## Grand Lodge to Promote Youth Committee Activities

BOYS' CAMP

invite each district of the State of New York to send one boy to Round Lake Camp for a period of two weeks. There were a few districts which did not take advantage of this opportunity and we were obliged to make last minute changes allowing some districts to send two boys. This year we will have accommodations for 120 boys for two camping periods for 60 boys each. In order to comply strictly with the ACTS OF INCORPORATION of the Trustees, the boys must be children or orphans of Masons and the purpose of the camp is for the education of and recreation for those boys. The boys must be between the ages of 14 and 15 inclusive. Inasmuch as it is our aim to prepare a program at camp which will assist these boys in selecting a lifetime career, we recommend that particular emphasis be placed upon the boys' scholastic standing. It will be noted that with accommodations for 120 boys, we will be able to take more than one boy from many districts and we recommend that each district select one boy and an alternate. The districts first submitting the names of acceptable boys will have preference in the determination as to which district will be permitted to send two boys. Our camp will open for the first period on July 12, 1964, the first meal being the evening meal on that date. These boys will depart on July 25 and the second division will be received on July 26, and those boys will depart on August 8.

### ESSAY CONTEST

There will be another essay contest this year to determine the winner of the "Frank M. Totton Annual Award." It is open to sons and daughters, grandsons and granddaughters of Masons only, who are high school seniors. Inasmuch as the contestants must be descendants of Masons, announcement of this contest later than February 1, 1964. cannot be made in public schools, and it is suggested portant than preserving Dethat the Secretary of each lodge be directed to give notice of this contest to all members of his lodge. First prize will be \$500.00; second prize \$300.00, and third to teach our young people the prize \$200.00. The young people should be directed to send their essays to the lodge to which their father or grandfather belongs. The Master is requested to appoint a committee to examine these essays and select the three which they consider the best of all submitted. These three should be sent to the Chairman of the Masonic Youth Committee and the full committee will pass upon and determine the winners. Entries should be in the hands of the lodges not later than January 10, 1964, and the three selected should be in

the hands of the Youth Com-Last year we were able to mittee within tendays thereafter. The subject of the essay (which shall contain not exceeding three hundred words) will be: "Democracy's Challenge to Communism.

No award will be made except to those who have been accepted in a seminary, accredited college, or university, or a theological seminary, or a school of nursing which in the judgment of the Committee, are accredited institutions.

### GENERAL YOUTH WORK

A limited number of certificates of recognition will be presented to the lodges which in the judgment of the Committee, have had the best youth program during the Masonic year. In order to become entitled to these certificates, the secretary of the lodge or the Chairman of the Youth Committee will be required to submit a report to the Youth Committee setting forth in detail what the lodge has done for young people during the past year.

We suggest, as we have in previous years, the Youth meetings be held in the lodge rooms, that the lodges have father and son, father and daughter, or family dinners to which the youngsters are invited. We hope that many lodges will be sponsoring DeMolay Chapters and that other organizations for young men and young women will be organized and supported. Many lodges have found that Talent Scout meetings are interesting and profitable. Press clippings showing the activity of the lodge in youth affairs attached to the report will be helpful.

If lodges find it difficult to sponsor youth meetings, and district meetings are held in which all the lodges in the district participate, recognition will be given to those districts.



Correction. In the October issue, the question was discussed whether a Canadian Lodge visiting a Lodge in our Grand Jurisdiction may confer a degree on a candidate of the New York Lodge according to their ritual, or whether they should bring their own candidate. The answer given was that a visiting Lodge when conferring a degree in New York, whether upon a candidate of the Lodge being visited, or upon their own candidate, are merely substituting for the regular offices of the Lodge. They must, therefore, follow the New York State ritual, and none other (Handbook, Sec-

Inadvertently in printing, the last paragraph of the answer was omitted, as follows: It is, of course, permissible for any group of officers from a visiting Lodge from another Grand Jurisdiction, to exemplify their work upon an "ex-emplar" a so-called "dummy candidate," as this would be classed as an educational or informative meeting.

Q. We have a Petition for Affiliation from a brother who has just moved in from another state where he is a member in good standing. Is a Waiver of Jurisdiction necessary?

A. A member in good standing of any Lodge from any Grand Jurisdiction with which we are in fraternal relations, may present a petition to any Lodge in our Jurisdiction. This applies even if the brother is still a resident of another Grand Jurisdiction. Such a petition takes the regular course of referral to a committee and election by unanimous ballot. (Const. Section 348, Handbook Sect. 505). If the brother desired to withdraw from his original Lodge, he must secure a certificate from that Lodge stating that he has been regularly discharged from membership, before he can sign the by-laws of the new Lodge. If he desired to retain his membership in his original Lodge, and his original Grand Lodge permits membership in more than one Lodge, he may become a member of the Second Lodge immediately on signing its by-laws (Handbook, Sections 577,



Q. We have a by-law which states that a brother who owes dues for two years shall be summoned on November 1st and if he fails to pay, may be unaffili-ated at the annual election in December. Is this correct procedure?

A. On the subject of "unaf-filiation," the Book of Constitutions (Section 367) states that a Lodge may provide a penalty for non-payment of dues of "unaffiliation, but such penalty shall not be inflicted except the brother is in arrears one year for dues". The Handbook of Masonic Law (Section 685) clarifies that "arrears one year" refers to "The duration of the delinquency". A case was presented to the Grand Master in 1941 from Central City Lodge, 305, Syracuse. The ruling, approved the following year by Grand Lodge, was that unaffiliation on December 18, 1934 for non-payment of dues for 1933 and 1934 was improper, since on that date the brother was not yet one year in arrears. In terms of 1963, this means that unaffiliation at the annual meeting in December must be for those owing dues prior to 1962.

Q. When and where was the Lodge of the Holy St. John of Jerusalem?

A. Masonry speaks in symbolic language. There was no such lodge in Jerusalem in ancient days, because Freemasonry did not exist prior to the Middle Ages. Masonic tradition or legend accepted apparently by the operative Masons was that the first, or primitive Lodge of Freemasonry was held at Jerusalem and was dedicated to St. John the Baptist. He therefore became the Patron Saint of many Lodges. Others, however, selected John the Evangelist as the Patron Saint. This mythical Lodge in Jerusalem was designated The Lodge of the Holy Saint John of Jerusalem." From this legendary Lodge, all other legitimate Lodges are supposed to have descended. in the 18th century, most lodges had no names, only numbers, and were referred to as St. John's lodges, meaning that they were regular and legitimate, and worked the three degrees of Craft Masonry. Many lodges later took the name, St. John's Lodge, and to-day there is hardly a Grand Jurisdiction that does not have one or more named

St. John's. The meaning of the phrase "from a Lodge of the Holy St. John of Jer-usalem", is "from a legi-timate Lodge which conferred the initiatory degree upon me in regular form".




