Dear Brother Herman

Why does a Mason give of his time and his talents to

the Fraternity?

First, let me say that all too few members of blue lodges or concordant bodies give of themselves to Masonry. The percentage of members who are active in the average lodge or body rarely reaches ten per cent and often is appreciably lower. Yet the fact remains that many brethren do devote a great deal of time, effort and energy to work in the craft, many of them busy business and professional men - lawyers, judges, business executives, engineers, department heads, etc. etc. Why do they do it?

It is difficult to guess what motivates these brethren. What may influence one may have no bearing on another. I shall, therefore, try to answer this question subjectively; what are the more important factors that

have made me an active member?

1. I would put first the great ethical and moral lessons which are taught in the degrees - belief in a Supreme Being, human brotherhood, charity, the level of equality, the plumb of uprightness. By and large Masons live up to them.

2. The beautiful language in which the degrees are

expressed. I have listened to the work again and again, and yet again at meetings and in our School of Ritual, and never tire of it.

3. Our proud history. Great men in many countries have been members of our fraternity. In our country, this has included presidents, cabinet members, legislators, judges, military leaders-George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Andrew Jackson, De Witt Clinton, Daniel Tompkins and in our own time, Theodore Roosevelt, William H. Taft, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman, General George C. Marshal, Admiral Ernest J. King, General Mark Clark, General Omar Bradley - to mention just a few.

4. Our work for humanity. Researches into Rheumatic Fever, and now the Research Laboratory for the study of the Aging process and the diseases of old age which are supported by our Brotherhood Fund. Research in Schizophrenia and mental diseases supported by Scottish Rite. Shrine Hospitals for crippled children and the new hospitals for treatment of severe burns; and projects by other

Masonic bodies. 5. Friendship and fellowship which comes from working closely with enthusiastic and devoted Masons. The friendships which have come to me, have enriched my life far beyond words.
