

Yesterday's Purpose

How long has the Service Bureau existed? Why was it established? Have you ever pondered these questions?

Masonic charitable activity has been carried out in an organized fashion by a consortium of Masonic Lodges in Rochester since 1810. Among the early Lodges was Morning Star Lodge No. 223 of Pittsford. Activities we associate with "the Bureau" paralleled the establishment of Wells Lodge No. 282, which was Chartered June 5, 1817, along with other early Lodges who came to be known as The Masonic Charities Organization. That became known as the Masonic Employment Bureau in 1916. The title Masonic Service Bureau was adopted in June of 1919, when the first Constitution and By-Laws were officially adopted. A Certificate of Incorporation was sought in April, 1927, for the Masonic Service Bureau of Rochester, NY Inc. Official status was granted by the Supreme Court of the State of New York, 7th Judicial District on June 29, 1927.

The purposes identified in the original application, I believe, are important to reflect upon! They are:

 To help, aid and assist destitute, ill or needy members of the Masonic Fraternity and adult members of their families.

· To procure employment or change of employment when necessary for persons above mentioned and to assist them in bettering their economic condition.

· To look after the social and moral welfare, temporarily or permanently, of such persons as seek assistance from the corporation or such persons as are

The Social Security Administration has announced the maximum amount individuals can earn before their Social Security Benefits are reduced. Beginning January 2008, individuals who are under full retirement age can earn \$13,560 per year (\$1,130/month). One dollar in benefits will be withheld for every \$2 in earnings above the limit.

The Internal Revenue Service has released a new Form 8917, Tuition and Fees Deduction, which is to be used by taxpayers who deduct qualified education expenses paid to an eligible post-secondary educational institution in 2007. Using the new form allows taxpayers who file Form 1040A to claim the deduction. Taxpayers filing Form 1040 enter the deduction on bined rate for Social Security Line 34. Taxpayers filing Form

1040A enter the deduction on Line 19.

Low- and moderate-income workers can take steps to save for retirement and earn a special tax credit in 2007 and the years ahead. The saver's credit helps offset part of the first \$2,000 workers voluntarily contribute to IRAs, 401(k) plans and similar workplace retirement programs. Formally known as the retirement savings contributions credit, the saver's credit is available in addition to any other tax savings that apply.

Ways to Jump Start Taxes

Earlier is better when it comes to working on your taxes whether you do them yourself or have a tax practitioner prepare them. Taxpayers are encouraged to get a head start on tax preparation, especially since early filers avoid the last-minute rush and get their refunds sooner.

Here are some easy ways to get a good jump on your taxes long before the April deadline:

2. Take your time. Don't forget to leave room for a coffee break when filling out your tax return as rushing can mean making a mistake.

3. Double-check your math and verify all Social Security numbers. These are among the most common errors found on tax returns. Taking care will reduce your chance of hearing from the IRS and speed up your refund.

4. E-filing is easy. E-filing catches math errors and provides confirmation your return has been received and gives you a faster refund.

5. Get the fastest refund. When you e-file file early, you receive your refund faster. When you choose direct deposit, you receive your refund sooner than waiting for a check.

6. Don't panic. If you have a problem or a question, remember the IRS is there to help. Try the IRS Website at IRS.gov or 1. Gather your records in ad- call the IRS customer service

7. Are you concerned that your efforts to get ready early may be affected by the Alternative Minimum Tax legislation passed by Congress in December? Most individuals will not be impacted, so it is still a good idea to get an early start on your preparations. Even if you are filing one of five forms affected by the recent legislation, the IRS expects to be ready for your return by February 11th.

· The minutes of every Communication - stated or special shall, in the discretion of the Worshipful Master, or Brother occupying that Office for the time being, be read, corrected (if necessary) and approved by the Lodge, either before it is closed or immediately following the Opening of the next Stated Communication. We are continuing to make progress toward our goal of increasing District and Lodge support for community blood drives.

Last month I reported that five Lodges had appointed chairmen or coordinators to organize and execute blood donor programs to be sponsored by their Lodges.

Of those five Lodges, three now have scheduled blood drives of their own, increasing the number of Monroe District Lodges sponsoring blood drives from three to six.

The three new sponsors are Fairport-Flower City, Brother Kel Kelsey, Chairman; Northfield, Brother John Dudley, Chairman and Oatka, Brother Jeffrey Klimek, Chairman.

Fairport - Flower City Lodge will also run the Child ID along with the blood drive and have the OES on board to provide

We will continue to work at organizing drives for other Lodges, where it is practical.

Blood Donor Program

Site Availability

While we would like to have every Lodge sponsoring a drive of its own, that may not be possible. In some localities finding a suitable site in which to hold a drive is a problem. In other localities, where there are already drives sponsored by other organizations or the population may not be large enough to support new drives.

Webster is a good example of this; there are four Lodges meeting at the Shrine and two meeting at the Temple on Orchard Street. Webster Lodge and the Shrine are currently sponsoring blood drives on a regular basis. If we were to attempt to inaugurate five additional drives in Webster, there would not be enough donors to

It takes 25 donors at any individual drive for the Red Cross to break even, therefore, additional drives there probably would not be practical.

Our goal in these situations is to find other ways in which to support blood donor programs.

There are localities where there are not community drives, but where the Red Cross would like very much to have a sponsor for drives. Fairport, Pittsford and Scottsville have been such communities. Happily, we have Lodges in those communities whose Lodge facilities are satisfactory for the conduct of blood drives, and they have taken on the responsibility of sponsoring blood drives in their communities.

East Rochester is a community without a community blood drive, and where the Red Cross would like very much to have a drive in place, but where no facility is available at this time. ERAC Lodge has accepted the responsibility of conducting drives in East Rochester and such drives will be set up as soon as a satisfactory facility is found. The search for that facility is ongoing.

More Ways to Help

Whether or not his Lodge sponsors a blood drive, every Brother can participate, by giving of his own blood, health permitting, and by spreading the word to other Brothers, family, relatives, and friends.



'A man who has a fireplace need never be lonely. A fire, correctly tended, requires thought and attention. In return, it offers warmth, music and beauty. And the glow from the hearth means a glow in the heart.


"A man who cherishes his fire wants a solid backlog of oak or hard maple. If he is fortunate enough to cut his own wood and has a choice, he sees to it that he has several kinds. The resin of pine or cedar means quick, hot heat, yellow flames and a pleasant odor; yellow birch gives an orange-blue flame, burns long and steady; old apple wood means fragrance and a clear, bluish flame. Elm has deep russet flames. Balsam and spruce crackle and spit and must be watched.

"Don't poke your fire too much, but use judgment as you put on the logs. A moderately high fire creates its own draft. A good hearth tender uses his broom occasionally, but doesn't worry if a few ashes spill out.

"Tending a fire is for the patient man. It fosters deep thoughts and contentment with the simple basic things in life. Mechanical heat has its good points and one wants it. But somehow it is more meaningful if flames paint a picture in a fireplace and a man has a chance to tend his fire."

and 23rd, and March 1st from 8:30 a.m. - 1 p.m. at Eunice Lodge, 3141 State Street, Caledonia. It's too late to sign up for this class and I only have two Candidates signed up. I cannot believe that the 26 Wardens from the 13 Monroe District Lodges have taken the Course or are recycling Past Masters who feel they do not need the review. This class will prepare you to take on the mantle of running your Lodge. Every Lodge was sent three copies of the new 24-Inch Gauge over a year ago. The new book has over twice the information of the older versions. It is a recipe book on how to organize and run Lodge programs.

The Staff Officers of Monroe, Livingston and Genesee-Wyoming Districts have solicited the services of highly competent individuals to present the material in areas of which these men have demonstrated considerable expertise. Those who should be taking this Course (and are not) will short their Lodges and Brothers the guidance and direction they need to grow in Masonry. We spend between 350-400 man-hours to make a new Mason. If we do not provide a meaningful Lodge experience thereafter, it is no wonder that dimits and drops for non-payment of Dues occur.

One of the articles I found was a paper dated August 20, 1880, from the Steuben Courier and was a collection of ads. The item that caught my eye was a 'Travelers Guide of the Erie Railway,' now known as the New York, Lake Erie & Western R.R." It describes the mode of travel, 'Pullman's best drawing room and sleeping coaches, combining all modern improvements, are run through between Buffalo, Niagara Falls, Cincinnati and New York. Through Sleeping Coaches and Hotel Dining cars between Chicago and New York." Then a schedule is posted below. I won't list all the stations, but it's interesting to note that these trains stopped in places like Attica, Dansville, Wayland and Bath to name a few.

The important thing is that they had a Schedule to keep and people depended on it for daily travel. In our Masonic Fraternity we also have Schedules that keep us informed and on track. Currently, the Grand Lodge Staff Officers are working on the Schedules for the upcoming Educational Courses that we are going to present to those who want to receive "further light" as they travel to the East.

I know that R∴W∴ Thomas Grape and his Team are trying to work out a Schedule that will be of interest to you. On February 2nd and 23rd and March 1st, we will journey again to Eunice Lodge in Caledonia to present this Course. It's because of the Schedule, those who are making presentations know when they are arriving, how long they have to talk and when the breaks are, etc.


Widows Luncheon

In 2008, we would like to schedule as many events as possible and team again with fire departments, the police and, of course, all Lodges and Concordant Bodies.




I find I am having a little harder time writing this article, as there isn't a whole lot to report. That can be both positive and negative.


Elevator Update By Joe Privitera





see one of the jewels of our system. If you are interested, let me know in the Office and we will put you on the list.


Sad News

Medieval Templar Hirarchy This talk is based upon the article written by Templar History.com.

The Grand Master

The Grand Master was the supreme authority of the Templar Order and answered to none save the Pope. Once elected to the Office, the Grand Master served for the remainder of his life. In several cases, that lifetime was cut short. Several Grand Masters were killed in battle, showing that the position was far more than an adminis-

While each country had its own Master, the Grand Master was above each of them. In addition to overseeing military operations, the Grand Master was also responsible for the business dealings of the Order.

Seneschal The Seneschal was the right hand man to the Grand Master and in modern terms would be similar to a vice president of a corporation. The Seneschal also acted as a consigliore or advisor to the Grand Master and looked after a great deal of the administrative duties.

Along with the Grand Master, the Seneschal ruled over eight Templar provincial Masters. These provinces were chiefly Aragon, Apulia, England, France, Hungary, Poitiers, Portugal, and Scotland.

Marshal

The Marshal of the Order was the Templar in charge of war and anything that was related to it. In this sense, the Marshal could be viewed as the second most important member of the Order after the Grand Master.

His personal retinue was comprised of two squires, one turcoman, one turcopole and one sergeant. He also had four horses at his command.

Under Marshal

The Under Marshal was in charge of the footmen and the equipment.

Standard Bearer

The Standard Bearer was in charge of the squires and, despite the title of his office, never seemed to actually carry the Order's standard himself.

Draper

The Draper was in charge of the Templar garments and linens and while this may seem like

a menial task, the Templar Rule of Order states that after the Master and Marshal, the Draper was superior to all Brethren.

The Templar Rule of Order said of the Draper's responsibilities regarding the robe of the order, "and the Draper or the one who is in his place should studiously reflect and take care to have the reward of God in all the above-mentioned things, so that the eyes of the envious and evil-tongued cannot observe that the robes are too long or too short; but he should distribute them so that they fit those who must wear them, according to the size of each one.'

The Draper had in his personal retinue two squires, a number of tailors, and one brother in charge of the pack animals who would carry supplies. In addition, the Draper, like the Marshal, had four horses at his disposal.

Commanders of the Lands: Jerusalem, Antioch and Tripoli

These Templar Officers operated much like a Baillie and operated under the Masters, Commanders were responsible for all Templar houses, castles, and farms in their jurisdiction.

The personal retinue of the Commanders consisted of two squires, two-foot soldiers, one sergeant, one deacon, and one Saracen scribe. Like others, the Commander had four horses at his command as well as one palfrey (riding horse).

Commanders of Knights, Houses and Farms (Castles)

These Templars fell under the Commanders of Lands and were responsible for the day-to-day operations of the various estates under their care. Generally speaking, they were knights, but if no knight resided in the region, the position could go to a sergeant.

If the Commander was a knight he was permitted four horses, but if a sergeant he was allowed only two.

Provincial Masters

Provincial Masters, who governed the western districts, were similar to the Commanders of Lands, but seem to have largely been responsible for managing revenue and recruiting new men to the Order.

Knights and Sergeants

The bulk of the Templar's military might was comprised of knights and sergeants. Although both classes of Templars were as likely to die in battle, the knight had a higher ranking within the Order.

Knights had to be men of noble birth and wore the white mantle that is the most familiar garment of the Order. Each knight was permitted one squire and three horses. Sergeants did not have to be of noble birth and to show their lower rank, sergeants wore a black or brown mantle. They were given one horse and had no squires under their command.

May our Sovereign King and Lord bless you and yours!

The remaining Officers were installed and Jose and Kenyatta DaCosta recited the words to two verses of Prayer is the Key to Heaven. The main verse is:

Prayer is the key to Heaven, But faith unlocks the door: Words are so easily spoken, A prayer without faith,

Is like a boat without an oar. Have faith when you speak to the Master, That's all He asks you for,

Yes, prayer is the key to Heaven,

But faith unlocks the door.





It was good to see so many photos in the January Issue of the Masonic Times. I have permission of the Chairman of the Children's Christmas Party to review his final report.




