Q. I am a life member of my lodge, why do I get a bill for annual dues?

A. The Handbook of Masonic "a Lodge in its by-laws may, its by-laws. upon such terms. as it O. How old i deems fit, create life or privileged members by absolving them from further payment of dues or by reducing the amount to be paid..." The only restriction imposed by Grand Lodge Consitutions (Section 319) is that the annual dues cannot that the annual dues cannot be less than the sum required to be paid by the Lodge to Grand Lodge per each of its members which at the present time is \$3.65.

It is thus left to each particular Lodge to determine

ticular Lodge to determine for itself whether it desires to make provision for such life or privileged membership and upon what terms. The only requirement that Grand Lodge makes is that it shall apply to all members in the same general class alike, and the privilege, when earned, must come automatically to all brothers entering that class, Grand Lodge of England was ent upon the report of an investigating committee or the approval of any number of officers or brethren or upon a vote of the Lodge.

Hence, a Lodge may provide that after paying dues for a fixed number of years, a brother becomes a life member and his dues reduced to a specified amount, which might be the Grand Lodge per capita, has been fulfilled the broth-

Q. How old is Freemasonry? A. No one knows. Dozens of books and pamphlets have been written claiming to establish a definite date and place when Masonry was organized. No basis in fact exists to substantiate any of these claims.

The earliest historical record of Freemasonry is a document in the British Museum called the Regius Poem or the Halliwell manuscript, written about 1390, or nearly six centuries ago. It speaks of Masonry as an old institution. How old, we do not know. It should be pointed out that the Freemasons of that period were actual builders, skilled craftsmen who erected cathedrals and castles, and who also organized themselves into Ma-

organized in London. By that time, all connection with building labors had been severed. Its members had become builders in a symbolic sense, builders of a Temple of Brotherhood, founded on righteousness and morality.

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





YONNONDIO'S HISTORY OCHESTER



The old Chappell Block on the site of the present Wilder Building at Main and Exchange Streets.

In the nearly one hundred and twelve years of Yonnondio history it has had five regularly established meeting places. The present temple has now attained the honor of having the longest

First of these was known s the Burns Block, located on the northeast corner of Main and State streets, the site of which has been occupied by the Elwood Building since about 1870. The George Eastman House of Photography has in it possession a very valuable daguereotype of a scene taken in "1851 or 1852."

Anyway, this picture shows a partial side view of what is without question the Burns Block. This appears to be a five-story business block built of stone, undoubtedly the Lockport dolomite, perhaps quarried from the riverbed just south of Main St. This is the stone used for the foundation material for just about every house and building in Rochester until the development of the concrete block about the beginning of the present century.

We trace the Traders Bank as being organized as a state bank in 1852 but not getting a National Bank charter until 1865. The sign on building gives the name as Traders National Bank thus dating the photo as after 1865.

But the Business University does not appear in the directories until the early eighties, thus dating the photo as later still. But not later than 1888 for then we begin to hear of the "modern" Wilder Building, housing the Central Bank (now Central Trust Company).
