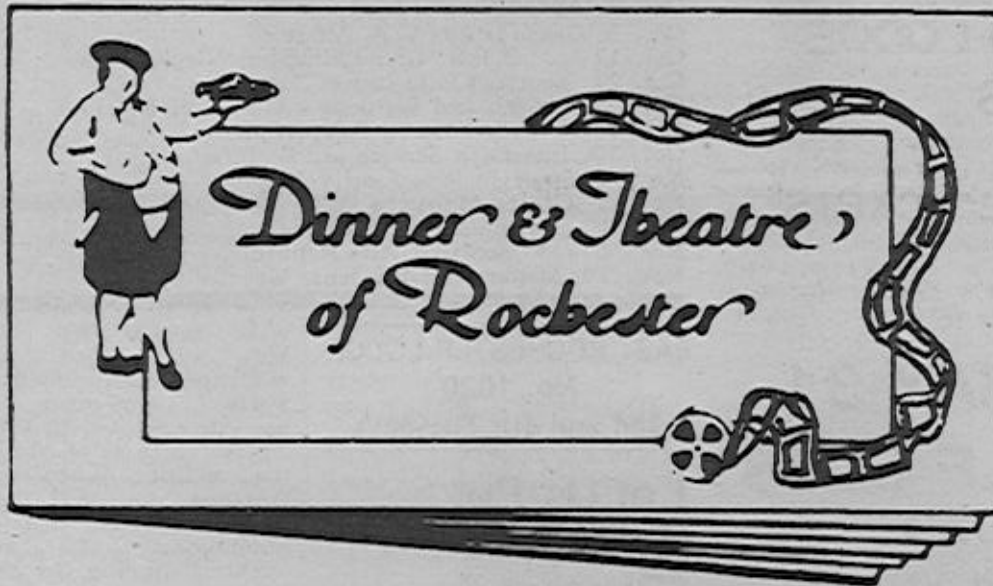
