41st Shrine Circus at War Memorial Feb. 10

Two of "Wagon Train's" top stars will be guest stars at this year's 41st annual Shrine Circus, which will play nine performances Feb. 10-13 at the War Memorial.

They are Frank Mc Grath, who plays the role of "Charley Wooster," the bearded, fast-talking "Wagon Train" cook, and Terry Wilson, who as "Bill Hawks" is the right-hand man to the wagonmaster.

Both are original members of the "Wagon Train" cast, having played in the television series from its beginning back in 1957. The ABC Network program, shown on Sundays (7:30 p.m. - Channel 13, 7, 9) is one of the top-rated TV shows in the Rochester area. It originated in 1957 on the NBC network, shifting to ABC several years ago.

The Wagon-Trainers will ride a covered wagon into the Shrine Circus arena and will sing a program of "Wagon Train" songs, according to Gordon H. White, general circus chairman.

The circus will open Wednesday Feb. 10, running through Saturday Feb. 13. There will be matinee and evening shows 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and three shows on Saturday, 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. The opening night performance traditionally is sold out to Bausch & Lomb employees.

In addition to the Wagon Train stars the Shrine Circus will feature a long list of top acts from many of the world's leading circuses. Among them are Captain Joe Frisco's performing mixed wild animals; Antonucci's educated chimpanzas, Stebbing's football playing boxer dogs plus the clowns, elephants, trained horses and ponies and aerial and balancing acts.

The Masonic Brotherhood Fund shows the Master Mason in action in two ways.

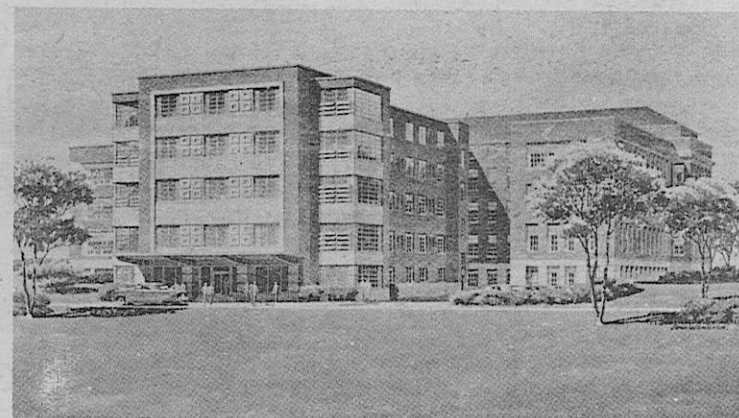
First, by your contribution, it shows your action toward your worthy Brother Mason.

NEW HILFIKER PRESENTATION 'BRINGING BACK THE BUFFALO'

Brother Earl L. Hilfiker will return to our Auditorium Theatre in the Masonic Temple on Friday, March 12th for the annual Hilfiker Show.

Those who have previewed it say that Earl's newest show is one of the finest of all his film productions.

"Bringing Back The Buffalo" is the title. Earl made three trips into the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge of Oklahoma in the years 1961, 1963 and 1964. There he documented one of the greatest conservation achievements of the century. The great T. R. Roosevelt was a prime mover in this

enterprise. First, in the early days of his presidency, 51,000 acres of over-grazed and supposedly worthless land that comprised the Wichita Mountains National Forest was set aside as a wildlife refuge. Livestock was excluded and the grass and trees had an opportunity to come back. In 1907 a seed stock of fifteen buffaloes were shipped to the refuge from the Bronx zoo. Today the refuge supports between 800 and 1,000 head of buffaloes, the largest herd in any national park or refuge. In the twenties, the long-horn cattle were brought in.

Thirty thousand miles were traveled and over 3,000 animals were examined. Among them they found twenty true longhorns. Today there are three hundred or more of these animals in the refuge, some with sets of horns measuring seven feet or more from tip to tip. The colorful longhorn has been returned to a part of the territory where it ran wild back in the days of the open range, in the days of the great cattle drives on the Chisholm and Texas trails when Dodge City Abilene and Wichita were wild and raucous cow towns in the days of the wild and wooly west.

Bringing Back The Buffalo is the title of the show. The place is the Auditorium Theatre, the date, Friday, March 12, the time 8:15 p. m. It is a show that every red blooded outdoorsman will want to attend and one which you can recommend to your friends and acquaintances without the least hesitation or mental reservation.

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

- Q. We are in the process of amending our by-laws to raise the dues. The vote will be in March. If the amendment is adopted, can we make the increase retroactive to January 1st?
- A. In a decision rendered in 1938 by Most Wor. Henry C. Turner, and approved by Grand Lodge, he established the principle that the by-laws of the lodge are in the nature of a contract between the lodge and its individual members. The contract sets forth an offer of certain privileges upon the performance of certain conditions, in this case, the privileges of membership upon the payment of the specified dues. The by-laws, however, make provision for their amendment, which forms a part of the original contract.
- In its present by-law relating to annual dues, the lodge has contracted with its members that if they pay the present sum, they shall be permitted to enjoy the privileges of membership. All members who paid their dues prior to adoption of the amendment, have complied with the terms of the contract, and cannot be charged the added increase. Those members who had not paid their dues at the time of the adoption of the by-law, now face new terms of the contract in the form of the increased dues, and are therefore subject to the new rate. Beginning with the succeeding year, all members pay at the new rate.
- Q. We requested a Waiver of Jurisdiction over a candidate and were refused. May we request a Waiver over this candidate from another lodge having concurrent jurisdiction? If so, how long must we wait before we can make such a request?
- A. The request for a Waiver of Jurisdiction is essentially the request for a fraternal courtesy, the courtesy of granting permission to the requesting lodge to confer the degrees upon a candidate who desires to become a member of that lodge. In effect, it is similar to the request for any other courtesy, such as the loan of a Bible, or the conferring of a degree. There is no reason why your lodge cannot make the request immediately from another lodge having concurrent jurisdiction or even from the same lodge, and as many times and as often as desired.
- Q. May we elect as Master a brother who has served as Warden in another lodge?
- A. The Book of Constitutions states (Sec. 305) that "No member can be the Master of a chartered Lodge unless he has previously served as an installed Master or Warden." This language would appear to indicate that the member is eligible if he had served in some lodge. If we examine the first Constitutions of Grand Lodge, adopted in 1785, we find the explicit regulation that "no brother can be Master of a Lodge till he had first served the office of Warden somewhere." While the wording was changed in subsequent revisions of the Constitutions, there was no intention to change the rule. As long as the member nominated for Master has been elected and served as Warden in any regular lodge, he is eligible for election as Master.
- Q. In a lodge bulletin I read an article which began "Masonry was old when the Mayflower sailed, old when Caesar invaded Gaul, old when Jerusalem was sacked and destroyed by the Romans." Is our Masonry as old as the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 A.D.?
- A. This is an example of the exaggerated statements that were often made by Masonic writers and lecturers during the 18th, 19th and early 20th centuries. We still hear them occasionally today. The fact is that Modern Freemasonry came into existence in London in 1717, or just 247 years ago. Its predecessors were the operative Masons of the Middle Ages, those skilled craftsmen who erected cathedrals and castles. The furthest back we can trace Operative Masonry historically is to a poem written about the year 1390, or about 576 years ago. All we can guess is that sometime during the 13th or 14th centuries, the stone-masons of those days organized themselves into mutual benefit societies, called lodges, which were the predecessors of our Modern Freemasonry.

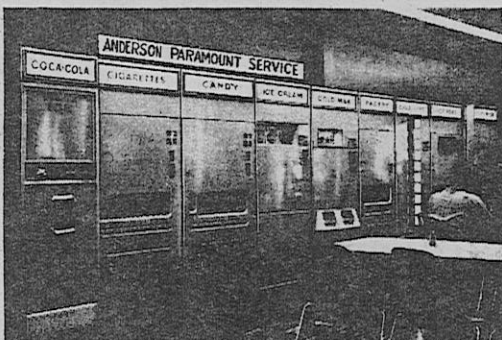

FIRST SCHOLARSHIP

At the December 28th meeting of the Rochester Chapter, Order of De Molay, John Lindsay, a Past Master Councillor and currently a freshman at the State University at Fredonia, New York, was awarded a scholarship by Frank R. Lawrence Lodge, the proceeds of which are to be used in helping to finance his college education.

According to the By-Laws of Lawrence Lodge which have recently been changed to provide for this grant, the scholarship will be continued through the four undergraduate years at an accredited college or university of his choice, provided satisfactory grades are maintained by the recipient; that his conduct at all times is in line with that of a good citizen and reflects the teachings of the Order of De Molay and the confidence placed in him by the Lodge; the finances of the Lodge remain at a satisfactory level.

Selection of the candidate for the award may be made either from the Rochester Chapter, Order of De Molay or the worthy son of a Master Mason of Lawrence Lodge.

With this presentation Frank R. Lawrence Lodge, as far as is known, becomes the first Masonic Blue Lodge in either the First or Second Monroe Districts to make such an award. This is tangible evidence of one of the many ways in which the Masonic Fraternity can assist the youth of the community.

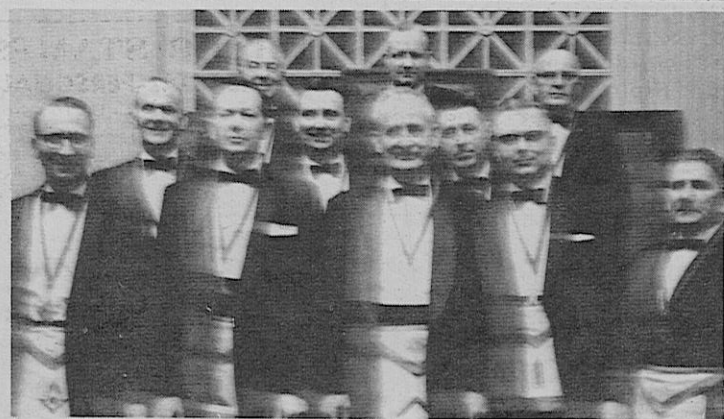

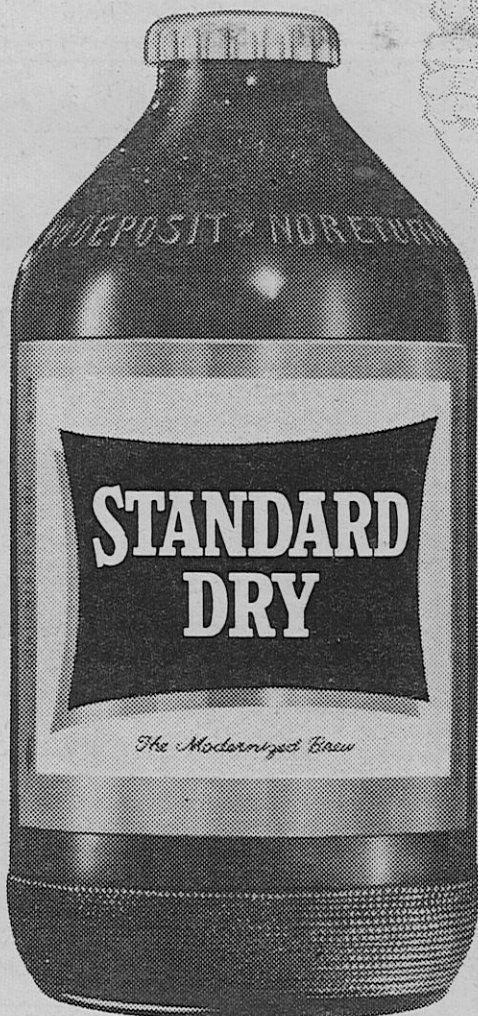
