HILFIKER WILDLIFE FILM COMING TO AUDITORIUM MARCH 8th

On March 8th, Earl Hilfiker brings to the Auditorium Theatre his film production, WILDLIFE OF THE EASTERN WOODLANDS WOODLANDS

which features the type of work that has brought him a national reputation for dramatic and unusual wildlife subjects in superb scenic settings. In this production are some of his finest wildlife subjects. The setting for the first half of the program in an unspoiled area of eastern woodlands, filmed around Camp Massaweepie,

the Rochester Otetiana Council, B.S.A. Camp, near Tupper Lake. The human actors are Explorer Scouts on a canoe trip. The animal actors are the porcupine, deer, black bear, chipmunks, squirrels, frogs and loons.

The location for the second half of the show is a beaver pond. The beavers are shown doing the work, but as soon as they have started a pond, a host of other things find it, move in and make their homes in and around the pond that the beavers build to suit their own needs and serve their own ends. There are once in a liftime shots of beavers at work, but there also are dramatic closeups of the frogs, toads and peepers, hatching trout eggs that look bigger than medicine balls on the screen as the little fish pop out. The waterfowl shots include the Canada geese, pintail, shoveler and wood duck, the peacock of the waterfowl. Rabbits and deer find the clearing rich in food that is within their reach. A young raccoon comes to catch frogs and meets up with a snapping turtle. A startled skunk gets a swimming lesson.

The animal subjects and the settings in WILDLIFE OF THE EASTERN WOOD-LANDS combined with the chairman,

narration and the sounds of the out of doors make this a show that no outdoorsman will want to miss.

Brother Earl Hilfiker became a Master Mason a few years back. He is also rated as a master craftsmaninhis social field of making and presenting outdoor motion pictures specializing in wildlife subjects. He is Junior Master of Ceremony in Corinthian Temple Lodge 805, F. & A. M., a member of Rochester Consistory and Damascus Temple Shrine. His special talent has been used by the craft for the past several years to promote fellowship, provide enter-tainment and his shows have been the one money making event for the benefit of the Masonic Service Bureau, which is so ably administered by R.W. Q: We elected a candidate who now wishes to withdraw his petition. Is it permissible to withdraw a petition? If so, must we refund his deposit?

A: A petition for initiation once received at a stated communication and referred to a committee cannot be withdrawn unless it requires a waiver of jurisdiction (Constitutions, Section 353). The petition must take its usual course and following the report of the investigating committee is given the benefit of the ballot. If the candidate is elected he may then withdraw his petition. In such a case the deposit must be returned unless the petition itself states in effect that "deposit of \$.... must accompany the petition and is not returnable. (Const., Section 360.) Even when the statement appears on the petition, if the candidate is rejected, the deposit must be returned.

Q: What is a "COWAN"? A: The word "cowan" is defined in the dictionary as "a Scotch term meaning, not a regular Mason." Its Masonic writers believe among Brethren in the

that it came from the greek "Kuon" meaning, dog. An old Scottish dictionary gives the following definition of "Cowan": a term of contempt; applies to one who does the work of a Mason but has not been regularly trained; (2) one unacquainted with the secrets of Freemasonry.

Its present meaning is an intrudor; one who claims to be a Mason, but never received the degrees in a ligitimate lodge.

MASONIC PHILOSOPHY

All mankind subscribes to some philosophy of life, either consciously or subconsciously, in some degree or another. No intelligent civilized human can contemplate an unplanned, haphazard world without purpose and objective. Whatever the individual's conception may be, it is inevitable that such conception becomes a philosophy, and sound reasoning determines the validity of the resultant philosophy.

Not every philosophical conclusion can survive the ravages of time and application, and the invalid faulty philosophy must inevitably falter and destroy itself in futility. The philosophy that does with-stand the test of time and application must inevitably expand and absorb prestige within the realm of sound reasoning. Masonic philosophy has weathered the most rigid of such tests over a period of uncounted cen-turies of trial; the validity of Masonic philosophy has been established.

No philosophical failure is ever futile, or value-less; each failure contributes something of value to the surviving theory. The failure proves inpractibility and ineffectiveness, if nothing more, and may establish a truth that must prevail as an effective guardian against the fallacy fostered in con-

Masonry, as an institution, is not infallible, nor are Masons, as individuals, and neither has ever been so. We are not so egotistical as to proclaim the attainment of perfection, for that is a quality that may be striven for, and attained only in divinity.

Masonry must have been purged of most of the early prevailing fallacies for it has survived; the philosophy is soundly reasonable for it lives on surmounting all obstacles. Philosophically masonry encourages its adherents to strive constantly toward perfection fully aware of the difficulty of attainment, but we are conscious of the fact that progress in the right direction is commendable; constant unfaltering progress toward perfection comprizes the Masonic goal.

Masonic philosophy demands tolerance of failure; it demands charitable consideration for those who may have been weakened in adversity, and may have wan-

dered into a quagmire of desparation. Masonic philosophy directs that all Masons lift-up the fallen and distressed and lead them back to smooth Masonic pathway from which they may have wandered in confusion. Masonic philosophy is founded in the belief in the brotherhood of man and the responsibilities implied in universal brotherhood such as Masonry undertakes to exemplify.

This world in which we are permitted to sojourn momentarily is not just one of many comprizing an unplanned haphazardly assembled universe occupying space. If there were neither plan nor purpose then existance itself would be futile. We mortals cannot define, in absolute assurance, the exact nature of Divine Force and plan, but sound reason and logic dictates an acceptance of faith that there has to be such Divine Providence. In our failure to adequately identify Divinity we find philosophy to be the next most adequate panacea.

In our acceptance and acknowledgment of Divinity in any sense, we are subconsciously accepting plan, and purpose for we cannot have one without the other. In this acceptance the seeds of philosophy are sown, and they sprout and ultimately bear fruit. Philosophy is the means whereby thought can be measured, and weighed and evaluated; it offers opportunity to balance reason and logic against theory; it provides opportunity to establish fact contrary to opinion; it provides intelligent approach to controversial problems, and that philos-ophy that best meets these problems may be termed sound philosophy. Masonic philosophy falls within that category.

Masons are profound students, primarily of ritual, secondarily of Masonic lore, and, sometimes, of philosophy. It might be well if the order were reversed for certainly both ritual and lore could be tremendously enriched thru a more profound understanding of philosophi-

cal aspects.

Bro. Harold Akin is ill and is at home.


Bro. Wilber Sage is in the Monroe County Home and is in need of our aid and sympathy.


MASTER'S MESSAGE

Davis, Master of the Lodge. a record number of Masons, each with a guest, turned out for an "Introduction to Masonry". The Ladies of the Eastern Star served a wonderful dinner to the group before the main event. A period of fellowship after the dinner had the group feeling in a good mood for that which followed.

Guests and Masons alike had the privilege of listening to dedicated Masons explain Masonry and related organizations (DeMolay, Eastern Star, and Triangle). Deputy Grand Marshall, Howard Nevins was present among the dignitaries.

W. Harry H. Davis made each speaker known to the group. Bro. George Stear, Junior Warden of the Frank L. Simes Lodge presented the information on DeMolay. He said this is the youth organization sponsored by the Masons. Their purpose and program aims to develop the highest degree of citizenship. It is international in scope with 3,000,000 members. Boys in their late teens may belong to this organization. Their group takes its name from Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar of the 13th Century.

R.W. Sidney O'Dell, D.D. G. Master, Past Master of East Rochester Lodge, Past D.D.G. Lecturer and mem-ber of the Eastern Star explained the organization and aims of the Eastern Star and Triangle. The Ladies of the Eastern Star must be blood relatives of Masons or the wives of Masons. Members of the Triangle are young ladies that will be eligible for membership in the Eastern Star. The work of these organizations have to do with the Moral and

Spiritual values of life. R.W. Herman A. Sarachan, Assistant Grand Lecturer, spoke at length on the Masonic fraternity. The second concerned itself with a query which, confessedly, I have repeatedly labored within the hearing of, by now, a multiple number of brethren. How many of us ever undertake to acquaint men of worth outside the Craft with the immutable fact that the focal point of every lodge-room is the Alter; that on it rests the Great Light; that from that Great Light are drawn, and presented in impeccable rhetoric to those who will human conduct so exalted in quality that they cannot help but elevate the stature and contribute to the character of any man, regardless of how strong his encouraged attachment to the church of his choice may be?

One suspects that our reticence may well have cost the Fraternity the loss of many valuable additions to our ranks, whose ignorance as to what we are principally about could well have been overcome with but a moderate amount of effort and enlightenment on our part.

LODGE #1032 INSTITUTED IN HONOR OF JOHN A. ROBERTSON

I knew Bro. Jack Robertson mostly by reputation being young in the Kodak organization and new in Rochester but I knew him by sight and knew of his many Civic and humanitarian interests. It was said of him that few people in Rochester had so many friends. He associated himself with every Civic and Philanthropic undertaking and gave it his active support. He was beloved by all who knew him. On the accasion of his promotion to Manager of the Camera Works, a banquet was given to Bro. Robertson by the men who had worked with him for years. The toast master spoke of him not only as a good friend but "the squarest andfairest fellow a man ever worked

It was in the summer of 1923 that plans for the new lodge began to take shape. Most active in the preliminaries were Worshipful Brother Charles H. Clark and Brother Samuel J. Barons both of Camera Works.

The first action taken in the formation of the new lodge, reads as follows:

"It is the purpose of the undersigned Brothers of F. & A.M. to apply to the Grand

York for a charter of Dispensation to install a Lodge in this City dedicated to the memory of and to be known as the "John A. Robertson" Lodge. If you are willing to demit from your present Lodge to the proposed one, please sign your name. This was followed by twenty three signatures which with the addition of that of Frank M. Page constitute the following roster of Charter Members.

Adolph Stuber, Thomas R. Allen, William H. Ure, Carl E. Kraftschik, Charles H. Clark, John W. Newton, Fred W. Brehm, Charles N. Roller, Harry R. Darling, George B. Goodman, Frank M. Page, Bernard E. Williams, John H. McKenny, John Christie. Frank H. Reynolds, George W. Adams, William H. Stark, Glen M. Webster, Arthur F.

Another document from the files was a record of the organization meeting under date of January 29, 1923. This meeting was held in the reception room at the Masonic Temple in Clinton Avenue. All the signers of the petition were there and the meeting was under the direction of Geo. R. Whitcomb who acted as temporary secretary. At this meeting the following officers were nominated and elected:

Worshipful Lodge of the State of New Adolph Stuber; Senior War-

den, Chas. H. Clark; Junior Warden, Samuel J. Barons; Treasurer, John H. McKenny; Secretary, William H. Stark; Trustees, Fred Brehm, Frank Reynolds, Arthur F. Wallace.

The initiation fee was set at \$100 on a motion by Thomas R. Allen.

The annual dues was set at \$7 at the motion of Bernard Williams.

As the result of a motion by Chas. N. Roller the meeting nights were set as the second and fourth Friday evenings of each month.

After the above elections, the chairman Bro. Wilbur P. Ward, retired in favor of Adolph Stuber at 6:35 who gave a brief talk expressing his appreciation for the honor conferred upon him and appointed the additional officers who accepted.

An interesting note concluded the report of the meeting to the effect that the Charter fees (no doubt from the charter members present) should be collected not later than Saturday noon S. Ernisse. February 3rd.

Now turning again to the Secretaries records "With this done and the job of

picking officers for the tryout completed, we all buckled down to the task of rehearsing which every one did with pride every Saturday afternoon until the time when we were to meet before an examining committee, and if I may say so they were really proficient in their work".

On November 30, 1923 the Lodge received a Dispensation form Grand Lodge to meet and work "Under Dis-pensation" and with the following officers in their stations Provisional Grand Lodge was opened in form.

officers were installed in their stations and places by Rt. Wor. Bro. George Hatch acting as Grand Marshall.

The Lodge continued to work under Dispensation until June 18, 1924 when it received its Charter from Grand Lodge with the number

1032 upon it.

During the past nearly forty years the Lodge has continued to grow and has constantly kept in mind the high principles of Bro. Robertson. A Kodak Night is held each year which is an open meeting to which friends of the members are invited. In the East stands a beautiful American flag and on the Alter a Bible gifts to the Lodge by Mrs. John A. Robertson.
