The Grand Master has asked for \$1,000,000.00 from the masons in the State of

New York. On the surface this goal looks easy but to accomplish it. each and every member of the craft must do his part. By simple arithmetic you can see that the individual gifts do not have to be large if we have full cooperation.

Again, I repeat, that this campaign for "A Million In Masonic Pride" would not be a burden economically upon anyone if all share in this truly Masonic Charity.

Last year in the Second Monroe District 16.6% of the

members made a contribution and unless, during this last month, the tempo is stepped up we will not reach that percentage this year.

In the latest report from Grand Lodge which includes all contributions sent in to March 31, 1965, one lodge in our district with over 400 members reports one contribution, another lodge with over 400 members reports 13 contributions.

Each lodge was requested by the Grand Master to appoint a committee of between five and ten to contact their entire membership and obviously this has not been done in some

Do we have a few pioneers who will blaze this trail? If so, let me know right away. The time we lose can never be found again.

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

- Q. Please tell me by what authority the Monroe Masonic News publishes the names of new candidates, when it is not first class sealed mail. I have been under the impression we could not do this, per Grand Lodge.
- A. In 1910 Most Wor. S. Nelson Sawyer re-emphasized a resolution adopted by Grand Lodge in 1895, prohibiting the publishing the names of candidates for degrees, or names of those on whom degrees have been or will be worked, unless such notices are sent in sealed envelopes He gave as his reason that "its purpose was to prevent unnecessary and perhaps objectionable information to persons -- not members of the Fraternity."

In 1910 we were still shrouded in the cloak of secrecy, which was to a large extent the result of the Morgan episode in 1826. Since then, we have gradually discarded some of these old notions of secrecy. Names of Grand Lodge officers, of Lodge officers and of individual Masons appear in the daily press. Masons wear emblems to show their affiliation. The principles of Free masonry are printed in books and pamphlets. Our charitable work is publicized. We established a Masonic Pavilion at the World's Fair to tell the world something about who we are and what we stand for.

Needless to say, the authoritative answer can be given only by the Grand Master. I can only give my own opinion. I recall that when I became a Mason forty years ago, I was enjoined that everything is secret, and to my wife's inquiry my answer was, "It's secret, I cannot discuss it." Then I began to think. The cleaning woman comes every week, and sees an altar in the center of the lodge room. The official Monitor includes a prayer at opening, a prayer at closing, a prayer during the First Degree, Bible Readings for each of the degrees, and lectures which explain many of the symbols. I therefore reasoned that what the cleaning woman can see, and what is printed in the Monitor for all to read, I can surely tell my wife.

In view of all these, it is my opinion that the names of candidates to be balloted upon, or to receive the First Degree, should not be publicized, except in sealed mail to the members. Such men are not yet Masons, and may withdraw their petitions before receiving any degrees. Even more important, the petition might be rejected, and it is improper to publicize the name of a rejected candidate, to say nothing about the possible embarrassment.

A candidate who receives the First Degree is a Brother. Hasn't the fact been widely publicized that President Lyndon B. Johnson is an Entered Apprentice, having taken the First Degree many years ago? It would, therefore, seem to me that printing the names of candidates who had received the First, Second or Third Degree, or who are waiting to receive the Second or Third Degree, would not be improper.

- Q. Why do we vote with our left hand instead of with the right, when the right was deemed the seat of fidelity?
- APIn many jurisdictions in our own country, and in gniforeign countries, the right hand is used in voting. Several weeks ago, I visited a Lodge in the State of Israel, and noted that they use the right hand in voting. The left hand is used in most Eastern states, and like a number of customs and practices in our Masonry, no records exist, so far as I know, which tell how or why they were introduced.

The custom probably arose when brethren to affirm their integrity were asked to vote under the sign of fidelity, (or under the sign of the particular degree). We retain this custom in balloting for candidated, when the Master may ask us to ballot in due form. Since the sign is given with right hand, it was natural to give the voting sign with left hand, and this became the practice, even when the use of the sign for normal voting was discontinued




