The Masonic Service Bureau which, through its contacts with all the lodges early saw the need for such a publication and which in talks with Brothers and other interested parties was perhaps best able to get the project under way will continue as the central clearing office for news and as headquarters office to whom editorial staff and publication committees will report.

The success of the publication, of course, depends upon two things: READER-SHIP and EDITORIAL SUP-PORT by all members of the craft and FINANCIAL SUPPORT of the advertis-

It is anticipated that we'll have no trouble in securing one hundred percent cooperation by all Masonic organizations in extending sub-scriptions to their total membership at a total cost of thirty cents per member per year for all ten issues. It becomes a very small price to pay for a publication which not only informs the members of their particular lodge of the coming schedule of events, but also enables every Mason to see what every other lodge and every other member is do-

As in any publication of this nature, it's names that make news and Monroe Masonic News must depend upon the reporter appointed by the lodge for submission on time of the news items of interest to their members and to all members of the Craft. A PRIMER OF FREEMASONRY R.W. HERMAN SARACHAN

1. What is Freemasonry? Freemasonry is afraternal organization of men of good character and reputation. who believe in God, who are devoted to the principles of friendship and of fellowship, and dedicated to love of country, and to the service of mankind.

2. Is Freemasonry a secret

society? Freemasonry is not a secret society in the sense in which that term is understood. A secret society is an organization which hides its aims, its purposes and its membership; and is often engaged in some political movement, or some anti-social plot. In contrast, members of the Masonic fraternity often wear a ring, a pin or some other indication of their membership. Notices of meetings of Masonic bodies, rosters of their officers, names and photographs of their leaders, are published in the daily press. The transactions of the Annual Convention of the Grand Lodge are printed and distributed throughout the state, and contains all the names of the Grand Lodge officers, members of the various standing and special committees, and masters and secretaries of the more than a thousand lodges in the state. 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### THE MONROE MASONIC NEWS

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#### PRIMER, Cont'd.

Masons were acual builders, who erected cathedrals and castles. These builders organized themselves into Masonic lodges, for sociability and mutual benefit, and to inculcate moral precepts among their members. It was natural for them to use the tools which they employed in their work, to symbolize moral lessons. When Modern Masonry, its direct descendent, was organized in 1717 it continued to use the builders' tools to represent moral and ethical principles.

8. What are some of these principles?

The apron teaches a Mason that he is a builder, not of a material edifice, but of a spiritual temple, a temple of human brotherhood. The Square teaches him that he must treat all human beings "on the square", i.e. by the golden rule; the plumb that he must live an upright life; and the level, that all men are equal as children of God.

9. Does Masonry offer any material benefits?

It offers no death benefits, cemetery lots, sickness insurance or hospitalization. One of its basic principles, however, is to extend aid to a needy brother and to his family. The Grand Lodge of New York maintains a Masonic Home, Hospital and infirmary at Utica which takes care of indigent Masons, their wives, widows, and orphans. Masons and their families outside the Home who are in need are given direct aid by their Lodge, with the Assistance of Grand Lodge through its Committee on Benevolence. 10. If not material benefits, what does Masonry offer its members?

A. It draws together men of good will and reputation into fellowship and sociabil-

b. It gives them the opportunity to take part in the work of the lodge by serving on committees and as lodge officers.

c. It enables them to participate in social and recreational activities; bowling leagues and tournaments. fishing contests, golf tourn-aments, banquets, ladies' night parties, Christmas Parties and summer picnics.

international organization? There is no national or international Masonic organization. Each state in the United States constitutes an be paid for through the sale independent Grand Lodge. There are fifty Grand Lodges in this country, nine in Canada, and forty-seven others throughout the world which our Grand Lodge recognize as legitimate. Each of these Grand Lodges is an independent sovereign body. All maintain fraternal relations with one another through accredited representatives. 13. How is Masonry organ-

ized in this state? Each individual lodge in the state holds a charter from the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, which through its Constitutions, maintains certain controls over ritual, law, and procedure. The individual lodge is governed by the Constitutions of Grand Lodge and its own by-laws. It elects its officers annually, at the head of which is a Master, assisted by Wardens, and within certain limitations controls its own finances. All lodges in the state (1062 in 1962) through their representatives constitute the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, adopt its laws, and elect its Grand Lodge Officers, at the head of which is the Grand Master. Royal Arch Masonry has had a part in the Masonic Tradition since its early days. Records show that as far back as 1740 in York, England the title of Royal Arch Mason was known.

The earliest know account of a Royal Arch Degree actually worked is in our own country. In the minutes of Fredericksburg Lodge of Virginia is an entry that on the night of December 22, 1753 three men were raised to the degree of Royal Arch Mason. Three months earlier George Washington was raised a Master Mason in this same Lodge.
The Royal Arch Degree

probably came to New York through the activities of the Military Lodges in the Regim nts of the British Army. In June of 1759 the Degree was being conferred by a Lodge in the City of New
