TAH DOES MASONRY MEAN TO ME? This was the topic assigned to me when I was appointed lecturer for the Scottish Rite Class of 1957 when I joined Consistory. To the best of my ability, I carried out that assignment when I assembled at the reunion banquet at the Rochester Chamber of Commerce that April.

Now in retrospect it occurs to me that I may well take stock and ask myself THIS question, WHAT DO I MEAN TO MASONRY? It is both a high privilege and a heavy responsibility to wear the emblem that identify us as members of the Craft. The public image of Masonry is created by the words, the deeds and the reputations of the individual members. Unfortunately the image created a multitude of kind deeds, good works and living examples of exemplary conduct of hundreds can be shattered by one individual guilty of unbecoming conduct. It lies within the power of each of us to add a bit of polish to the luster of that public image or to knock some dents in it.

In the pursuit of my profession, I have traveled over a third of a million miles since I assumed the obligations of our order. I have addressed over two thousand assemblages, totaling close to a million individuals, in person, and probably as many more via television appearances. Wherever I have gone I have worn the emblems that mark me as a member of the fraternity. In these past eight years I have worn them in 45 states of the U.S.A., Canada, Bermuda and the Bahamas. My contacts have been with Masons and non Masons, those who are friendly, those who are indifferent and those who violently oppose Masonry.

It has been my privilege to stay in the homes of hosts that ran the gamut of the Protestant denominations, Roman Catholics, including a stay in a monestary, Hebrew, Latter Day Saints, agnostics and possibly atheists. In these travels, I have felt that it is the responsibility of each one of us to so conduct himself that friends and members of Masonry will regard him as a credit to the Craft and among those who are indifferent or unfriendly to so deport himself as to leave the impression that he need neither to wear a hat to hide his horns, nor shoes to conceal his cloven hooves. 

Dear Brother Herman

- Q. Our Master announced the ballot closed. Then after inspecting the ballot proceeded to destroy it, and ballot again. If the ballot is "closed" how can an additional ballot be taken?
- A. The word "ballot" in this case means "a casting of votes", and the statement, that the ballot is closed, means that the particular casting of votes is finished. Section 354 of the Book of Constitutions states that "The Master of a Lodge may destroy the ballot twice but no more and shall announce the result of the third ballot". It should be noted here that if the Master announces the result following the first or the second ballot, no further ballots can be taken, and the result stands, and cannot be reconsidered. The only exception is where some illegality is found in the balloting, such as the necessity for a waiver of jurisdiction which has not been secured, which voids the ballot. It should also be noted that if the first ballot is on more than one petitioner and results in a rejection, the ballot must be destroyed, counts as the first ballot, and the Master should proceed to ballot on each candidate individually. This ballot, if cloudy, may be destroyed only once, and the result of the next, and final ballot, must be announced.

10. In my reading I often come across the term "Anderson's eres Constitutions." Who was Anderson and what were the -19 Constitutions?

ovenDr. James Anderson was a minister, born in Aberdeen, Scotland, about 1678. He moved to London in 1710 and became Minister of a Scotch Presbyterian Church. He wrote many works, pamphlets and sermons. He became a Mason, and in 1721 was commissioned by the Grand med Lodge of England to prepare a "Book of Constitutions" incorporating the charges and regulations which had come down from the older manuscripts. In 1723 he published his book of Constitutions which consisted of two parts: the "history" of the craft and the charge. The history of the craft was pure legend, tracing Masonry back to Adam.

The Charges are reproduced in the Book of Constitutions of our Grand Lodge, beginning on page 89 and form the basis for our present Masonic Law, They are commonly called "Anderson's Constitutions of 1723.

A second edition was published shortly before Anderson's death, under the title "Anderson's Constitutions of 1738." In this edition he included the transactions of the Grand Lodge of England for 1716 to 1723. In America, the Constitutions of 1723 were reprinted in 1734 by Benjamin Franklin at Philadelphia and have been adopted as fundamental Masonic Law by a number of Grand Lodges.

DEMOLAY HONORED BY GRAND LODGE

On Tuesday, May 4, 1965 at the opening session of Grand Lodge in New York City, a precedent-setting event took place. For the first time in the 184 year history of the Grand Lodge, a representative of an""outside" organization not directly associated with a Blue Lodge or any of the concordant bodies was invited to speak before the Grand

On that day, Robert J. Belluscio, Jurisdiction Master Councilor of the Dr. Elmer G. Seel Jurisdiction Chapter of the Western Jurisdiction of New York State, was presented to the Grand Lodge members by the Most Worshipful Clarence J. Henry, Grand Master of the State of New York. This opportunity was made possible by a personal invitation extended to Bob by the Grand Master. In extending the invitation, Most Worshipful Clarence J. Henry had indicated that he had been so favorabley impressed by the precepts of DeMolay that he wanted all members of the craft to share in these impressions, thus bringing the two orders, which have much in common, in closer harmony one with the other.

In his remarks Bob made a strong appeal for a much closer and more active spirit of cooperation between DeMolays and the Blue Lodge pointing out that the ties which draw the two bodies together are strong and the resultant benefits to both groups could be immeasurable. In his closing comments Bob pointed out that many Master Masons have worked hard for DeMolay, not so much because of their love for Masonry but because they have a genuine concern for the future of their communities. The Administration Building was built in 1891 and must be completely rebuilt if not replaced. The Vrooman Building needed new fire escapes, which have just been completed, to comply with fire regulations and insure the safety of our guests. New sanitary facilities are needed at the Home and are being installed. The Knights Templar Building must be revamped to ac commodate those employees who must live on the grounds, and who are now in quarters which must be demolished.

These and other extensive programs of modernization will cost approximately \$2,500,000 over a period of three years.

Your contributions allocated to the Modernization Program will insure the continued fine care for our guests at Utica and the necessary rehabilitation and modernization of our properties.

THE GRAND MASTER'S ALLOCATION

Each year thousands of dollars are contributed without specifying the purpose for which these gifts are to be used. These gifts make up the Grand Master's Allocation, which he can apply where and when needed.
