Dear Brother Herman

Q. I received a notice that I have been unaffiliated. Does this mean that I have been expelled from membership? Is there any way for me to get back into Masonry?

A. Unaffiliation is very different from expulsion, which is the most severe of the three penalties which may be exacted under Masonic Law. The others are suspension or reprimand. These penalties may not be imposed by any individual Lodge, but only by Grand Lodge following complaint to the Grand Master of unmasonic conduct. If the Grand Master entertains the charge, he appoints a Trial Commission before whom a trial is conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Procedure. If the defendant is found "guilty," he may be expelled, which is mandatory for certain offenses, or he may be suspended or merely reprimanded. An expelled member may petition Grand Lodge for restoration, after fulfilling certain requirements, and may be restored to the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by vote of Grand Lodge at the Annual Communication.

Unaffiliation means simply removal from the active rolls of the Lodge, and is the penalty which a Lodge may impose upon a member for non-payment of dues. Its purpose is to relieve the Lodge of the financial burden of continuing to pay Grand Lodge per capita dues and other per capita charges.

Before a brother can be unaffiliated, he must be sum-moned at least thirty days prior to the regular communication at which action will be taken. If he fails to respond, he may then be unaffiliated by a majority vote of the Lodge.

The unaffiliate may clear his record at any time by paying the amount owing at the time of unaffiliation. He vill then secure a dimit or learance certificate making im a non-affiliate, or he nay request his Lodge for

restoration to membership. If it is within five years after unaffiliation, he may be restored by show of hands and a majority vote. After five years a unanimous ballot is necessary. No additional charges may be imposed upon the brother for restoration, except the current year's dues.

It should be noted that unaffiliation is likewise advantageous for the brother himself. It limits his indebtedness to the amount of dues owing at the time of unaffiliation.

Q. Why cannot a colored man become a Mason?

A. There is nothing in our Masonic Law which places any restriction upon an applicant for membership on account of race, creed or color. We require that he express a belief in a Supreme Being, and in the immortality of the soul, and that he be a man, over twenty-one, and "well recommended."

Any individual who conforms to these requirements, - be he white or black or brown or red, - has the right to petition any Lodge, and the individual Lodge, through the ballot, accepts or rejects.

Incidentally, there are colored men who are members of Lodges which we recognize as legitimate. The Grand Lodge of New Jersey and the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, each have a Lodge on their roster consisting entirely of colored brethren.

Q. Which Justices of the United States Supreme Court are Masons?

A. Chief Justice Earl Warren, and Associate Justices Hugo L. Black, Tom C. Clark, William O. Douglas and Potter Stewart.

Bro. Tom Clark, who is a member of a Lodge in Texas, was honored at the Grand Lodge meeting on May 8th. He received the 1963 Grand Master's DistinguishedService Award.

Q. Which is correct, "agreeable" or "agreeably?"

A. The word "agreeable" means "pleasing to the senses," "suitable." This is not the meaning which we desire to convey. The correct word is "agreeably," meaning "in accordance with."

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

But for the grace of God it could be you. It could be your brother or some other loved one.

It is estimated that there are five million alcoholics in the United States. These five million alcoholics affect the lives of twenty million people. It is no wonder the medical profession and our government are doing research on this problem which has been recognized as a sickness and a disease. It strikes at men and women alike. It has no respect for worldly position. It breaks up homes. It causes juvenile delinquency. It causes crime and in many cases, mental, physical, and spiritual de-struction and sometimes even death. It costs industry hundreds of millions of dollars in loss of work and accidents.

This article is written by a man who learned the above facts through his problem with alcohol and by studying articles written by men who are making a careful study of this problem.

To many people, one who drinks excessively is just a person with no will power or one who does not know when to stop drinking. The sad truth is that when an alcoholic takes a drink, he can't stop. It seems to set off a chain action in his system that can only be satisfied by another drink. This is a progressive disease and cannot be cured, but it can be arrested. It is not easy to do, but many alcoholics have, and are still living a normal life, a day at a time. They have learned that they can only live by not taking the first drink.

The steps are not easy, but the rewards are great. The person must first admit that he or she is an alcoholic and that his life is unmanageable. He must believe that a power greater than himself will help him and be willing to turn his life over to the care of God as he may understand him. The method is to live a day at a time.

This is written by an alcoholic who by the grace of God has tried to live to the best of his ability according to the rules, a day at a time, and has managed to go nearly five years without a drink. And who has faith that by the grace of God he will continue until the day he will hear "Well done, good and faithful servant. Enter thou unto the joy of the Lord".

The road is rough at times, but from a man who knows, the rewards are great. The rewards:- An inner feeling of serenity that words cannot describe. The understanding that comes of talking to a person who is sicker than you, and being in a position to help and encourage him to control his disease.

How do I feel, being an alcoholic? I have been blessed because I am thankful for many days of life and (Cont'd on page 8)

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ROCHESTER CONSISTORY'S PROJECTED BOOKS



Louise Wilson, Valentine Malaggese, Elbert J. Seigfred

Two visits to the bedside of "Val" Malaggese, allowed Louise Wilson of WHAM radio to inform listeners of a far-reaching Masonic service, absolutely free of charge or obligation, to all afflicted persons of any age, race, creed, color or sex, who are bedridden.

There she met Elbert Seigfred of the Consistory Hospitaller's Committee, who had installed a projector and micro-filmed books for the use and enjoyment of Mr. Malaggese, confined to his bed for over four years.

In a paralyzed condition and unable to move hand or foot, a new "lease on life" (as he terms it), has been granted him by means of this machine, and a special arm with micro-switches, which, by a slight touch of his chin moves forward or backward the photographed pages of his books projected and enlarged on the ceiling, and even allows him to rewind the entire film on its original spool without help from anyone.

This service was available to Mr. Malaggese four years ago at the beginning of his illness, had the Consistory only learned of his need, but already his horizons have been broadened and he has and will enjoy countless hours of reading pleasure for as long as he may require.

Two other special-arm projectors are in use at the present time, one by Mr. Vincent Melone of 364 Glenwood Avenue, for over eight years, and the other by Mr. William Shelp of 54 Suellen Drive, and other arms are being made.

The very charming and gracious Miss Wilson was amazed that helpless persons like Valentine could without help, and to learn that users are not confined to Rochester alone, for while many projectors have been installed in city homes and Masons know of this service in its suburbs, they are also only as "Brotherly Love." in use in Geneva. Brockport.

Webster, Sonyea, Dansville, Spencerport, E. Rochester, Hilton, Churchville, Fairport and other towns.

This project, sponsored by Rochester Consistory, of The Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Free Masonry, is far-reaching, and distance from Rochester is no barrier, as a machine is about to be installed in Canada for the use of a relative of one of our members.

Mr. Malaggese proved to be a congenial, enthusiastic host, and while in a wheel chair, and by means of a pencil placed in his mouth, he punches the keys of a typewriter and is attempting to personally answer the flood of mail pouring in on him since he came to the attention of the radio public. Valentine is married and the father of two children and before his illness was a teacher in Long Island schools.

Miss Wilson was glad to learn that not all patients are in need of such a special device as "Val's", for any person who has the use of their fingers, hands, feet or elbows are able to operate the buttons on the regular projector, and no patient has yet been found so crippled as to be unable to operate either projector.

Seventy - five machines and twenty-seven hundred filmed books are kept at Rundel Library. Mr. Waldo A. Lewis of 42 Sherwood Avenue, who is chairman of the project, and Elbert J. Seigfred of 471 Glenwood Avenue, who installs and services most of the projectors, are anxious to learn of afflicted persons in need of this convenience.

A phone call or card to these men, the library, Masonic Service Bureau or actually operate this device, Rochester Consistory will bring relief and happiness to the afflicted, bearing in mind that there is nothing to buy, rent, sign or agree to.

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
