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The Real Deal at Wakan-Hubbard ... Looking to the Future

If you have been at virtually any event in Monroe District over the past six months, someone has been wondering out loud about what's going on with Wakan-Hubbard Lodge. Quiet, and not-so-quiet, conversations are happening everywhere.

Lots of Brothers have seen the "For Sale" and "For Lease" signs on the building as they drive through the Four Corners of Penfield.

Brothers know we are doing joint Degrees and other activities with ERAC Lodge.

This combination of observations is sometimes followed by theories of pending doom, ranging from "Wakan-Hubbard Lodge can no longer support the building because they are broke," or "Wakan-Hubbard Lodge is falling apart and needs to merge with someone." I've heard several versions of this storyline and thought it would be helpful to everyone to share the real story – not just because it is important to me that everyone understands the facts, but

because I think our situation is not all that uncommon. Sharing our experience may be helpful to others.

Like most of the Lodges in Monroe District, Wakan-Hubbard has a rich history and, in its current form, is the result of the consolidation of multiple Lodges.

Penfield Union Lodge No. 154, one of our predecessor Lodges, built our Lodge Building in 1904. While we benefited for decades by having stable commercial tenants on the first floor, which covered the costs of building ownership, there was never much left over to pay for maintenance.

Certainly, the Lodge did not have the funds that would be needed to restore the building to its historical beauty, or to make the necessary upgrades that would allow it to become a gathering place for multiple Lodges.

Unfortunately, the Optician who had occupied the corner unit on the first floor for nearly 40 years retired in 2005. He sold the business to another Optician, but it flopped. This began

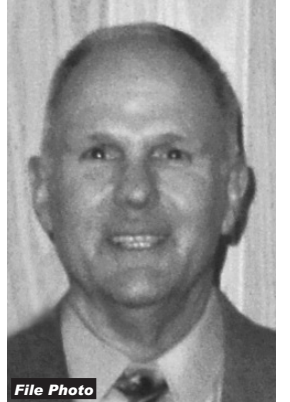

The Ecclesia was once the principal assembly or meeting place for the democracy of ancient Athens. Citizens would come together in groups of 6000 or more to discuss the days' issues, debate competing philosophies, elect officials and help govern their City-State.

Today a group of men spanning multiple generations are seeking a different Lodge experience. A true democratic Lodge that will discuss issues of the day, esoteric ideas and Masonic history. In doing so, Ecclesia Lodge is beginning to take form. Since early 2015 a group of Masons from Monroe District have met several times to form Ecclesia Lodge based on the principles of Observance Masonry: <http://www.masonicrestorationfoundation.org/>

To date we have agreed upon a set of Resolutions for the Lodge, By-Laws, a Budget and the name. The next steps are to write a letter to obtain Dispensation from the Grand Lodge of the State of New York in order to operate as a Lodge Under Dispensation and through Under Dispensation efforts obtain a Charter.

Ecclesia Lodge will not initiate candidates and will work to add to the ever-growing Masonic community in Monroe District.

What will an Ecclesia meeting entail? Meetings will be held in the mid-afternoon, starting at 3 p.m. The meetings will consist of an Officer's perambulation, a time of silent meditations, opening per the *Standard Work and Lectures*, business at hand, one or two programs for the meeting, silent meditations, closing per the *Standard Work and Lectures* and finally, a traditional Festive Board or Agape as it shall be called.

The programs will be announced well in advance with materials sent to all Lodge members and visiting Brethren. Each meeting will have a theme or topic that the programs will revolve around. The programs will be facilitated by the Worshipful Master and discussed among the Brethren attending Lodge.

Are you interested? Have you been looking into Obser-

vance Masonry? We would enjoy speaking with you and filling you in on all the details that could not be communicated in this article.

Our next meeting, the last meeting before the Dispensation Letter is sent to Grand Lodge, will be held at Webster Masonic Hall on May 11th at 7:30 p.m. – we hope to see you there.

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



History Continued

As we left the narrative last time, it was about 1901 with the establishment of a National Organization called the Tall Cedars of the United States of America. We will return to an earlier point in 1879 when the Ritual was solidified, including the scripture information about the completion of the building of Solomon's Temple (First Kings 5: 1-10); the shortage of

timber for scaffolding and the roofing for the Temple.

We find a referral to a copy of the latest manuscript, written by William S. Adams, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, recording the Secret Work and description of the Degree, submitted to the Archives in 1864.

It is believed the bulk of this work was the product of Rev. George S. Gassner, who was instrumental in its development, including the Prologue and Royal Court Degrees. It is said, by some, that the Prologue and Royal Court are some of the most beautiful Rituals in Freemasonry today. (*Hence Came We, A Tall Cedar History*, J. Edward Bullen, Officers Manual pp.41-42).

About Our Philanthropy

Over the years, there was a search for a suitable philanthropy for the Tall Cedars, as the then Grand Master, M.: W.: Harry Cambell said in 1933, that "no organization could con-

tinue to prosper unless it had a definite uplifting objective for the benefit of humanity."

In 1951, a worthy cause was found and for the next 20 years, the Tall Cedars supported the Metabolism Unit on the 10th floor of the Research Center in New York City.

In 1972, the Metabolism Unit had to be closed and again the Cedars renewed their search.

The Supreme Forest was advised at that time the Muscular Dystrophy Association and the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America were in dire need of assistance. It was decided that the Tall Cedars would become part of this project with the existing Tall Cedar, Jerry Lewis, and created a Muscular Dystrophy Foundation to finance funding research to find a cure for this dreaded disease.

Telethon

At about the same time, the MDA asked Jerry Lewis and Dean Martin to host this kick-off effort (1952). The Labor

Day Telethon went on for the next 61 years (1952-2012), together with the participation of the Tall Cedar MD Foundation.

The Jerry Lewis Telethon was discontinued just recently by the MDA because of a decline in donations. The MDA has gone on to try other formats that they feel will appeal to a more diverse donor population. The Tall Cedars, however, still continue to support the MDA Research Fund as their chief philanthropy.

Membership Program

We continue to look for new ways to support our Membership Program. This effort includes a possible "Woodsmen

Bring-a-Brother Night," and a telephone survey of the members to establish an asset base. If you have any ideas for attracting new members or are willing to participate in this membership effort, please call, email, snail-mail or otherwise, let us know your thoughts.

We have no reports of Woodsmen in distress at this time, but, If you hear of a fellow Woodsmen in need of assistance, please let the Scribe or GTC know.

Here we are in May once more. The Brotherhood Fund Drive runs from June 1st through May 31st; therefore, the 2015/16 Brotherhood Fund Year is coming to an end so the party's over (almost).

I am the Brotherhood Fund Chair for Area 15 - Livingston, Wayne and Monroe Districts.

How Did We Do?

The results are in for District participation through January 31st. Out of 65 Districts in New

York State reporting in percentile giving, Wayne ranks 3rd with 26.73%; Livingston is 7th with 18.13%; and Monroe is 38th with 11.46%.

Brotherhood Fund participation is a dichotomy. In my Lodge, Wayne Lodge No. 416 (Wayne District), I have Entered Apprentices who, within the month that they were Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason, participated in the Brotherhood Fund.

On the other end of the spectrum I have Past Masters, who have heard me ask at least 10 times for participation AND received not one. Also mailed two requests for the same, but still no response.

If you were at the beach and heard cries for 'help,' would you wait for ten cries for help and two requests by mail before responding?

It seems to me that Brotherhood Fund participants are in a minority these days and I think our unsung heroes deserve recognition.

Since it is the practice of the Fraternity to acknowledge Brothers who have made the extra effort in certain things, certificates for *Road to the East, Masonic Development Courses*, etc., I'm suggesting a Brotherhood Fund 'Hall of Fame' Award listing all Brothers who have participated in the Brotherhood Fund, and the award hung in the Lodge meeting room in a conspicuous place. This 'prestigious award' needs to be made up by each Lodge's Brotherhood Fund Chairman and perhaps with their own award symbol ideas.

Don't be bashful on the size of this 'Hall of Fame' Award. I'm using three horizontal sheets - the first of which contains the title, 'Hall of Fame Award;' the

second - all the names of participating Brothers; and lastly the third with your own name and contact information. Each sheet should have maximum size print and be prominently displayed in your Lodge. For more information, contact me by email:

It is Spring, and grey squir-

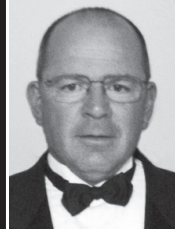

the individual Lodge level, most Lodges in Wayne District have already begun this months ago.

For my Home Lodge, there really is no Election of Officers. The Brothers toss around names over coffee from January to May and then have a secret ballot for the single Brother we agree to nominate for each elected position, excluding our Brother Secretary.

(The election of Secretaries in all Lodges falls under an unwritten law within the Constitutions. If he survives his first year of accepting the position he becomes irreplaceable and, in time a Pillar of the Lodge, more priceless than the Master or Wardens).

Basically, the same process happens for Appointed Officers. When the Master-Elect realizes he is moving to the East, he asks a Brother if he wants to take a Chair. Sometimes it's "Sure. Okay. I'll do it." Sometimes it's "Heck No!!" That's kinda the process until May for each of the Appointed Chairs and sometimes Elected positions.

him the kind, generous, patient and likeable guy that he was.

I remember after each of my Degrees, like a smart-aleck son, I would ask him some of the Q&As to see if he knew the answers. He did. I especially liked to ask him the question "Where did you first become a Mason?" I love the answer to that question. He knew it. This was a man who had been Raised about 60 years previously at the time, and had his journey through the Chairs interrupted after his Senior Warden Year, because his job had transferred him to Rochester from Philadelphia. His being at each of my Degrees and Raising me in the Northeast Corner of Northfield Lodge will forever be a memory I will cherish.

Our Craft teaches us beautiful lessons which each of us would do well to take to heart. The symbolism and allegory of our Degrees provide a lifetime of meaningfulness to contemplate as we experience life's unfolding.


However, being a regular attendee at Lodge or a member of every Masonic Body one can join, does not necessarily make one a good Mason. There are no doubt Brothers who haven't been to Lodge in many years, yet who are phenomenal Masons because they live Masonry in the manner in which they conduct their lives outside of the Lodge Room.

They practice the four Cardinal Virtues and the three principal Tenets of our profession. They live daily with a deep understanding of the teachings of our Craft, which are witnessed in the way they treat their fellow man. This is the lesson I learned from my Dad. These are the Masonic gifts my father has given to me and my connection to him will be eternal through our mystic Brotherhood. So mote it be!!!

I had this article by Jim Ker-shaw sent to me. I shortened it a bit to fit this paper and I think you will enjoy it.

Who needs the Ritual? "We Do."

To explain why it takes a little longer, in a real sense, it is the Ritual of Masonry which makes Masonry WORK. Ritual is the channel through which Masonry teaches. But it is more than that. Because Ritual is so important to Masonry, it's worth taking a little time to talk about the nature of the ritual itself and why it is central to the Masonic experience.

All of us engage in ritual all the time ... we just don't recognize it. Most of us have a morning routine; for example, some of us shave before showering,

some of us shave after we shower, and some while we shower. Most of us shake hands when we are introduced; or recognize the Pledging Allegiance to the Flag is a ritual; and bowing the head during prayer is a ritual.

Why is This?

Ritual gives us a framework to organize events. We don't deal with chaos. We make lists of things to do, to buy, to read. Ritual does the same thing for us. By doing things in a given order (which is the essence of ritual), we make sure everything gets done.

Ritual helps us in our relationship to others; ritual is a powerful teaching tool; ritual gives us a sense of identity; ritual helps us prepare, helps us "get in the mood," for what is to follow.

The Ritual of Masonry involves all the above points and more; the Opening and Closing, the Degrees, even the Ritual of voting organizes the events and makes sure that everything happens that is supposed to. It helps us define ourselves as Masons and strengthens the Fraternal ties which bind us together as Brothers. That effect is international and cross-cultural. We know when we have shared experiences with Masons from all over the world.

Masonic Ritual gives full range to Masons to explore their own interests. Masonic Ritual is large enough and complex enough to accommodate all those interests - and many more.

So, again, "Who needs Ritual anyway?"

"We all do." The Ritual of Masonry meets many needs and many interests. It is a primary way we teach and learn. It is the GLUE which holds us together. It is important. It makes us, US. □

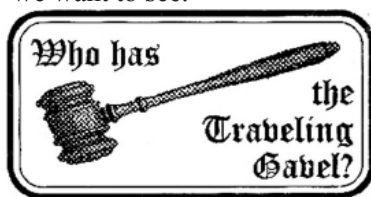

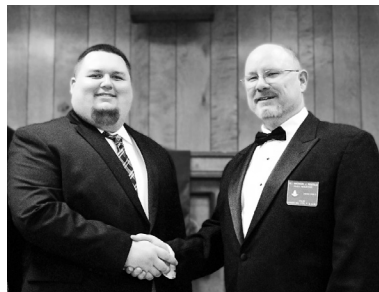

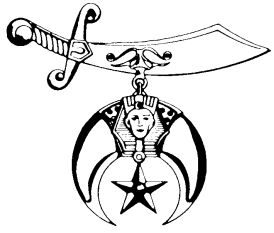

Early Intervention Services An Important Support for Children with Special Needs

Among the services available to children with delayed development, Early Intervention (EI) remains among the most important and the most accessible to families.

Early Intervention is an integrated developmental resource for children up to three years of age, which serves children who have either identified departures from normal development or whose development is considered to be at risk due to certain birth or environmental influences. This is often the simplest and most efficient way to enter a world of support services that can help a child for the first three years of his or her life.



Because these services can be accessed for a child as young as one day of age, families are assured that not only will their own medical home/primary care provider monitor their progress, but direct services – including speech, physical and occupational therapy, as well as nursing, social work and developmental psychology – can follow the child until he or she transitions to pre-Kindergarten. It is also a program which has repeatedly been shown to improve outcomes in measurable ways for a variety of conditions.

Key to the Program's design is the provision that children are seen regularly in their own "natural settings;" i.e., at home, in childcare centers and community play groups. The EI workers are partners in a child's care and may often accompany them to various medical clinic visits. Most important, the EI Team will take the lead in every case to help the child and family make an informed transition to school, participating in the development of the child's Individual Educational Plan (IEP).

Referrals to the EI Program can be made by anyone – a parent, doctor, caregiver, teacher or friend – by calling a central referral line at 1-800-905-8437. From there, it follows a set of assessments in the child's home, including basic developmental screening with testing tools that are validated and State-approved, along with clinical evaluation to determine if and how services can be arranged.

Dr. Kaplan leads the Pediatric Consultation Clinic at Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Springfield, which provides evaluation and ongoing care of children with a range of disabilities served by the hospital. Dr. Kaplan's major focus is caring for children with complex multi-system disorders, in particular those conditions that have an impact on overall development and result in difficulties with movement, balance, coordination, muscle tone/weakness or delayed developmental milestones. Among other responsibilities, he helps children and families navigate an array of medical and community services - including early intervention discussed above - and helps medical home/primary care providers follow these patients and stay informed of their progress.

The Kollect System A Customizable Video-Gaming Experience

Maggie O'Neill, PT, PhD, MPH, along with colleagues at Drexel University, has created enAble games - Kollect Active Video Games which promote physical activity in youth with disabilities.

Children with Cerebral Palsy (CP) encounter personal, social, environmental and program-related barriers that limit their ability to be involved in organized physical activities in the school and community. The Kollect System is intended to offer active video gaming to persons with physical disabilities, such as CP, to promote fitness, functional mobility and confidence. Because Kollect uses, the Xbox 360 Kinect System, it uses a basic motion-capture camera to drive motion in the game using body movements without a controller.

Commercial active video gaming devices are not currently customizable to direct therapeutic goals or patient abilities. They are typically much too challenging. This system allows therapists to determine whether one or both hands, feet, or hands and feet are used to interact with the game and to control the extent of reach needed and speed with which objects and hazards appear.

The theme of the games, with a variety of scenarios, is also customizable. "Cosmic Kitties" is one of the most popular.

Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Springfield is currently using this advanced technology as one of many exercise stations during its after-school B-fit Program for children with developmental disabilities.

EarWells Used to Correct Developmental Abnormality

About 30 percent of newborn babies may have a developmental abnormality of the shaping of their ears. Fortunately, in many cases this can be corrected if treatment is started within the first month of life. This is because a newborn continues to carry its mother's estrogen for about three months. After this time, the estrogen is gone and cartilage becomes stiff and not amenable to change.

At Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Springfield, our non-surgical approach to correct this condition is to mold the patient's ear with an EarWell. The EarWell is worn for five to six weeks and gradually changes the shape of the ear. The process is tolerated well by young patients and has a good success rate. The

types of abnormalities treated in this way include:

- Protruding ear (more than 10 mm from scalp)
- Lack of an antihelix rim
- Folding of the helix rim (lidding or cup ear)
- Conchal crus

Don't be a "Just Belong" 32° Mason

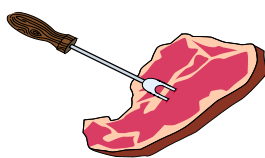

What's Happening

The Cast was mostly Companions of the Chapter, but we had help from other Companions, namely Companion Jim MacConnell, who was the Principal Sojourner for the Degree. We hope our new Royal Arch Companions enjoyed the presentation of the Degree and learned a little more about the York Rite and its teachings.

The visit of our District Deputy Grand High Priest, R.:E.:

Fred Newton was scheduled for our April 28th meeting. We hope our Companions came out to hear R.:E.: Newton deliver the Grand High Priest's Message for the year.

Our meetings on **May 12th and 26th** will include portions of the Grand Chapter's Courses on the Degrees. We feel that our Companions will gain more knowledge of the Degrees and their meanings through directed discussion and information delivered through the course material.

Your High Priest was unable to attend the Capstone Course presented by V.:E.: Jamie Kaim, our Assistant Grand Lecturer, on April 11th due to other Masonic commitments. We are confident that V.:E.: Jamie presented the Course well and the attendees learned much about how to evaluate and run a Chapter and more.

The Capstone Course is similar to the Grand Lodge *Road to the East* Course, covering some of the same topics, but has more emphasis on Chapter workings and how to determine the state of

a Chapter and methodology for improving a Chapter.

Coming this Summer will be our Annual York Rite Picnic. This year we have decided not to hold it in June as we usually do because there are too many Masonic and other conflicts. Therefore, we have scheduled the picnic for **Thursday, July 7th** at Kings Bend Park. Details will be given in the June **Masonic Times** article and communicated to the Companions by email and PhoneVite.

Oh, speaking of our use of the PhoneVite System, it appears to be working well in keeping the Companions informed of Convocation Programs and other events. It is a good system of getting the word out to our Companions. If a Companion has not received the phone calls, please contact the High Priest or Secretary and verify that we have a valid phone number, cell or land line.

Musings

It is interesting to note that the Chapter Degrees are very closely aligned with the Lodge Degrees.

The Degrees contain a ceremonial section and an allegorical section, just like the Lodge Degrees. The wording of some parts of the Ceremonial Section of the Degrees is very close and, in some cases, identical to the wording used in the Lodge Degrees.

Why is this? My thinking is that the Royal Arch Degrees were developed as an extension to the Lodge Master Mason Degree and as such used the same formula. As these Degrees were developed when the Lodge Ritual was being firmed up by the Grand Lodges in England and then carried over here, it makes sense that the formula and wording would match where similar portions of the work were being done. Our Rituals for the Lodge and Chapter were developed by Masons who had a great understanding of language and how compact the language can be when presenting information.

Our Ritual still uses the Standard Bible version of King James, in its work. The passages use the language of the time of King James in England. Now, is this language still understandable by the 21st Century Mason? It

can be, but it takes careful listening and personal interpretation to grasp the full meaning of the passages used in the Degrees. This can lead to the Companion learning some very important moral lessons.

Should the Ritual use more modern Bible translations in its work? It could, but it would take a group of very well-read and knowledgeable Companions to pick the translation that would cause the general Companions to understand the lesson the way it was originally intended.

Oh, and there are many modern English versions of the Bible that are translations from original sources and picking one is not a simple task; ask any Pastor. When our Rituals were being developed the King James Version was the only standard English Version that was translated from the known originals at the time. Therefore, it made sense to use that version in our Ritual.

Well, we have given you something to think about as we proceed into Summer, even though there is snow on the ground as I write this and the temperature is more like January than April. ☐

Part IV

Admission to the Order

Before one could be considered for admission into the Order, he had to meet a number of preconditions. Among them, a man had to be in good health, not married or indebted, without any obligations and not bound by any other Order, and willing to accept becoming a slave and servant of the Order.

The Initiation Ceremony was held in a domed chamber resembling the "church of the Holy Sepulchre" and was to be conducted in absolute secrecy. Just as in Freemasonry centuries later, esoteric Rituals had to be performed during this Ceremony.

In the Order's rule of 1128 about the Initiation Ceremony, the Master would address the congregated Brothers of the Order with: "Dear Brothers, some of you have proposed that Mr. X may be admitted to the Order; if any of you know any reason to oppose his Initiation, say so now."

If no word of opposition is spoken, the Candidate will be led to the adjoining chamber of the Temple. In this chamber, the Candidate is visited by three of the

most senior Brothers, told of the difficulties and hardship awaiting him if he is admitted to the Order and then asked whether he still wishes to be admitted. If his answer is affirmative, he is asked whether he is married or engaged to be married, has links to other Orders, is indebted to anyone, is of good health and whether or not he is a slave.

If his answer to these questions complied with the requirements of the Order, the senior Brothers would return to the Temple and say, "We told the Candidate of all the hardships awaiting him and our conditions of admission, but he is insistent on becoming a slave of the Order."

Before being re-admitted into the Temple, the Candidate is again asked whether he still insists on being admitted. If he still answers yes, the Grand Master addresses the Candidate, "Brother, you are asking much of us. You have seen only the façade of the Order, and you hope to acquire pureblood horses, honorable neighbors, good food and nice garments. But are you aware of how hard our conditions really are?"

Proceeding to list the difficulties awaiting the Candidate, he continues: "You must not seek admittance for wealth, nor for status."

If the Candidate agrees, he is again led out of the Temple. The Grand Master then asks the Brothers whether they have anything to say about the Candidate. If there is nothing said against him, he is brought back, made to kneel down, and given the Bible. He is asked if he is married. If he answers no, the oldest or most senior in the congregation is asked, "Have any questions that need to be asked been forgotten?"

If the answer is no, the Candidate is asked to swear an oath that he will remain loyal to the Order and his Brothers until the day he dies, and that he will not reveal to the outside world a word that is spoken in the Temple. After he has sworn the oath, the Grand Master kisses the new Brother on the lips (from other sources,

on the neck and belly). He then is given a Templar mantle and a woven belt, which is never to be taken off.

Templar as Financiers and Traders

Templars were expert financiers and using trading techniques quite unknown in the Europe of their day. They had clearly learned many of these skills from Jewish sources, but would have much more freedom to extend their financial empire, in a way that any Jewish financier of the period would have envied greatly.

Even though usury was forbidden, they weren't afraid to lend money on interest. The Templars had acquired such wealth – and the power that came with it – that nobody dared speak out against them or do anything about it.

This so went to their heads that they went out of control. They were disobedient to Kings and the Pope and, in some cases, even challenged their authority.

In 1303, for example, few years before their Order was liquidated, they refused a request for assistance from the French King Philip IV, as well as his later request in 1306 for the Templars' Order to merge with the Hospitalers.

Travel could be a hazardous enterprise in the 12th Century. En route, wayfarers could be

robbed by bandits anywhere and anytime. Transporting money, as well as other precious commodities essential for trade, was particularly risky.

Out of this situation, the Templars made a fortune by means of a fairly simple system of banking. For example, if a tradesman wanted to go from London to Paris, first he would go to the Templars' office in London and hand over his money. In return, he was given a paper with an encoded message written on it. On his arrival in Paris, he could hand in this note in exchange for the money he'd paid in London, minus a fee and interest. Thus the transaction was completed.

Along with traders, wealthy pilgrims, too, made use of this system. "Checks" issued by Templars in Europe could be cashed in on arrival in Palestine, minus a hefty interest charge for this service. In "The Temple and the Lodge," co-authors Michael Baigent and Richard Leigh explain the Templars' economic dimension, recording that the beginnings of modern banking can be traced back to them, and that no other organization contributed as much as the Templars to the rise of capitalism.

History records Florentine bankers as having invented

"checking accounts," yet the Templars were using this method of money transfer long before. It is generally accepted that capitalism first arose in the Jewish community of Amsterdam, but long before them, the Templars had established their own medieval capitalism, including banking based on interest. They lent money on interest rates of up to 60% and controlled a major proportion of capital flow and liquidity in the economy of Europe.

Using methods much like those of a modern private bank, they derived profits from both trade and banking, as well as from donations and armed conflict. They became as rich as the multi-national company that, in effect, they were. At one time, the finances of the English and French monarchies were controlled and run by the Templars' respective offices in London and Paris, and both the English and French Royal Families owed the Templars huge amounts of money. The Kings of Europe were literally at their mercy, hoping to borrow money, and most royal households had come to depend on the Order. This let them manipulate the Kings and their national polices for their own purposes. ☐

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The Real Deal

a revolving door of tenants in that space, as we have had three separate businesses (and some temporary renters) in that space over the last decade. The photography studio in the other commercial space had been there since 1993, but was having difficulties.

By late 2012, the corner unit was empty once again and the dramatic changes in the photography business landscape put the photo studio out of business after two decades. We had no tenants, and the path forward was uncertain.

This combination of events finally galvanized the Brothers around the idea that we had to do something. The question was, what?

A good first step was that we agreed to hire a commercial real estate broker to find new tenants – ideally with better lease terms. But what if that didn't work?

We had our first discussion about selling the building. It was emotional and difficult, but we had to acknowledge the facts ... the Lodge only had so many resources to carry the costs of the building if we had no tenants. Brothers began to concede that they might be open to a sale of the building, but only as a LAST resort. Some of us were still willing to go down with the ship if necessary. After all, this was our home, and the thought of leaving it just wasn't acceptable at the time.

Mercifully, the broker worked its magic and we had new tenants with improved lease terms for the Lodge. We could breathe again. Maybe we didn't need to sell the building after all. Or did we?

We took it off the market and went back to business as usual. In hindsight, that could have turned out to be a big mistake, but we got lucky.

We didn't feel very lucky in the beginning of 2015. By March, both tenants advised us that they would not renew their leases, and we reached out to the broker again. Given the turnover that we had experienced in the commercial spaces since 2005, we were starting to feel like we were at a crossroads with the building. Again, we began talking about a potential sale. The conversation was easier this time, in part because we had the conversation already in 2012. Importantly, we were communicating with each other in a constructive way to get everyone on board for whatever path forward presented itself.

Separate from the concerns about the building, Wakan-Hubbard was experiencing some of the issues that plague Lodges around the State:

- 1) Declining membership, as more Brothers were called home by the Great Architect each year than we had joining the Lodge;
 - 2) Sporadic participation, as Brothers increasingly began to choose other activities on Lodge nights; and
 - 3) difficulty retaining young new members, whose family and career obligations made it difficult to come to Lodge.
- Eventually, this can create

difficulties filling the Chairs when a Lodge doesn't have a deep bench of Brothers who are able to commit time to the organization. If the Ritual work begins to falter, this combination of factors can spell the beginning of the end for a Lodge that was once healthy.

The number of Lodges in our Jurisdiction that have succumbed to these pressures over the last many decades is probably too high to count. A large number of those Lodges waited until it was too late to act to salvage the situation. When that happens, although a merger often results, the damage can be so significant that only a few Brothers from the predecessor Lodge remain active. This is a tragic outcome.

Wakan-Hubbard clearly faces some of those challenges, as I know many other Lodges do. We have a full complement of Officers, although there are more than a few Past Masters in the Officers' Chairs now.

We still get Brothers out to meetings, but it is a challenge sometimes and we seem to be a stubborn adherent to the 10% rule – that 10% of the members of the organization are regularly at meetings (except, of course, for Degree nights when it can be 15% to 20%). We can still do our own Degrees fairly well, including all of the Lectures, but we are starting to see fewer and fewer new faces in those roles. Any Brother in the District who has visited our Lodge in the last several years knows these things to be true.

This confluence of events began a thoughtful conversation in early 2015. The solution was both simple, and complex, at the same time.

The simple part was that we acknowledged the need to find a constructive way forward with our Masonic Program and our building before it was "too late." The more difficult part was what exactly that meant. I applaud my Brothers for being willing to have that conversation, with an open mind to potential outcomes that may have been inconceivable just months before, and finding a constructive way forward.

As to the building, we all agreed that it could be advantageous to sell the building if the option presented itself at a reasonable price.

Given the recent history, this appeared to be preferable over finding new tenants. As building owners, we found that the Lodge spent an inordinate amount of meeting time dealing with issues related to the building. We asked ourselves some important questions:

Given the situation, wouldn't it be nice to just focus on Masonry, and not be building owners? Further, wouldn't it be great to have some more financial stability? It was still not a slam dunk decision, but consensus was gathering that a sale might be the best way forward. Our thought process had evolved significantly since 2012, when a sale was unthinkable to many Brothers.

As to the Masonic Program, we finally decided it was time to reach out to another Lodge. Again, this was a difficult deci-

sion. Some Brothers get twitchy when you use the "M" word, because everyone has heard stories (or experienced) mergers which have been challenging.

Even so, reaching out could be a big plus all around and, if nothing else, we might find help just to do things better. We decided there was no upside in waiting and reached out to ERAC Lodge.

Our Lodges are geographically close, and have the same meeting times. Some things they are good at overlap areas where we could use a hand up. We are currently doing some joint events together, and will have done two joint Degrees by the time this is published. The fellowship has been joyful, and invigorating for Wakan-Hubbard. We greatly appreciate their willingness to work with us. We look forward to continuing down the path, and will see where it goes.

Speaking of where it goes, where would we go if we found a buyer for the building? The Webster Masonic Temple was an obvious choice for a variety of reasons.

The Trustees of Webster Lodge were open to a dialogue, which was also made easier because we explored renting from Webster in 2012 when it was unclear whether or not we would find new tenants. Our constructive dialogue with Webster Lodge, and their willingness to work with us through this process to find solutions that benefitted everyone, is greatly appreciated. They made it much easier for us to make a decision concerning a potential sale of the building—we had a viable option for a new home.

As you know, we ultimately did find a buyer in November and the sale of the building closed on April 6, 2016.

What a busy few months! We rented a dumpster, and removed over three tons of stuff from the building in January over the course of two weekends. We also started packing in January, and our Regular Communication in early February turned into a work night also. A big thank you to all the Brothers at Wakan-Hubbard who helped out, including Don Bell, John Rees, John Zabel, Roger Lynch, Thomson Chew, Allen Heidrick, Tom Ward, Peter Derry, Rob Russo, Carey Hollis, Dean Sisson, John Parcon, Al Downs, Chris Fox, Mike DiCataldo, Scott Blystone and Eugene MacNeal. Apologies if I missed anyone!

A special thanks to Tom Ward, our Building Committee Chair, for facilitating all of this activity and the hard work he has done in that capacity to make this happen.

We moved out of the Lodge Building to Webster Lodge on Sunday, March 13, 2016. What a great day of fellowship and support! We reached out to ERAC and Webster Lodges for assistance and had a number of Brothers come out to help with the move in addition to most of the Brothers above from Wakan-Hubbard.

Brother Jim MacDuff joined us from ERAC. We had a number of Brothers join us from Webster Lodge, including Chris Loftus, Dave Aleksandrowicz, John Ross, Grant Kothiringer, Bill Gross, Jeremy Knox, Ron Sobtzick, Al Borrino, and Jim Clancy.

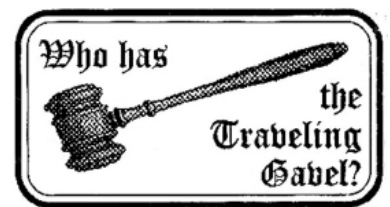
