It will still be necessary for all officers to be installed during a regularly scheduled tiled meeting of the Lodge. It will be permissable to carry out the public installation after the regularly tiled meeting provided, of course, that the Lodge is duly closed. If this does occur, the emphasis should be placed on the

tiled ceremony. Regardless of when the time is set aside for the public installation, a great deal of care should be exercised to see to it that the installation does not become merely a form of show or parade. Needless to say, we are anxious to impress on all the solemnity of the occasion, thus reflecting a good image of our Fraternity. All public installations must be over with by January 31, 1966.

THIRTEEN QUESTIONS ABOUT THE MASONS

(Continued)


Question 5: - Are Masons in the U.S. anti-Catholic? Mr Whalen answers this himself by stating that 'if a Masonic friend tells you he has never heard a word against the Catholic Church in his lodge, you need not doubt his testimony. One of the traditional landmarks of Masonry has been the ban on discussion of religion and politics in the lodge room.' He then goes on to state that the Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite in the 'New Age Magazine', provides a steady diet of bigotry and distortion against the Catholic Church. It is true that the 'New Age' has written strong editorials in opposition to Catholic practices, particularly against the parochial school, and in favor of the public school for all children. In 1920, the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction adopted a resolution that children between the ages of 8 and 16 should be required to attend public school. Following this, the State of Oregon by vote of its citizens, adopted this provision, but it was declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court. Mr. Whalen states that in October 1960 the Associated Press reported that a member of the Scottish Rite in Oregon sent a letter to all 32nd Degree Masons in the state urging them to vote against John F. Kennedy. If so, this was an act contrary to our Masonic tradition that Masonry is not to be used to favor or to oppose any candidate for political office. Mr. Whalen himself adds that 'We believe that the average American Mason resents such an action.

Question 6: - Do United States Masons initiate Negroes? He answers this by stating categorically that 'American Freemasonry maintains strict segregation of the races.' 'Not one of the 16,000 local blue lodges will initiate a Negro.' This is simply not true! Negroes have been initiated into regular lodges, some within the past two years. It must be admitted, however, that prejudice does exist, and that in many lodges a negro who applied might be blackballed. But it should be emphasized that there is nothing in the Grand Lodge Constitutions or in Masonic tradition which prohibits a lodge from accepting a Negro. Each individual lodge is sole judge of who shall be admitted as a member, and this is done through the ballot. Mr. Whalen goes on to say that 'the Grand Lodge of New Jersey does recognize one lodge, which might be construed as token recognition.' This is an incorrect statement. Alpha Lodge No. 116, whose members are all Negroes, is a regular lodge of the Grand Lodge of New Jersey, and very recently one of its members was named a Grand Chaplain of the

Grand Lodge of New Jersey. Question 7: - Is Masonry a Protestant institution? Mr. Whalen answers it with a categoric 'No' with which we agree. Freemasonry is universal, and admits, worthy men of all creeds and of every race, provided they believe in a Supreme Being and in the Immortality of the Soul.

Question 8: - If Masonry is not a Christian institution, why does it honor the Bible by putting it on its altars? The answer is very simple. Masonry is religious, and places the Bible upon its altars as the symbol of divine law, and as 'the rule and guide for our faith and practice.' Mr. Whalen is disturbed because Masonic practice permits a candidate to take his ob upon the body of scripture sacred to himself, the Koran, the Vedas, the Old Testament, etc. Would it make more sense to have a Hindu take an ob upon the Bible, which to him is merely a book? On the other hand, in our Grand Jurisdiction, the Bible must always remain upon the altar, even if another book is used.

Question 9: - Do Masons discriminate against non-Masons in business and politics? Mr. Whalen answers it himself by stating that, 'personally, I feel sure that most Masons follow the accepted rule of fair play in business, professional, and political life. He is right. Masonry teaches the principle of brotherly love toward all mankind, and the true Mason will not discriminate against him.
