#### Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street. Rochester, New York 14605.

Q. I want to drop my membership, since my Lodge or the Masonic Order as a whole, does nothing for me. How do I go about it?

A. The method of having your name removed from the rolls of your Lodge is very simple. If your dues for 1964 are paid, merely send a written request to your Lodge Secretary that your name be dropped from the rolls. Your Secretary will send you a certificate stating that you have withdrawn from membership, and you become a non-affiliate. If at any time in the future you should so desire, you may present a petition for affiliation to the same Lodge or to any other Masonic Lodge anywhere in the world, and upon election by ballot become a member of the Lodge by affiliation. Most lodges require the payment of an affiliation fee. If your dues for 1964 are not paid, it will be necessary for you to take care of you indebtedness before being dropped from the rolls.

I have been giving thought to the reason you give for dropping out, that the Lodge or the Masonic order as a whole does nothing for you. And I ask you in turn, what does Masonry offer to any member, except fellowship and the opportunity of rendering service individually or through the order?

Many members who, like yourself, live away from Rochester, get this fellowship by attending lodges in their own city. Many others, including a considerable number who live in this city, rarely, if ever, attend meetings, but render service indirectly through their membership.

Before you became a Mason you were asked to respond to several questions. One of them was that you expected no material benefits from your membership in the Masonic fraternity. Another, and the most important, was a positive, affirmative statement that you had a sincere desire to be serviceable to your fellowman. A minority of our members render service through offering their time and their abilities and skills to the fraternity. The great majority render service through the financial support which their membership dues and their contributions make available for human better-

Our Grand Lodge, through the Masonic Brotherhood Fund, initiated and supported research into Rheumatic Fever, which has taken the sting out of this killer and crippler of childhood. Who knows but that someone near and dear to you may benefit directly some day. Our Grand Lodge has built and equipped a laboratory at the Utica Masonic Home, to study the aging process and the diseases of old age. You and I may not benefit from this research, but our children and our grandchildren most certainly will. Who can foretell how much the lives of countless generations to come may not only be prolonged, but made much happier, freer from disease, through the research work in this laboratory. Membership in the Masonic order gives you the opportunity and the privilege to share in these projects, and in many others conducted by other Masonic bodies for the betterment of your fellowman. And isn't this what you promised before your initiation that you would

If Masons did not believe this, there would not be nearly 300,000 members in New York State alone, and thousands of men would not be giving liberally of their time, of their abilities and of their funds to carry on Masonic work. The fact that we have this membership and these devoted workers, is ample proof that Masonry is a

vital force in the world today.

The late Sir Knight Robert P. Smith with the help of our Right Eminent Deputy Grand Master Wilbur Marion Brucker, who was then the Secretary of the Army, and was chairmen of the Committee on Templar Jurisprudence, was able to draw up the articles and bylaws for a tax exempt corporation relating to Templary.

organizational At its meeting at Chicago, July 21, 1956, a resolution was presented and adopted for the following objectives:-

"For research, treatment and hospitalization of those who suffer from diseases of or injury to the eye, which if untreated might result in blindness. That the admission for treatment of such persons shall be without regard to race, color, creed, age, sex or national origin. That the treatment of patients for this purpose shall be free and limited to persons unable to pay. That all matters in connection with the launching, including the establishing and maintaining of hospitalization, research and treatment of these persons, shall be in existing facilities."

To further its Templary objectives "to Bind up the wounds of the afflicted, practice Universal Benevolence and the Christian Virtues" are vital and powerful, and no doubt many an individual Sir Knight has followed them, but not on an organizational basis did we publicly practice them, we obligated ourselves as to do.

Since the Foundation's formation of almost a decade ago, some 6,081 applications have been satisfactorily handled of which 213 cases have been handled in New York State.

The foundation does not make any appeals to the general public for funds, but derives its finances from a fixed assessment of one dollar paid by each Knight Templar and from the Life Sponsor fund. A Knight Templar may become a Life Sponsor by paying \$30.00, direct to the Knight's Templar Eye Foundation. Bequests, legacies, devises or transfers to or for its use are deductible in computing the value of the taxable estate of a decedent for federal estate tax purpose.




