Award Presentation

The Distinguished Community Service Award will be presented in the program following the Brunch. This year's recipient is Officer Moses Robinson, a member of the Roehester Police Department and currently a School Resource Officer at a local high school, providing assistance in drug resistance training, peer mediation, leadership training and conflict resolution.

As promised last month, here is some biographical information on Mr. Robinson. He began his law enforcement career in 1985 and has provided gang awareness presentations and intervention and prevention methods to the City of Rochester School District staff. He is an instructor for the Bureau of Justice Assistance (RCPI) and provides for law enforcement and community stakeholders a national overview of major gang activity around the United States. He is an instructor for New York State Department of Criminal Justice's Office of Public Safety on Youth Gang Awareness Training, Criminal Street Gang Investigations and Gang Collaborative Training.

Mr. Robinson is a certified School Resource Officer with the National Association of School Resource Officers, and a Certified School Resource Officer with the State of New York Division of Criminal Justice Services. He has received training at the National Gang Training Research Center as both a Gang Specialist and in conducting Gang Crimes Investigations. He is charged with investigating crimes committed by juveniles or school age youth as prescribed by the Family Court Act, Social Service Law, Criminal Procedure Law and the New York State Penal Law, and implementing strategies for reducing criminal conduct within schools.

He has provided training statewide to New York State law enforcement professionals, community service agencies, school districts and others in the development of comprehensive approaches to gang-related issues, youth gang trends, gangs in school and school safety, gang identification and debriefing gang members. He has also

provided training in the capacity of developing community strategies, gang legislation and the implementation of community intervention and prevention alternatives for youth.

Officer Robinson has been a Criminal Street Gang Awareness Instructor at St. Petersburg College, St. Petersburg, FL, providing training nationwide to uniformed patrol officers, investigators and criminal justice professionals.

Mr. Robinson holds memberships in several Investigators Associations across the Country, the National Major Gang Task Force and the National Association of School Resource Officers. He holds numerous certifications in the Law Enforcement field.

A graduate of Monroe Community College and Cortland State University, Mr. Robinson is currently studying to obtain his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice with a minor in Behavioral Psychology. He resides in Rochester.

#### While Traveling, Visit Other Lodges

While living in Colorado, I recently had the opportunity to attend an "Outdoor Lodge Meeting," sponsored by Wheatland Lodge. The actual Lodge Hall is in the small town of Wheatland, Wyoming, but once a year, they get special Dispensation to hold a tiled meeting outdoors, high up in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains.



This will enable them to continue to distribute comfort kits; organize picnics, birthday parties, Ward ice cream and cake parties and bingo parties; present welcome home certificates and many other activities to help make the hospitalized Veterans lives a little more pleasant.

This completes the article published last month by Captain Dan Fletcher (a Unity Lodge Brother) on his experienceswhile deployed in Afghanistan.

The countryside is pretty much all brown with a few spots of green from the trees, orchards and wheat fields. This pretty much explains why the Afghans decorate their trucks with all kinds of ornaments and the guys carry around flowers. They also call this place "rocket city" for the Chinese-made 107mm rockets the local bad guys lob at us from time to time. They are not too accurate and most land near my barracks into the Waste Treatment Facility which kicks up the stench. We always hit the bunkers when this happens and I usually shoot the breeze with a bunch of KBR employees and the two enlisted that assist my team. Basically as long as they don't hit the barracks and destroy our stuff, no worries. The local Howitzer battery returns fire with deadly accurate 155 mm shells followed by aerial bombardment and then ground troops. The Talibums run and hide in their caves, then do it again next month...and so it goes.

#### **Local Observations**

Just a few notes from my observations of the locals. What is interesting about the local Pashtuns is that they can find a seat without sitting down virtually anywhere. What all can do is squat down and rest their buttocks on their Achilles heals and rest their elbows on their knees. They can "sit" like this for hours and on almost any surface.

We recently conducted a range and our Afghan National Police security detail perched like birds on the top of the dirt berms on either side of the range for hours quite comfortably. They are also superb runners up mountains that leave all of us North Americans huffing and puffing.

#### **Pashtun Tribes**

One thing I have found very interesting in how the local Pashtuns are organized. It seems that at least this group is divided into tribes. Each District (like a county) is named after a tribe for a total of 13 tribes that make up the Province of Khowst.

There is, for instance, the Terezayi Tribe that inhabit the Terezavi District. Then there is the Jaji Madan who inhabit the Jaji Madan District and the Sabari who inhabit the Sabari District and so on.

lieve he is from another tribe. Each tribe is run by a Tribal Elder or group of Elders. The tribe is then broken down into villages where each have an Elder and further to a Family Elder.

I met a Tribal Elder from the Matun Tribe who has influence over 33,000 Matuns and at the end of our conversation he gave me his personal assurance that I would be welcome and under his protection whenever I was in this District. He was perhaps only being polite, but what a compliment!

#### Unique Characteristics

Each Tribe has its own unique characteristics and sometimes there is fighting between the Tribes over water and resources kind of like the Clans of Scotland used to do in the 16th Century.

The Sabari, for instance, always fight whoever is in control. They fought the Russians, the Mujadine, the Communists, the Taliban and now this government.

The Jaji Madan live in a miniature "Shangri La" - beautiful mountains, green pastures and a people who like peace and security and will do just about anything to keep it that way. They work with us, support the police and do not allow strangers to buy land in their District. Anyone who comes in to start trouble from outside the Tribe is either arrested, shown to the borders of Jaji land or into the grave.

Not all Pashtuns stay in their Tribal Areas. They move around for work or other reasons. I recently met a construction worker from Jaji who, in addition to being an excellent bricklayer, was also an excellent cook. We had chicken over an open fire in the middle of the District Center he was building. Greasy, but very good with flat bread to go with it.

Although the city is populated mostly by Pashtuns, there are a couple of groups in the area. One is called the "Kuchi" and they are a group of nomadic herders. If you see a lot of goats, cows and horses, that is the Kuchi. Many are very wealthy as they make their living off of not only livestock but smuggling weapons and drugs over the border to and from Pakistan.

Another group is the Gypsies. Like their cousins in Europe they are also nomadic traders and entertainers from India. The problem with this group is they are stuck in Afghanistan as they cannot go home to India because Islamic Pakistan is in the way and does not like Indians.

singing and music. I haven't heard one yet who was flat or off key and when they sing the words of the Koran it is very beautiful. They have an excellent sense of hospitality as dictated by the code of Pashtunwalli way of the Pashtuns - an honor code that covers everything from hospitality, family honor, protection of women and guests and the right to revenge. They are also shrewd businessmen and negotiations with them is always a thinking game. In combat, they charge the enemy as it is the way of honor and retreat is forbidden. They are also fast runners and quite accustomed to rugged terrain. Pashtuns are, by nature, fearless as is most of the Afghan ethnic groups though we are trying to temper their courage with wisdom and prudence.

**Afghan Food** 

I am really starting to like Afghan food better than American food. The cooks in the Dining Hall are all contract workers from Bosnia and Macedonia. They're hard-working people, but boy can they ruin a good piece of meat - way too spicy!

Another interesting thing they do is put finely ground salt on the watermelon. That's what they have for dessert - no ice cream or fatty stuff. Try it, it's good! The salt is not grainy like ours but instead like talcum powder. Everyone eats from the same bowl but with your right hand and as per Pashtunwali concept of living or philosophy all must wash their hands. prior to eating.

I am quite fortunate as I am on a fairly secure FOB with a good gym and dining hall. Others are in mountainous areas with poor food and frequent rocket, mortar and small arms fire attacks. I also have flush toilets and hot showers. Luck of the draw I suppose.

Afghan food is always excellent - they serve a lot of watermelon, rice mixed with beef and raisins, cooked bean dishes and yogurt with large pieces of flat bread. All excellent and with large quantities and none very spicy which surprised me as this is the crossroads of Asian and astride the Silk and Spice routes of old.

#### Contractors

We have a LOT of contractors here. Most work for Kellogg Brown and Root (KBR) - providing all our food and water needs. We also have BAH representatives who work on the new MRAP (Mine-Resistant, Ambush-Protected) vehicles - big armored trucks that can withstand a direct hit by a mine and are really good in a fire fight. Dynacorp contractors train the

police. In fact, one of them predicted a "contractor war" in our lifetime. The logistics provided by KBR, the weapons by BAH, the soldiers by Dynacorp and Blackwater. Aside from being expensive, it is not much fun cheering on a contractor rather than a soldier and all can quit or switch sides if the money is not good.

Don't get me wrong ... the Americans are very loyal citizens who believe in what they are doing and the foreigners are hard workers. Everyone here works 12 hours a day; everyday; no days off! Isn't his how Ancient Rome fell - the "contractors" turned on their masters and took over?

#### Not Without Loss

I appreciate all of your prayers, but please pray for the souls and families of my fallen comrades. Three were killed by a commanddetonated pressure plate mine that cut their HUMWV in half. One was killed by a bomb in another area. The fourth was an academic named "Bhatia" and he was working on his PhD from Oxford University in Sociology and Anthropology (one chapter left in his thesis). He was working with our troops to help us understand the Afghan people; his advice saved hundreds of lives for our troops and the local population.

Some more recent losses were Hilton, MaKay and Palmateer and they were killed when their HUMVEE was ambushed and blown up along with their driver a young specialist who I knew years ago. A Lieutenant Farcas, who was a good friend of mine, committed suicide. Also, Lieutenant Diewhirst, in one of the Active Duty units we are stationed with was killed in an ambush to the North. A couple of our guys were injured and so were the Afghan Police who also lost one killed. The bad guys also attacked a local police center and the ANP (Afghan National Police) lost two more and had three injured. I arranged for one of their shot up guys to come to the hospital here in Salerno and went to visit him and he recognized me from a previous operation and was so surprised to see me! Good kid, had been shot in the leg but was recovering well and is now with his family. New York Army National Guardsmen and your neighbors and protectors. Please pray for the souls and families of our dead and for recovery for the wounded.

#### Under Attack

We take a lot of rocket attacks here - 107-mm Rockets MADE IN CHINA!!!!! I've had a few near misses - one blew up my parking space five minutes before I arrived. Darn, I liked that

space! Another hit while I was standing outside the bunker. I know, what were you doing outside the bunker, dummy? Well, you usually can tell whether the shells are coming close enough to deck you because they fly high and are noisy. The one that hit the HESCO barrier 100 meters behind me, was low and quiet. Sorry, Mom!!!!

We recently completed an Operation in Sabari where I met the Sub-Governor there – a local celebrity and celebrated Mujaddin fighter who drove the Russians out of the Province. An interesting man - his Excellency, the Sub-Governor! He had us over for chicken, Chai tea, bread and watermelon.

#### Remember ...

I know there are people who think academics should stay out of this war, but as Franklin Delano Roosevelt said, "we cannot ignore the problem (of Nazi Germany at the time) by simply pulling the covers over our heads." As many of you might recall, we turned our backs on these people once when the terrorists drove planes into the Twin Towers of NYC. They had received their training and plans from here in Khowst and other places. The Afghans deserve our help and we cannot abandon them again.

#### A Tale of Revenge

The local bad guys found out the address of the local cops. They attacked his house when he was not at home and his wife greeted them by lobbing 5-10 grenades, after which the neighbors opened up with anti-tank RPGs and AK-47 machine guns. You have to admit, it is hard to beat Pashtun/Afghan hospitality – good or bad.







You're My Brother...

In our Fraternity we call each other Brother, but what does it really mean? Some common definitions are: One related or closely united to another by some common tie or interest, as of rank, profession, membership in a society, toil, suffering, etc.; One who, or that which, resembles another in distinctive qualities or traits of character; To make a Brother of; to call or treat as a Brother; to admit to a Brotherhood. It would appear those definitions also applies to Mason.


But in the usages of Freemasonry, "Brother" is neither a sentimental nor familiar form of address but is a title - as much so as Worshipful, Right Worshipful, or Most Worshipful, and must always be used as such. A man does not attend a Lodge Communication in his capacity as a private individual; he is not Joe, Bill or John. He is there in his capacity as a Master Mason, and for this reason, one should never in open Lodge refer to "Bill B. but always to "Brother B." in the same literal sense as any other Officer in Lodge or Grand Lodge.

Always address a Grand Lodge Officer at any Communication by his correct title. He, in turn, must show the same courtesy to other Grand Lodge Officers present as well as to the Worshipful Master and to the Brethren of the Lodge. The rule of etiquette should be precisely observed, no matter what ties of family or friendship may exist. The use of the "Sirs" in conjunction with any Masonic title is improper.







However, there is much work to be done on the building before this date so several work parties are being planned and coordinated by Brother Steve Phillips.



# **Douglas E. Maxwell Elected Imperial Potentate** at 134th Imperial Council Session

During the 2008 Imperial Council Session, held in St. Louis June 29-July 3, Douglas E. Maxwell of Chesterfield, MO, was elected Imperial Potentate of Shriners International, making him the highest-ranking Shriner in the world. As Imperial Potentate, he is serving his eleventh term as a member of the Board of Directors for the Shriners Fraternity. Maxwell is also serving as the Chairman of the Board of Directors for Shriners Hospitals for Children, a health care system of 22 hospitals in the U.S., Mexico and Canada.

In college at the University of Kansas, Maxwell studied architectural engineering and finance, receiving his Degree in 1969. He received his Master of Business Administration Degree from Southern Illinois University in 1975.

In the early '70s, Maxwell joined the U.S. Air Force as a second lieutenant. He flew the world routes of the Military Airlift Command, including missions to Europe, South America, Africa, Southeast Asia and Vietnam. For his distinguished service during the Vietnam War, he received both Vietnamese Combat Service Medals and the Air Force Commendation Medal. At the end of the war in 1975, he departed the military as a captain.

Maxwell and his father began a manufacturing company in 1975, building checkout counter conveyors and speed reducers. Today, Maxwell Manufacturing Co. has grown into the third largest builder of these conveyors in America.

During his 10 years on the Board of Directors of Shriners International, Imperial Sir Maxwell has served as chairman of the International Development Committee, the

Buildings and Equipment Committee and the Fleming-Florence Committee. He has also served on the Investment Committee and the Planning Committee.

Maxwell is a Past Potentate of Moolah Shriners in St. Louis. He is a 33rd degree member of the Scottish Rite, a Knight Templar in the York Rite, and a member of Beacon Masonic Lodge #3 and the International Order of DeMolay Legion of Honor. He is also an emeritus member of the St. Louis Shriners Hospital Board of Governors, having served on the Applications Committee and Buildings and Equipment Committee.

Maxwell is a member of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association and also the Missouri Pilots Association. He holds a commercial pilot's license and instructor's pilot's license.

He and his wife, Patricia, are high school sweethearts and have been married for 39 years.

More than 1,500, 33° Masons and their Ladies gathered in Providence, RI, late in August for the Annual Meeting of Scottish Rite Masons in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction. Those in attendance included Grand Masters from the 15 Grand Lodges in the Jurisdiction and Representatives from 24 Scottish Rite Jurisdictions around the world.

Re-elected to another threeyear term were John William McNaughton, as Sovereign Grand Commander, and Jim S. Deyo, as Grand Lieutenant Commander.

Newly elected at the meeting were Harold L. Aldrich (Varysburg, NY) as Grand Minister of State; Donald G. Hicks, Jr. (Leominster, MA) as Grand Treasurer General; and C. DeForrest Trexler (Macungie, PA) as Grand Secretary General. New State Deputies include Peter J. Samiec (New York) and Eric Ginette (Vermont).

At the conclusion of the meeting, the 33° was conferred upon 104 members who were selected for dedicated service to Scottish Rite Freemasonry or service reflecting credit upon the Fraternity. Three New York Masons were among that group: Curtis A. Banks (Jamaica); Clifford T. Jacobs (East Elmhurst); and William C. Brunet, Sr. (Utica).

# Taxes! Taxes! Taxes! By Tom Michielsen Taxes!

The leaves are turning bright colors and soon will be falling faster than we can rake them. The sweet smells of apple and pumpkin pies are in the air. Autumn must be here again. That means Winter is coming soon, right after Halloween and Thanksgiving.

Gambling Income & Losses

Gambling winnings are fully taxable and must be reported on your tax return. Gambling income includes, but is not limited to, winnings from lotteries, raffles, horse and dog races and casinos, as well as the fair market value of prizes such as cars, houses, trips or other noncash prizes.

Depending on the type and amount of your winnings, the payer might provide you with a Form W-2G (Certain Gambling Winnings) and may have withheld federal income taxes from the payment.

Here are some general guidelines on gambling income and losses:

• Reporting Winnings - The full amount of your gambling winnings for the year must be reported on line 21, Form 1040. You may not use Form 1040A or 1040EZ. This rule applies regardless of the amount and regardless of whether you receive a Form W-2G or any other reporting form.

 Deducting losses - If you itemize deductions, you can deduct your gambling losses for the year on Schedule A line 28.
 You cannot deduct gambling losses that are more than your winnings.

It is important to keep an accurate diary or similar record of your gambling winnings and losses. To deduct your losses, you must be able to provide receipts, tickets, statements or other records that show the amount of both your winnings and losses.

Mortgage Workouts, Tax-Free for Many Homeowners

There is now tax relief for struggling homeowners. If your mortgage debt is partly or entirely forgiven during 2007, 2008 or 2009, you may be able to claim special tax relief by fill-

ing out Form 982 and attaching it to your federal income tax return for that year.

Normally, debt forgiveness results in taxable income. But under the Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act of 2007, you may be able to exclude from tax up to \$2 million of debt forgiven on your principal residence. The limit is \$1 million for a married person filing a separate return.

Debt reduced through mortgage restructuring, as well as mortgage debt forgiven in connection with a foreclosure, may qualify for this relief. The debt must have been used to buy, build or substantially improve your principal residence and must have been secured by that residence. Debt used to refinance qualifying debt is also eligible for the exclusion, but only up to the amount of the old mortgage principal, just before the refinancing.


Debt forgiven on second homes, rental property, business property, credit cards or car loans, does not qualify for the new tax-relief provision. In some cases, however, other kinds of tax relief, based on insolvency, for example, may be available. See Form 982 for details.

If your debt is reduced or eliminated, you will receive a year-end statement (Form 1099-C) from your lender. By law, this form must show the amount of debt forgiven and the fair market value of any property given up through foreclosure.

The IRS urges borrowers to check the Form 1099-C carefully. Notify the lender immediately if any of the information shown is incorrect. You should pay particular attention to the amount of debt forgiven (Box 2) and the value listed for your home (Box 7).





# News of Camp DeMolay

It has been a busy and exciting time at Sodus Point this year. Architectural drawings were provided by Thomas Pellett. After some discussions and alterations, plans were finalized, a building permit obtained and construction began in February on the new recreation hall and garage. This replaced a nearly 50-year-old building that had badly deteriorated over the years, especially from rain water and melted snow/ice water running around and through it.

In an effort to eliminate, or certainly reduce, this condition, foundation stone from James Cleason, of Abram Cleason Co.



Inc., in Newark, arrived last fall, raising the floor level nearly three feet. It was tamped and graded by Jack Steinkamp, using equipment provided by James Hollingsworth.

Once the milder weather arrived, snow melted and ground thawed, building materials were ordered and we were under way. Richard Santelli, of Santelli Construction in Sodus Point, won the bid for the project.



As the project progressed, a few alterations (common on most all building projects) were made. Ceiling material for the porch was donated, and the Camp purchased the same material for the interior of the recreation hall. Jack and Richard Santelli, who volunteered this portion, installed the ceiling over the porch. Richie also used the concrete leftover from pouring the floor to make a landing area at the base of the lower flight of stairs.

A Ceremony of Dedication was held on June 8th. Although not completely finished, enough of the work was done to hold an Open House. The Masonic Service Bureau invited Lodges, Masonic Bodies, Scouting Organizations, Civic groups, Town and Village Leaders and the general public to the program, which was organized and chaired by Joy Woodley, a member of the Board of Directors. Gary Burke, who attended the Camp as a DeMolay a few years ago, acted as Master of Ceremony.

As part of the festivities, Robert L. Anderson spoke briefly on the history of the Camp. He had also written an article which was included in the printed program passed out to those attending. It was his Lodge Brothers -Frank L. Simes Lodge (now Valley-Simes Lodge) - who had constructed the original building, replaced by this structure.

Two stainless-steel flagpoles had been donated and installed by Donald Darrohn, President of the Masonic Service Bureau, and his wife, Mickey. Ceremonies opened with Boy Scouts hoisting the American Flag.

Reverend Paul Gleason offered prayers and blessings for the new Hall. It was then officially named the Valley-Simes Recreation Hall, with a suitable plaque installed by Richard Snyder, Trustee of Valley-Simes Lodge and immediate past Project Manager of Camp DeMolay.

Among those recognized was new Eagle Scout Andrew Miller. The project he completed to earn his Badge was two sets of stairs. One set brings you from Anderson Lodge to the driveway. The second brings you down from the driveway to the new recreation building. His mother, father and sister were also in attendance.

Helping Andrew accept the praise of the Service Bureau were two members of the Finger Lakes Council of the Boy Scouts of America, James Russell and Mary Zonneville. Both are actively looking for ways to help keep Camp DeMolay oper ating, as Scouts are one of the prime users of the facility.

#### Work Continues

Once the exterior construction was finished, Richard Snyder, Ralph Jurgens, the new Project Manager of the Camp, and Skip Waterstreet spent two days applying stain to the structure, with the raw wood literally slurping the stain out of the brushes and rollers. Gutters have now been added to both sides of the building to further help control the flow of water away from the foundation.

Ralph and Richard have been to the Camp one day a week all Summer long. Hot water heaters have been repaired and replaced in the bathhouse. The current project, as this is written, is fixing the windows and painting the trim on Anderson Lodge. Just like home, there always seems to be something that needs to completed.

#### Electrical work

Another major undertaking this year was the replacement of overhead wires. George Foehner with his sons Robert and Allen, of Foehner Electric, have provided underground cable and related accessories. Trenches were dug and the cable laid in them, but hookups are not quite completed. This will eliminate a possible hazard that was of concern to Board Members.

The accompanying pictures give you an idea of some of the activities. You have a look at the old building, the new one, some of the steps in the construction project, a glimpse of the stairs, the Flags flying from the new poles and speakers at the Open House. I hope I've mentioned everyone involved. If not, let me know and I'll do an addendum next month.


