BLACKSBURG, VIRGINIA --ONE YEAR LATER

Note from F. Jay McCullough:

Dana R. Spencer has been a member of Etolian, then Unity Lodge in Spencerport, for 44 years (Raised January 26, 1944). We communicated a number of years ago when I was Secretary of Etolian. He was trying to establish his genealogical path with Lebbeus Spencer, a Charter Member of the Lodge, and other Spencer families involved in the founding of the community of Spencerport. Dana has been in physical therapy for some time, which is why he was found in his daily exercise routine in the heart of the Virginia Tech and Blacksburg Community when tragedy struck. This is what he had to say as a result of some recent emails between us.

As you remember from a former article, our little community of Blacksburg, VA was shaken by a tragic event last year on the 16th of April that occurred on the Campus of Virginia Tech. Blacksburg is a small town, much like Spencerport, about 45 miles south of Roanoke. Mountains and rugged areas separate us from other communities, and most of these communities are quite small which makes Blacksburg isolated.

Many of our country's best and brightest students and professors, 32 people in all, were murdered in cold blood in this hapless situation where they would not escape this random violence. Among those killed were four professors, one gen-

tlemen being known worldwide for his academic engineering work and also being a survivor of the Holocaust. Among those killed were future military leaders, humanities' instructors, teachers, scientists and a host of above-average students with the only commonality of taking the same classes together. The townspeople went immediately into total shock. The effects not only surrounded us, but also spread out to parents, families, and alumni in remote locations throughout the world.

I had just finished exercise that morning, I think around 10 a.m., and as I was leaving the building, a retired professor came in stating, "There is a madman outside." No one could grasp this, and some ran to the **Hot Numbers**

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TV sets to find out what was happening. As in any situation, the rumors were flying.

I live about three miles from the center of Blacksburg, and I decided to return home to be out of the way of those coming into the community to help. As I was going out the by-pass, three State Trooper automobiles were coming in doing at least 100 miles an hour. My wife and I continued to follow the events by telephone calls to friends, TV/radio, and an emergency scanner. As the world quickly learned, it tallied up to 32 fine individuals who did nothing more than be where they were supposed to be at that time. It was a crazed individual who was in the wrong place at the wrong time.

I can truly say this was one community that pulled together, and while the news media began setting the blame on someone, somehow the community stood fast by its campus police, town and State officers, campus administration and rescue squads. The armchair quarterbacks came out to say we should have done this or that, but this tragedy was a first time experience on a large campus. Everyone appeared to do what was necessary without having prior guidance in such a situation.

Help has come to us from all over the world. My wife was involved in a blanket project to give hand-knitted blankets to all families and survivors plus eventually the medical and rescue people. Square knitted blocks, 8 x 8 inches, came in from around the world, and I heard a count of 10,000 at one time. Volunteers came from all over the State to put them together into blankets. It was an enormous task. This project became therapeutic to individuals in our community as well as around the world-all struggling to make sense of this horrible tragedy. Local religious institutions became involved in counseling individuals because no one could explain why this happened to us. Food and water were provided for students and visitors; and the campus drill field was covered with banners, flowers and sympathy tokens from all over the world. The response was overwhelming, and it continues to this day. President Bush and our Governor Kaine came along with many State representatives too numerous to mention in this report, and legislators are actually trying to make changes that will protect our students in the future. Many of these sugges-



His local community involvement is too numerous for this article. Some of his Board of Directors memberships include: Rochester Convalescent Hospital for Children; Rochester/Monroe County Cancer Council; Rochester Community of Churches; United Way of Greater Rochester; JP Morgan Chase Bank; Boy Scouts of America; YMCA of Rochester; National Association for the Advancement of Colored People; Black Leadership Commission on Aids; Greater Rochester Housing Partnership and others.

Some of Rev. Cherry's awards and recognitions include the Pastoral Mentor Award, Great Lakes Baptist Youth Department Award, National Association of Business and Professional Women's Man of the Year Award, Social Few Club of Rochester Man of the Year Award, PRISM Award (Program to interest students in Science and Math), Action for a Better Black Community Service Award, among others.

Rev. Cherry has been the Pastor of Aenon Baptist Church, since his arrival in Rochester in 1981. He and his church family, together, have received the Urban League Membership Drive of Rochester Award consecutively from 1984 to 1994, for registering the highest number of people in the Urban League of Rochester Membership Drive.

Rev. Cherry and his wife are the parents of four children, ten grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren. Two of his sons are Ministers of the Gospel.

Dr. Alice Holloway Young

Dr. Young is a native of North Carolina, where she was the youngest of seven children nurtured in a Christian family. Her mother was a graduate of Hampton Institute, Hampton Virginia. Dr. Young says: "As a child, I learned the dignity of hard work and the pride in achievement. I also learned to love the soil, the beauty of nature and farm animals, which were our pets. The love of books, the joy of learning and the value of an education were instilled in us by my parents. They also taught us to love and respect people, value friendship, share and to continuously be thankful for life's many blessings."

She earned a BS Degree from Bennett College for Women, in Greensboro, NC, a M.Ed. and an Ed.D. in Educational Administration and Supervision from the University of Rochester. She is retired from the position of Supervising Director of Elementary Instruction at the Rochester City School District.

Dr. Young's educational experiences are wide ranging, from the establishment and administration of a nursery school in an Upstate New York migrant camp, to one of the first five African American teachers, the first African American Vice Principal, and the first African American elementary school Principal in the Rochester School District. She was placed on a two-year special assignment as the first Administrator of Title I, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 for the Rochester City School District; school integration was one of the programs included in this assignment. She was named Administrative Director of Elementary Schools, the first African American City School District Central Office Administrator.

We therefore had to rearrange the florist shop's loading dock and basement access (new stairs), cut out the first floor area and reconstruct it to grade in the elevator access and installation. We also wanted an electronic controlled sliding door entry and a heated sidewalk, covered with a new portico roof.

We wanted that same electronic entry to provide safety and security systems with fob entry and controls, so we had a record of who entered the building, covered with a computerized sentry and fire alarm system and a call service, should the elevator break down with passengers inside. This dream is complete!

Our Lodge Treasurer and Temple Commission Chairman, Thomas Michielsen, volunteered to become our General Contractor or Clerk of the Works. After bidding and cost analysis, we selected Mark Robinson of MDR Construction, who with his sub-contracting partners and Victory Lifts, has given us our beautiful new facility. It takes about forty seconds to go between ground and second floor in such a smooth, gentle and quiet motion that you question if it is moving until the bell rings and the door opens at your departure point.

The lift can safely hold 1200pound loads - it was tested at 1400-pounds for safety rating. It comfortably holds four grown men and will hold one person in a wheel chair with an aide.

If any of our Masonic Family wants a test ride, call me at 621-5282 and I will arrange a mutually agreeable time for a visit. We still have some finishing touches to go, including new front door electronic access.

The second floor contains our primary kitchen, a large great room open for banquets, dances, parties, etc., mens' and ladies' restrooms, our Lodge room, which is air conditioned, two preparation rooms and an entry room. The third floor houses our recreation room with a large screen television and comfortable seating, pool table, ping pong table and two offices, plus an unused kitchen area whose appliances have been removed. It still has three and 17 steps to reach and is thus not yet handicapped accessible.

This large elevator project became too expensive and was shelved. While in a funk over our failure, several Brothers, including Don Darrohn and Jay McCullough, suggested we consider a LULA (limited use, limited access) device, such as the White Church in town has, to go from the 1st floor to the 2nd. As this proposal was seriously studied for installation in our existing building in the Southwest corner, we discovered that to have handicapped access we would need a 46-foot ramp to reach the 1st floor level, which is four steps above grade.

Assisting me with the program were: Joe Privitera, Chairman of Trustees who served as the Master of Ceremonies; our Treasurer, Tom Michielsen, who contacted local officials and other dignitaries; Senior Warden John Jamele, and his wife, Helga, provided the refreshments; and Beverly Murray, of Starlight Chapter and the Caldron, provided musical accompaniment.

One of our Brothers, Reverend Albert (Bill) Kyler officiated as our Chaplain and provided a special blessing for our new facility. Speeches from our Worshipful Master, Donald Hunter, and District Deputy, Gary Sanford, bespoke the joy we hope this facility will bring to our infirmed and handicapped Brethren as it returns their ability to attend Lodge.

Congratulatory remarks were forthcoming from Ms. Gay Lenhard, Supervisor of the Town of Ogden; Deputy Mayor Theodore Rauber of Spencerport; Ogden Police Chief Douglas Nordquist and Tom Friedo, Spencerport Fire Commissioner. All expressed the view that the elevator was an uplifting asset for the Lodge and the Community at large.

Also present was Phil Hurwitz of ERAC Lodge. He was our Attorney for the sale of the building and property in Charlotte, which provided the funding for the elevator. He came to congratulate us on achie ing our dream. Charles Waterstreet of Craftsman Robertson Lodge and Executive Director of the Masonic Service Bureau, came to document the elevator and the day's events for the Masonic Times newspaper.

Also participating in the festivities were our Lodge Secretary, David Jones, and my wife, Emily Grape.

Seven Sisters from Starlight Chapter, OES, came out to support and congratulate us for fulfilling our promise of an elevator to them and all other Masonic Bodies who sublet the use of our facilities, which include Etolian Chapter, Rochester Chapter and Lalla Rookh Caldron. Thanks to Worthy Matron Christine Hampton; Associate Matron Sharon Listman; Trustee, Barbara Bossert; Secretary, Ramona Dimino; Flag Bearer, Betty Rainey; Organist, Beverly Murray; and Joan Palmer. We also thank Brother Dave Rainey of Unity and Sentinel of Starlight Chapter. Brother David Fairley of Unity Lodge, who has been ill, also came out to help us celebrate.



For Life's Transitions



Many of us will be going to New York in May for the Annual Grand Lodge Communication.

I thought it might be interesting to use my space to write about a Masonic connection that stands in Central Park. We all know what an obelisk is. There is one standing in Central Park that has a long and interesting history. The following is gleaned from a course called "The History of Ancient Egypt" by Bob Brier of Long Island University and The Teaching Company.

Obelisks are a purely Egyptian invention with a religious significance. Sun temples highlighted obelisks and every one had a pyramidian on its top. Quarrying and erecting an obelisk is considered a greater feat than building a Pyramid. They were quarried from Pink Aswan Granite and transported down the Nile on barges to their destination. Some were as tall as 90 feet and weighed as much as 1000 tons (two Jumbo Jets). They were erected in Heliopolis ("On" from the Bible), Karnack, and Luxor Ramesis erected many small ones on the Delta. (Some of these date to the 17th century B.C.) The Romans had a great fascination with obelisks and moved 13 of them to Rome for their Circuses where they would race chariots around them. In 10 B.C. Augustus moved two from Heliopolis to Alexandria and erected them in front of the Cesarean Temple. They became known as Cleopatra's Needles.

When Napoleon invaded Egypt in 1798, he brought scholars, artists, craftsmen and archeologists to study Egypt. The discovery of the Rosetta stone and subsequent translation of hieroglyphics by Champollion piqued the world's interest in "things Egyptian." The Alexandria Obelisks were given to France by Mohamet Ali, but Chompollian counseled to get one from Luxor, as it had no cracks. It was erected in Paris in 1832. An earthquake toppled one of the Alexandria Obelisks in 1301.

Wayman Dixon built a caisson shaped like a huge cigar tube, sealed the Obelisk in it and towed it to London. On the way a storm killed six men and the tube floated away. It was found by another ship. After much wrangling, a finders fee was paid and the obelisk was retrieved and safely erected on the Thames.

In 1880 William Vanderbilt, not to be outdone, hired a Navy Lieutenant, Henry H. Gorringe, to remove the remaining Obelisk from Alexandria. These structures are not ordinarily fascined. They rely on gravity to stand on a pedestal. (You engineers might contemplate the craftsmanship involved for these structures to stand on their own for hundreds of years). However, this structure had been damaged when the Romans moved it, so they made four bronze crabs to anchor it to the pedestal. When Gorringe lifted the structure and ancient trowel and plum bob were found in the base, and the Masons adopted this Obelisk as their monument. The powers that be in Alexandria wanted compensation to move the obelisk through the city, so Gorringe contrived a way to roll it out to sea on cannonballs and then floated it around the city to port. The Steamer "Desung" (without valid registration papers) was opened up and the obelisk was inserted inside the vessel. The ship was sailed by a Hungarian crew who proved to be alcoholic. But they were the only available crew who knew how to operate the "Desung." Nevertheless, they set sail and arrived at Staten Island safe and sound. They then sailed to the East side of New York where they were turned away. They then sailed around the city and landed at 96th Street from the Hudson River. A special railroad was built, and for 112 days the obelisk moved through the city streets, at a rate of one block a day. The pedestal (which weighed 50 tons) was the largest object moved on wheels up to that time.

On January 22, 1881, the obelisk was erected in Central Park with 9000 Masons present. The Grand Master made a speech, and placed "proof coins" in the pedestal along with "a small box whose contents were known only to Mr. William Henry Hurlbert." (The Teaching Company, pgs. 19-21 outline). If you get to Central Park and see this monument you will know that you have heard the rest of the story. Thank you.

Investiture



Maybe the example of the Roman Legion is the model we need to follow. New Legionnaires spent six months in PT, sword play, javelin throwing, and use of the shield. They were then placed in the last row of

The bravest and most experienced men were in the front line of battle and fought like lions for three minutes when they slipped to the deepest rear rank and each man moved forward a rank to fight for another three minutes, giving a man a "blow" for a theoretical three hours. Of course death and wounds decreased that three hours down to probably half that time.

They knew they could not maintain their most valiantly trained fighters in the front line fray over the long haul without their experiencing burnout or permanent loss of their services. We need to be recruiting new replacements to take the place of exhausted warriors. Not doing so, including the training, will result in the loss or extermination of the Legion.





While attending the Perry meeting in February, I had the pleasure of talking to Noble Jerry Cooper. He related the following story. He learned of a child, Blayke Hoffman, who was diagnosed with Sturge Weber Syndrome at three weeks old. He was also born with Congenital Glaucoma in his left eye and a very large Port Wine Stain from the top of his left upper eyelid back to the top of his head. The family soon learned that the surgery needed to correct the stain was cosmetic and would not be covered by insurance.

The Hoffmans were in no position to afford the necessary treatment. They learned about Shriners Hospitals from a good friend, who put them in touch with Jerry Cooper. Blayke would need 10-15 Laser Surgeries, which began in February. The family was welcomed with open arms at the Boston Hospital, which they were thrilled about. The family needs assistance with expenses for lodging while Blayke is being treated. Again, Jerry came to the rescue. He set up a fund drive to assist the family with the cost of the hotel room. Since Jerry is a member of the Perry Shrine Club, it was suggested that anyone who would like to assist the family could make donations to Perry in the Name of Blayke Hoffman.

This example more than illustrates what we are all about. So often time is wasted on negative issues. We have so many dedicated members in this organization it is impossible to name them all. They have and will continue to have a positive outlook about who and what we are all about. OUR CHILDREN, pure and simple. The negative aspects only detract from our core values. - Many of the schools can't stay for the full performance because of distance and the fact they have to stay on schedule to have kids home—That's tough on the kids because they don't want to leave
- The extra revenues are minimal, if any, and didn't offset the cost of the extra show
- Kids do NOT wander around to buy food and novelties
- If those same kids talk their parents into coming the dollars spent would be much greater
- Because there is only an evening show on Friday, we won't have to pay to feed our own people

Bottom line — the expense and issue's don't justify the income. That brings us back to the Mission.



At the January 26th, Webster Lodge blood drive, 55 donors appeared and 46 units of blood were collected. Peter Bowers was the Chairman.



Get Your Fob Here!



One hundred years ago, in 1908, the only Knight of the old F.D.C. who became Grand Monarch of the Supreme Council was J. F. McGregory. On January 1, 1908, Mokanna Grotto's Membership was 284, while Lalla Rookh Grotto's was 965.

Moving ahead twenty years, Guy R. Hunter was Monarch, continuing to a time of the Great Depression, but highlighting the good times of our Grotto's entertainment. A very successful Ladies Night was held on April 4, 1928 at the Powers Hall. Entertainment was provided, followed by dancing.

July, 1928, was the Annual Picnic and excursion to Coburg,

Ontario, Canada, aboard the S.S. Ontario II. Five hundred Prophets and their friends and families went on the trip. Prophet F. Matrice Grishemere, chairman said " The day was a very successful one in every way, including delightful weather conditions.

Monarch

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On the afternoon of July 17, 1929, the annual outing was held at Manitou Beach State Park. It was a perfect day with a very good attendance. A program of sports in the afternoon, followed by dancing in the evening.

On July 26, 1929, Monarch George H. Schnider, continued the trips to Coburg. A resolution passed empowering the Grotto to receive petitions, ballot on the same and initiate Candidates on the boat.

The meeting on October 23, 1929, had an attendance of 154, followed by an elaborate lunch served to the Prophets.

April 30, 1930, 200 attended the Annual Grotto's Ladies Night. There was a short form ceremonial for four candidates, after which, for the first time ever, a nominal fee was charged for those in attendance.

July 22, 1930. Monarch French lead the charge to the car ferry, S.S. Ontario II. An orchestra played for dancing, both going and returning trips. A program of sports was enjoyed both on the boat and on the stay at

March 25, 1931 - Ladies Night followed the Grotto meeting. Prophets joined the Ladies in the basement dining room. Entertainment was provided, followed by dancing and serving of refreshments to a very large number in attendance.

Saturday afternoon, July 25, 1931, it was a family basket picnic at Corbett's Glen, off Linden Ave. Lots of sports and refreshments by the Grotto.

Through the years there were also outings at Willow Point Park, Seabreeze, Charlotte and Manitou Beach Park. Families brought their own lunch, the Grotto provided Dixie cups, suckers and orangeade.

During the time of the Great Depression our Grotto tried to keep our membership together. Not all changes are for the best. Time has not been kind to the Grotto - the lessons learned are simple ones; time is short - photographs can fade, names forgotten, time passes quickly.x



Sickness and Distress



Knights Templar Garments

As recent general orders from our Grand Commander have made allowances to the official uniform of Knights Templar in the State of New York, I felt a short talk on the garments worn by our medieval Brethren would Lady Shirley Wells in your Deinteresting. This talk is based upon the article found at Templar History.com.

The original Latin Rule of the Templars lays out in detail what the members of the Order were permitted to wear. These garments were distributed by the Order's Draper. The biggest distinction between Knights and Sergeants, who made up the Order, was the color of their mantle. The Knights wore a white mantle, while Sergeants wore a black one. After 1143, the Templars were permitted to add a red cross to their habits.

The following excerpt from the original Latin Rule translated by Judith Upton-Ward, provides some additional insight into the dress of the Templars.

On the Brothers' Dress

We command that all the Brothers' habits should always be of one color; that is white or black or brown. And we grant to all Knight Brothers in Winter and in Summer, if possible, white cloaks; and no one who does not belong to the aforementioned Knights of Christ is allowed to have a white cloak, so that those who have abandoned the life of darkness will recognize each other as being reconciled to their creator by the sign of the white habits: which signifies purity and complete chastity.

Chastity is certitude of heart and healthiness of body. For if any Brother does not take the vow of chastity he cannot come to eternal rest nor see God, by promise of the apostle who said: "Pacem sctamini cum omnibus et castimoniam sine qua nemo Deum videbit." That is to say: Strive to bring peace to all, keep chaste, without which noone can see God."

But those robes should be without any finery and without any show of pride. And so we ordain that no Brother will have a piece of fur on his clothes, nor anything else which belongs to the usages of the body, not even a blanket unless it is lamb's wool or sheep's wool. We command all to have the same, so that each can dress and undress, and put on and take off his boots easily. And the Draper, or the one in his place, should studiously reflect and take care to have the reward of God in all the above mentioned things, so that the eyes of the envious and evil-tongued cannot observe that the robes are too long or too short; but he should distribute them so that they fit those who must wear them, according to the size of each one.

If any Brother out of a feeling of pride or arrogance wishes to have as his due a better and finer habit, let him be given the worst. Those who receive new robes must immediately return the old ones, to be given to the squires and sergeants and often to the poor, according to what seems good to the one who holds that office.

Shirts

Among the other things, we mercifully rule that, because of the great intensity of the heat which exists in the East, from Easter to All Saints, through compassion and in no way as a right, a linen shirt shall be given to any Brother who wishes to wear it.

Bed Linen

We command by common consent that each man shall have clothes and bed linen according to the discretion of the Master. It is our intention that apart from the mattress, one bolster and one blanket should be sufficient for each; and he who lacks one of these may have a rug, and he may use a linen blanket at all times, that is to say with a soft pile. And they will at all times sleep dressed in a shirt and breeches and shoes and a belt, and where they sleep shall be lit until morning.

Pointed shoes & shoelaces

We prohibit pointed shoes and shoelaces and forbid any Brother to wear them; nor do we permit them to those who serve the house for a fixed term; rather we forbid them to have shoes with points or laces under any circumstances. For it is manifest and well known that these abominable things belong to pagans. Nor should they wear their hair or their habits too long. For those who serve the sovereign creator must of necessity be born within and without through the promise of God himself who said: "Estote mundi quia ego mundus sum." That is to say: "Be born as I am born."

Wow! OK our ancient Brethren of the Knights Templar had some tough rules when it came to their uniform and what they could and could not wear. So, as Knights Templar of today, strive to uphold the dignity, military nature and uniformity of the Order by securing appropriate attire. Your Commandery can help with low cost/no cost elements of the uniform. Just inquire.

axes! Taxes! By Tom Michielsen

It's April, and you're once again burning the midnight oil, poring over stacks of paperwork or small pieces of paper with little or no explanation on them, trying to file your income tax return on time. If you're rushing to complete your return, you may be making costly mathematical errors, overlooking important deductions or missing tax credits you might qualify for. Yes, you might be one of those people in the TV ads who overpay their taxes each year. Why are we so stupid to subject ourselves to this torture year after year? Each year we tell ourselves and our spouses that next year will be different but we do nothing to make our lives easier. Taxpayers nationwide will have until Tuesday, April 15th, 2008, to file their 2007 returns and pay any taxes due.

The Internal Revenue Service is looking for 115,478 taxpayers who are due refund checks on their 2006 tax returns worth about \$110 million after the checks were returned as undeliverable. Are you one of them?

The IRS issued the 2008 optional standard mileage rates used for calculating the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business, charitable, medical, or moving purposes. Beginning January 1, 2008, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (including vans, pickups, or panel trucks) will be 50.5 cents per mile for business miles driven; 19 cents per mile driven for medical or moving purposes; and 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations.

While most people are aware they must include wages, salaries, interest, dividends, tips and commissions as income on their tax returns, many don't realize that they must also report most other income, such as cash earned from side jobs, barter exchanges of goods or services, awards, prizes, contest winnings and gambling proceeds.

Taxpayers must report all income from any source and any country unless it is explicitly exempt under the U.S. tax code. There may be taxable income from certain transactions, even if no money changes hands.

Generally, the IRS considers all income received in the form of money, property or services to be taxable income unless the law specifically provides an exemption. It is a common misconception that if a taxpayer does not receive a Form 1099-MISC or if the income is under \$600 per payer, the income is not taxable. There is no minimum amount that a taxpayer may exclude from gross income.

All income earned through the taxpayer's business, as an independent contractor or from informal side jobs is self-employment income, which is fully taxable and must be reported on Form 1040. Use Form 1040, Schedule C, Profit or Loss from Business, or Form 1040, Schedule C-EZ, Net Profit from Business (Sole Proprietorship) to report income and expenses. Taxpayers will also need to prepare Form 1040 Schedule SE for self-employment taxes if the net profit exceeds \$400 for a year. Do not report this income on Form 1040 Line 21 as Other Income.

Independent contractors must report all income as taxable, even if it is less than \$600. Even if the client does not issue a Form 1099-MISC, the income, whatever the amount, is still reportable by the taxpayer.

Fees received for babysitting, housecleaning and lawn cutting are all examples of taxable income, even if each client paid less than \$600 for the year.

Someone who repairs computers in his or her spare time needs to report all monies earned as self-employment income even if no one person paid more than \$600 for repairs.

Bartering is an exchange of property or services. The fair market value of goods and services exchanged is fully taxable and must be included on Form 1040 in the income of both parties.

An example of bartering is a plumber doing repair work for a dentist in exchange for dental services Income from hartering is taxable in the year in which the taxpayer received the goods or services.

Gambling winnings are fully taxable and must be reported on Form 1040. Gambling income includes, among other things, winnings from lotteries, raffles, horse races, poker tournaments and casinos. It includes cash winnings, as well as the fair market value of prizes, such as cars and trips.

Even if a W-2G is not issued, all gambling winnings must be reported as taxable income regardless of whether any portion is subject to withholding. In addition, taxpayers may be required to pay an estimated tax on the gambling winnings.

Losses may be deducted only

if the taxpayer itemizes deductions and only if he or she also has gambling winnings. The losses deducted may not be more than the gambling income reported on the return.

Subject to certain exceptions, the cash value of prizes or awards won in a drawing, quiz show, beauty contest, or other event, must be included on the tax return as taxable income.

Taxpayers must also report the fair market value of merchandise or products won as a prize or award, as taxable income.

For example, both a \$500 cash prize and the fair market value of a new range won in a baking contest must be reported as other income on Form 1040, Line 21.
