

ERAC Lodge cordially invites you to attend their meeting on April 8th when R :: W :: Thomas Savini, Director of the Chancellor Robert R. Livingston Masonic Library of Grand Lodge, will speak on "The History of the Ritual."

A native of Buffalo, Brother Savini moved to Brooklyn and began his service as Director of the Library in January, 2000, after completing his Master of Arts Degree. He implemented the conversion of the Library's card catalogue to computer database format and directed the creation of a virtual museum using digital technology to convert the Library's artifact and manuscript collections.

The library holds one of the world's largest collections relating to the subject of Freemasonry. It is so vast it not only holds books, but periodicals, biographical files on famous Freemasons and historical exhibits to name a few The library is located in the Grand Lodge Building on 23rd Street in New York City and is open to the Public.

Biographical Information

R∴W∴ Thomas Savini was raised in United Craft Lodge No. 931 (now Erie Parish United No. 161, Cheektowaga) in 1992, became Charter Master of Great Valley Lodge No. 1178 in Olean, was Assistant Grand Lecturer of the Cattaraugus District from 1998-1999 and Worshipful Master of James W. Husted-Fiat Lux Lodge No. 1068 in the 8th Manhattan District from 2004-2005. In April of 2006, he was appointed Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Estonia near the Grand Lodge of New York, and in September 2010 he was appointed a Custodian of the Work.

The President of the Service Bureau, Joy Woodley, presented the check for \$18,000 on behalf of all the Freemasons of the Genesee Region, which the Service Bureau serves. The luncheon was well attended and I hope everyone enjoyed the short program and good food.

Besides the Officers and the regular members of the Service Bureau, we were joined by some special guests. From Livingston District – District Deputy Grand Master, R: W: Donald Munger; *Have-a-Heart* Coordinator, Richard Trescott; and Livonia Lodge Master, Joe Shanks. From Monroe District – District Deputy Grand Master, R: W:Phil Hurwitz; from Eureka Lodge, PHA - Brothers Eugene Crews, Richard Pickett, Bing Reaves, Joe Thomas, Mason Dix, and Lawrence Brown. Accepting from The Ronald McDonald House was Patty Schwarzweller, Lori Stevenson and David Anderson. My thanks to all who attended and to the Masonic Service Bureau for hosting a solid event.

This year's Campaign had its challenges with bad weather and low Mall attendance. At one point, the numbers didn't look good for a successful Campaign, but like a movie, the good guys made a heroic recovery! Normally I wouldn't mention my Lodge in my writings, but in this case the numbers dictate that I should, and will. Union Star Lodge raised a total of \$3,700 with \$2,000 coming in the final two days, pushing the Campaign total to \$18,000. 
Ritual errors the Brothers made without offending the Brother or talking condescendingly to him or the Convention as a whole when correcting us, was special.

About the District

I have received Secretary Reports from every Lodge in our District. As of December 31, 2012, we have a total of 1,568 Lodge within Monroe District. During 2012 our Lodges Raised a combined to-Mason and lost 125 Brothers due to NPD/ Dimit/Death ... 57 were due to death, 21 due to Dimits and 47 for Non Payment of Dues (NPD).

It's this last figure -47 for NPD - that caught my eye. Presumably every Lodge is investigating why a Brother is at risk of being dropped from the roles for Nonpayment of Dues. Every Lodge is encouraged to consider (and if in the position to do so) waiving the Dues of a worthy Brother Master Mason. If a Brother wants to remain in our Craft, but is financially unable to do so, then why not help him? I understand that waiving Dues can itself pose a financial burden upon the Lodge; reason being that every member on the roles is taxed by Grand Lodge.

Every Lodge which chooses to remit the Dues of a worthy Brother Master as an organization due to the lack of par-Mason can obtain financial relief from ticipation from Lodges. It's hard to believe that April is already upon us! Our first year as Assistant Grand Lecturers is certainly moving by very quickly. So far, it's been a pleasure for us as we've visited your Lodges for the various Edict and Dispensation Degrees. I sincerely thank you all for the warm hospitality.

With the advent of the Springtime Season, many of you have nearly completed your Degree work. I congratulate you on successfully Raising so many fine new Brothers and for doing so with such great care. I welcome all new Brothers to our great Fraternity. Many of you are excited about the Ritual, and have focused on improving and upholding the quality of the same for the benefit of our new Brothers. With that in mind, good food and good friends with us! And I do have a few observations to share incoming Masters will be held on Fri-

til a subsequent Communication. The focus of the evening should be on the Candidates and having the Degree begin promptly in the evening, will help allow them to be awake and better engaged in the ceremony. Also, after a long Degree, the Brothers will want to have a little time for some fellowship before the lateness of the day sets in and bringing business before the Lodge (that can wait until later) should be avoided. Remember that email reflectors are a great tool for disseminating those types of things.

Secondly, it is so important that the Masters of Ceremony, Stewards and Conductors participate in rehearsals. One recurring weakness we have observed is the floor work related to the assembling and breaking of the symbolic temple. With a bit more attention to detail and proper rehearsal, this can easily be corrected. Just a small adjustment can make the difference between good and truly great work. Also, we are finding that the job of conducting Candidates is being overlooked. I can't emphasize enough just how important it is to have Conductors who are attentive to the needs of the Candidates, and who truly know the proper way to guide and encourage them through the floor work.

Also, those of you who are responsible for preparing your Candidates for the Degree need to be very diligent in this task. We've encountered some instances where not doing a thorough Inspection has led to Degrees being halted to correct issues up to, and including, Candidates being allowed to enter the Lodge Room not wearing Aprons! Please contact V: W: Pat Mulrooney or me if you have any questions on this subject and we'll be happy to guide you appropriately.

I recommend that everyone review their Cipher Books. Over time, it's very easy to substitute or add incorrect words or phrases. You all know it takes a serious amount of practice to memorize the Ritual. If you are going to put in the effort, then please take the extra time to occasionally review the Ritual so it remains firmly embedded in your minds and hearts. Reading the Ritual out loud as you study helps identify areas where improvement might be required.

Finally, all Lodge Masters are reminded that a Short Form Closing is not permitted. This is a Grand Lodge Directive! Even after a late night of Degree work, the Lodge must be properly closed in Due Form just as you would during a normal Communication. I hope these observations are helpful, as they are intended to be purely constructive and hopefully beneficial to you and your Lodge.





Berlin's tolerance also extended to his music as he wrote perennial Christian favorites, "Easter Parade" and "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas" - an example of his acceptance of the values of other people's beliefs. In 1938, Berlin wrote another American classic for the ages - "God Bless America," which was made popular by Kate Smith. There was even an aborted movement for it to replace the "Star Spangled Banner" as our National Anthem. All of the proceeds from "God Bless America" were donated to the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls.

under Czar Alexander III, the Russian pogroms caused passed on September 22, 1989. They had been married the persecution of the Jewish communities. Homes and properties were destroyed. One of Irving's first recollections was of his home going up in flames, courtesy of the Czar's Army.

Many of the Jewish families immigrated to America. Irving's father had a relative in New York and was finally able to move to the "Promised Land." The Balines had come from the expansive farming lands of Rural Russia to the crowded tenements of the Lower East Side of Manhattan. Sadly, Izzy's father died while he was still in grammar school, leaving his mother and several children to fend for themselves. Irving sold newspapers and sang in the streets until, at 16, he became a singing waiter in one of Manhattan's many saloons.

It was around that time he began composing songs, reflecting on the environment that surrounded him. He developed a knack for taking the chaotic sounds of the streets and extrapolating them into catchy melodies and lyrics. He was a self-taught piano player and could only play on the black Keys (key of F#, I believe). An invention at that time allowed for a lever to be installed on a piano to shift keys.



President Lincoln famously communicated and persuaded through stories. He would tell humorous stories and serious stories. Arguing with people doesn't work. His success as a lawyer and President was in no small measure based on his ability to tell a timely and relevant story that gets people to think and see his position.



What's Happening

As I write this, Grand Chapter Convocation has ended. The major business of the meeting was changes to the Constitutions to allow for Chapters to work in another language. This was done to accommodate one Chapter in Lebanon, Chartered by Grand Chapter, to do the work in a language other than English. This was rather complicated as language is specified in many different Sections of the Constitutions of Grand Chapter.

The new Grand High Priest is M : E. Richard "RJ" Kessler from Buffalo. His theme is "Attitude to Succeed." What this means for us is that we need to perform every activity we do with the only goal

ters of Royal Arch Masons in New York; but, by number, there have been over 344 Chapters Chartered over the 215 years of Grand Chapter's existence. There are slightly less than 3,500 Royal Arch Masons in the State. This makes the York Rite the smallest Concordant Body of Freemasonry in the State. What does this all mean to Hiram Chapter? I believe it means we have a great potential to grow in the future and we have the ability of becoming the home of truly great Freemasons in our community.

The York Rite Degrees build, as do the Scottish Rite Degrees, on the lessons of the Lodge Degrees to help the Brother Mason learn how to improve himself and give his life more meaning to society. The method used to teach the lessons is different. The York Rite uses Ritual and Allegory to convey its message. The message of each Degree must be ferreted out by the Candidate individually and can take some time because the Degrees contain much material in very compact settings. By some time, I mean the Companion should watch, or participate in, the Degrees several times. This helps bring out the lessons taught in the Degree. The lessons are not specifically stated, but alluded to by the Ritual.

Companions, what can you do to improve your Masonic Career and learn the lessons taught by all the Degrees? 


