Construction Begins on Masonic Pavilion at New York World's Fair

Freemasonry will be represented at the New York World's Fair in 1964-65. New York State Masons are financing and building a Masonic Pavilion dedicated to brotherhood.

Construction is under way and the beautiful building will be completed in time for the opening of the World's Fair on April 22, 1964. It will occupy more than 25,000 square feet of space at the Avenue of the Americas and Eurasia Avenue, a short distance from the Unisphere and the \$17,000,000 Federal Ex-

The Pavilion, designed by the architectural firm of Chapman, Evans and Dele-hanty, will be semicircular, of steel frame construction. Visitors will enter the building under an arch formed by a 50-foot Square and Com-

passes, then across a bridge over a beautiful reflecting pool. A model of the statue of George Washington which the Grand Lodge of Louisiana commissioned for New Orleans from the famed sculptor, Donald DeLue, will stand just inside the entrance. Exhibits designed to acquaint visitors with Masonry's role in the state, the nation and the world will be on view. They

It is planned that construction costs will be financed from money raised by the sale of World's Fair tickets

All the Masters of the 1059 Lodges in the State of New York will assist in the ticket sale, and it is hoped that other Masonic organizations and Lodges in other states will participate by purchasing World's Fair tickets at \$2.00 each through the New York Grand Lodge.

Dear Brother Herman

Q. Why are Masons "Free

and Accepted.

A. In operative days, Masons were actually workmen, builders who erect-ed the cathedrals and castles, many of which have endured to this day. Those were the days of the feudal system when each vassal was bound to the soil or to the village in which he lived, and could not leave or travel without the lord's permission. The Masons were a privileged class, and were free to move wherever their services were needed. They were therefore called "Freemasons". These Freemasons organized them-selves into Masonic Lodges for mutual aid and

sociability. When building labors ceased, the Freemasons Lodges declined To keep from disappearing altogether, many Lodges a-dopted the practice of accepting into membership scholars, scientists, and professional men who had no intention of becoming workmen. They were called "Accepted" Masons, and the Lodges came to be known as Lodges of "Free and Accepted Masons". When Masonry discarded all connection with actual labors with the formation of the first Grand Lodge in London in 1717, the name Free and Accepted

Masons was retained. In 1751 a rival Grand Lodge was set up in Eng-land which called itself the Ancient Grand Lodge, claiming to adhere to the ancient customs and ceremonies. They referred to the older Grand Lodge as "modern", and the names stuck. That is why we have Grand Lodges F.&A.M. (Free and Accepted Masons), and Grand Lodges A.F.&A.M. (Ancient Free and Accepted Masons).

Today, we give the name a new interpretation. A candidate comes into the fraternity of his own free will, and is then accepted into the fellowship as a full-fledged brother.

Q. May a Master exclude a member of his own Lodge from a communication? A. It is one of the duties of a Master that he shall "regulate the admission of visitors". The Master should exercise his prerogative and refuse admission to any visitor whose presence would be objectionable to the Lodge, or to any member. As a corollary to this, he should exercise his prerogative and exclude a member of his own Lodge who is loud or belligerent, or creates a disturbance. The Master, however, should be cautious in exercising this prerogative that he does not deprive a brother of his inherent rights as a Mason. Normally, the Grand Master would uphold the Master's action, unless it is shown that the member

has been unjustly or without cause deprived of his right to attend his own Lodge. Any member who feels that he has been thus aggrieved has the right to appeal to the

Grand Master. Q. We have invited a Canadian Lodge to visit our Lodge to demonstrate their work. May they con-fer the degrees upon our candidate according to their ritual? If not, is it permissible for them to bring their own candidates?

The Book of Constitutions specifically pro-vides as follows (Const. Sect. 366):

"Every Lodge shall practice the Standard Work and Ritual adopted by Grand Lodge". This means that the Work in the Lodge must be according to our Standard Ritual Book. The Master of a Lodge (or a Warden acting in his absence) may delegate any portion of the work to any qualified brother, whether a member of his own Lodge or of another Lodge. Therefore, he may permit a group of Masons from Canada or Pennsylvania or any other regular Grand Lodge, to confer a degree. In conferring the degree they are merely substituting for the regular officers, and must do the work according to New York State ritual.

If the brethren from Canada bring their own candidate, they will be conferring a degree with-in the confines of a New York Lodge. It has been held by Grand Masters on a number of occasions (see for example Proc. 1946 p47) and upheld by Grand Lodge, thus making it the law, that a degree conferred upon a candidate from another Lodge or another Grand Jurisdiction is performed as a "courtesy", and is done strictly according to New York ritual. The candidate brought by the Canadian Lodge would come under this regulation, and the Work, even if performed by the Canadian brethren, must conform to the New York ritual. The answer to both questions is in the nega-


