I can not find words to describe the happiness that we brought to our brothers.

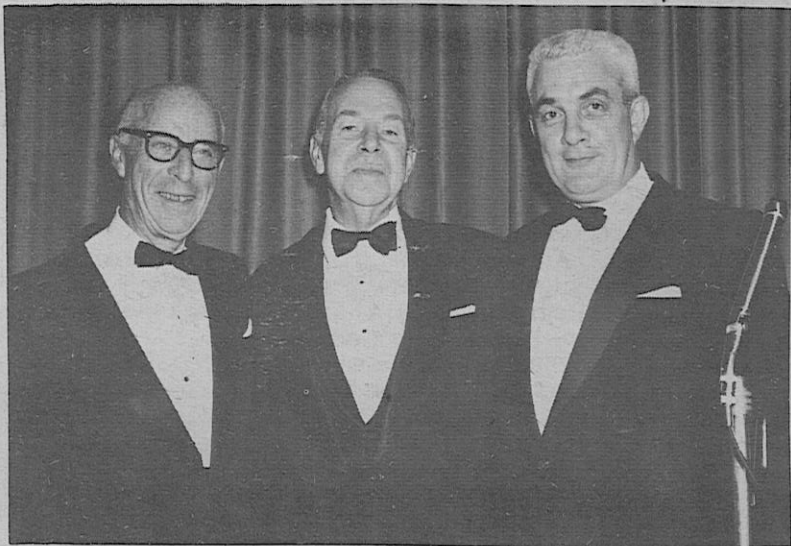

Dear Brother Herman

We are very proud of a regular feature in the issues of the Monroe Masonic News headed "DEAR HERMAN" it is sort of a primer to guide lodge officers and equally interesting to so called side liners. Questions on Masonic law, etiquette, symbolism and history are authoritatively answered by R. . W. . Herman Serachan.

Brother Herman retired from his executive position of twenty-nine years with the Jewish Young Men and Womens Association in September 1964, and his associates toasted and dined him at a lovely banquet Sunday evening Oct. 4th. I was privileged to attend with 25 other Masons to pay tribute to this outstanding Rochesterian.

Herman was educated in Rochester public schools, a University of Rochester graduate as mechanical engineer and a Master's Degree from Cornell University majoring in Engineering and Office Management. For thirteen years after graduation he was identified with manufacturing corporations in his chosen profession.

In 1936 he joined the executive staff of the Jewish Young Men and Womens Assn. and through the past twenty-nine years contributed much to the growth and success of this fine organization. The banquet honored Herman for his great contribution to the J.Y.M.A. in his unselfish devotion and efforts during his time there. The sentiments expressed by the officers were lavish in their praise but all deserved. While the meeting was the annual business meeting of the corporation, it was very evident that the large interest of all who attended was for Herman, who received them so modestly and humbly and further endeared himself to all.

Herman's Masonic career began with his raising to the Master Mason Degree in Flower City Lodge in 1926 and later filling every appointive and elective office to become Master in 1940. In 1942 he was appointed District Deputy of the First Monroe District and from here on he has been continuously identified with New York Grand Lodge officialdom. Presently he is Assistant Grand Lecturer and a member of the Library and Museum Board of Gran Lodge. Locally he is Director of the School of Ritual, director of the School of Lodge Administration, treasurer of the Monroe Secretary's Association, Secretary of the Genesee Council Allied Masonic Degrees of U.S.A. and his most cherished of all, Secretary of Flower City Lodge #910.

His most recent distinction was when coronated 33 degree honorary member of the Supreme Council, Norther Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite Masonry. He is an officer in Rochester Consistory, a member of Lala Rook Grotto, Hamilton Chapter of the York Rite and a Noble of Damascus Temple of the Shrine. He has an enviable reputation as a public speaker on various subjects beside Masonic subjects.

He has been a Scout Commissioner, organized and conducted a symphony orchestra and a Sunday School teacher and Superintendent. He has been the secretary of Congregation Beth Israel for the past 22 years.

To guard against too rapid a cooling down of such a meteoric career, Herman, may I suggest that you resume the writing of the History of Masonry in Monroe County and let us have some of those Masonic addresses of past years for reprinting in the Monroe Masonic News - they are always news and of great interest.

It is the wish of that great legion of friends that your retirement will be filled with happiness and continued good health.

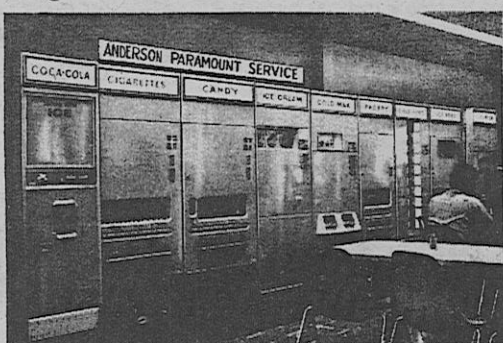

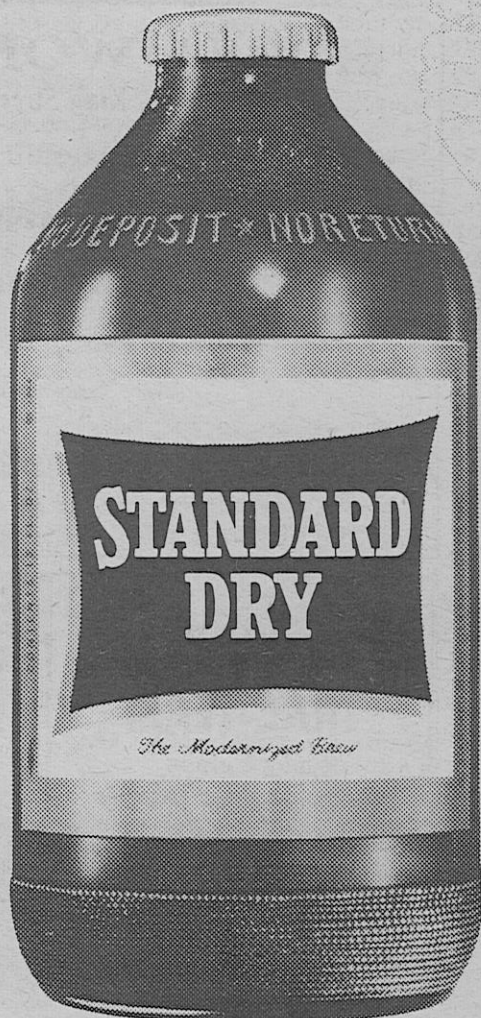
