This nearly doubled the attendance over the previous year. The Damascus Shrine Band entertained with a concert led by John Cummings.

Ticket sales were completed one week prior to the Bake and many were disappointed in not being able to obtain admission. This points up the importance of making reservations early. R:W: Lenard Parker, General Chairman, reports that nearly 1/4 million clams were consumed and that no one went home hungry.

The Bake was climaxed with a giant fireworks display announcing the next attraction would be the forthcoming gala Shrine Circus.

???? THAT DIFFICULT DEADLINE DATE ????

Reading the News from many Lodges over a period of time, one finds that much of the Lodge News can be written in advance of that last meeting before the Deadline Date.

All events past, can be written accurately and with more completeness, prior to the meeting and should be done - also there is time to consult the Master, or other Lodge members especially the Committee men. Items of deceased members, sickness and upcoming events well known - including dates can be prepared, in many cases. This is also the time to prepare pictures which, it must be said, should never be written on but, if possible typed on a separate piece of paper and attached on the back by means of adhesive tape, of course using the names of the people in the pic. and including dates and Lodge Number!

Never fail to head your paper with the name of the Lodge and your name as correspondants (with phone number for checking if necessary).

A paper with the same heading's marked 'Continued' can be used for items to cover the last Lodge meeting or changes for future events. If your envelope is prepared with postage, you can then post your article the same night of the meeting! Write, type or print as clearly as possible. A little experience with this thought in mind will help solve this difficulty.

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

Mr. Whalen's second question is: 'Are there other reasons?' (why the Catholic Church condemns Freemasonry). He gives as the added reasons, 'the long history of the anti-clericalism of many Masonic bodies, the blatant racism of American Masonry, the role of the lodge in fomenting revolution against constituted civil authority, and the unjust preferential treatment of Masons by Masons in business or professional life.' Let us briefly consider each of them. It is true that in some countries of South America and Europe in recent years, Masons have been active in the revolt against Church fanaticism, bigotry and superstition, and have advocated universal education, freedom of speech, and tolerance toward other faiths. We stated in the previous article that Masonry prohibits sectarian, religious or political discussions within its lodgerooms. However, Masons have always fought for freedom and against authoritarianism and dictatorship, wherever found, and have always favored public education, and the separation of Church and State. They have done these as individuals, and not as members of the fraternity, although it must be admitted that the official publication of the Supreme Council for the Southern Masonic Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite has advocated continuously, in editorial and article, the separation of Church and State. This was not done to oppose the Catholic Church, but to support a basic American principle.

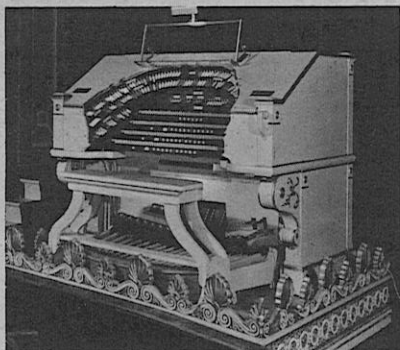
Mr. Whalen gives as his second reason why the Catholic Church condemns Freemasonry, that 'the Lodge imposes solemn oaths which are not within its power to administer.' He is referring to the obligations which a Mason assumes. These are the ties which bind a Mason to his Masonic brethren, and in which he promises, essentially, to help a brother and his family in need, to refrain from wrongdoing, to keep inviolate the secret portions of the ritualistic work, and to obey Masonic Law. It is true that Masonry has no power to enforce these obligations, has no way to make a man charitable, or love his neighbor. This is the very praiseworthy characteristic of the fraternity, that it places every brother on his honor to live up to its lofty principles. In that respect it is like the Church, which imposes moral and spiritual obligations upon its adherents, but has no power to enforce these beyond the religious and spiritual worth of the individual. Masonry, however, has a Code of Procedure which, upon due trial, imposes the penalties of reprimand, suspension, or expulsion upon a member who is convicted of a felony in a court of law, or who, upon due trial, is convicted of unmasonic conduct, as defined in the Code.

'The blatant racism of American Masonry.' By this he implies that American Lodges are all-white, and will not admit the colored, especially Negroes. This, too, is contrary to fact. The trust is that there is nothing in Masonry which prohibits a Lodge from admitting Negroes. Except for certain conditions of physical handicap, which require special dispensation from the Grand Master, any male person who professes belief in a Supreme Being and in the immortality of the soul, be he white or black, or brown, or yellow, may petition for membership. Each Lodge, through the ballot, has the sole responsibility of determining who shall be admitted into membership. The fact is that Negroes, as well as Indians, Hindus, Asians, Africans are members of individual lodges. There is an entire lodge of colored brethren in New Jersey, and another in Nova Scotia. It should be noted that Negroes since the Revolutionary War have maintained their own Masonic organization, denominated Prince Hall Masonry, which has lodges in most of the states in this country.

'The role of lodges in fomenting revolution.' This, too, is contrary to Masonic principle, which prohibits political discussion within the lodgeroom, so that a legitimate lodge could not 'foment revolution.' On the other hand, it is true that Masons, lovers of liberty, have participated as individuals in revolution against injustice and oppression. All Masons are proud of the part played by Masons in our own Revolutionary War. Among them were George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Paul Revere, John Hancock, General Joseph Warren, Robert Livingston, and many others. But they served the cause of liberty as individual patriots, and not as members of the Masonic fraternity. In the same conflict were many Masons in the British Army, and on the Tory side.

'The unjust preferential treatment of Masons by Masons.' It is conceivable that there might be situations where a Mason might be given preference. Suppose there were two salesmen offering a product of comparable quality, or suppose there were two applicants for a position with approximately equal experience and ability, the Mason might be favored, as might be a member of the same Church, or the one recommended by a friend. But everyone of us knows cases where a non-Mason, frequently a Catholic, was favored because he had the better qualifications. And you and I have heard of Justices who are stricter with a brother Mason who appears before them for some offense, because they tell the offender, 'As a Mason you should have known better than to break the law.' RKO THEATER PIPE ORGAN TO BE INSTALLED IN AUDITORIUM THEATER



The Auditorium Theater at 825 Main Street East in downtown Rochester will become the new home of the famous RKO Palace Theater pipe organ when the Palace is torn down this fall.

Completion of negotiations for installation of the organ in the Auditorium Theater was announced by the Temple Civic Center of Rochester, which operates the Auditorium, and the Rochester Theater Organ Society, Inc. which recently acquired title to the instrument. Formal agreements cover the transfer of the organ to the Temple Civic Center and its installation in the Auditorium are being drawn for future execution.

The Rochester Theater Organ Society, Inc. is a non-profit organization of music lovers devoted to preserving 'the incomparable sound of the theater pipe organ for this and future generations of Rochester area residents.'

Said Society President, Jess Littlefield, 'We are very fortunate that the Auditorium Theater, which is almost as large as the RKO Palace, has been made available as the new home of this magnificent theater pipe organ.'

Theater pipe organs, as contrasted to church or concert organs, were made expressly to accompany silent movies and the performance of light classical and popular

music. As such they were designed for the acoustics of large theaters and sound best in such locations.

'Now that we are sure of a place to install this wonderful instrument which, incidentally, is in much better condition than the organ in Radio City we can go all out in our campaign to raise funds for its relocation,' Mr. Littlefield added.

MASONIC LAW AS PERTAINING TO POLITICS

No Lodge or any member thereof, nor any Freemason within this jurisdiction, over whom the Grand Lodge has Masonic penal jurisdiction, shall directly or indirectly use or attempt to use Freemasonry for or against any political activity, enterprise or candidacy; and it shall be unlawful for any such Lodge or Brother either personally or by written letter or circular, or in any other manner, directly or indirectly, to solicit, or attempt to obtain votes for or against any candidate for political office, on the ground, or for the reason that such candidate is or is not a member of the Craft and therefore worthy or otherwise of political support. Any violation of the provisions of this Section shall be a Masonic offense.

There are four open Bibles displayed in English lodges when at work, one upon the altar and one before the stations of the Master and his Wardens.

Bromwell is authority that in earlier days the Entered Apprentice was obligated upon a pedestal placed to the North of the Center, the Fellowcraft on a similar one placed to the South of Center, and the Master Mason on the altar in the Center--Masonic Trestle Board.

THE MASONIC ALTER

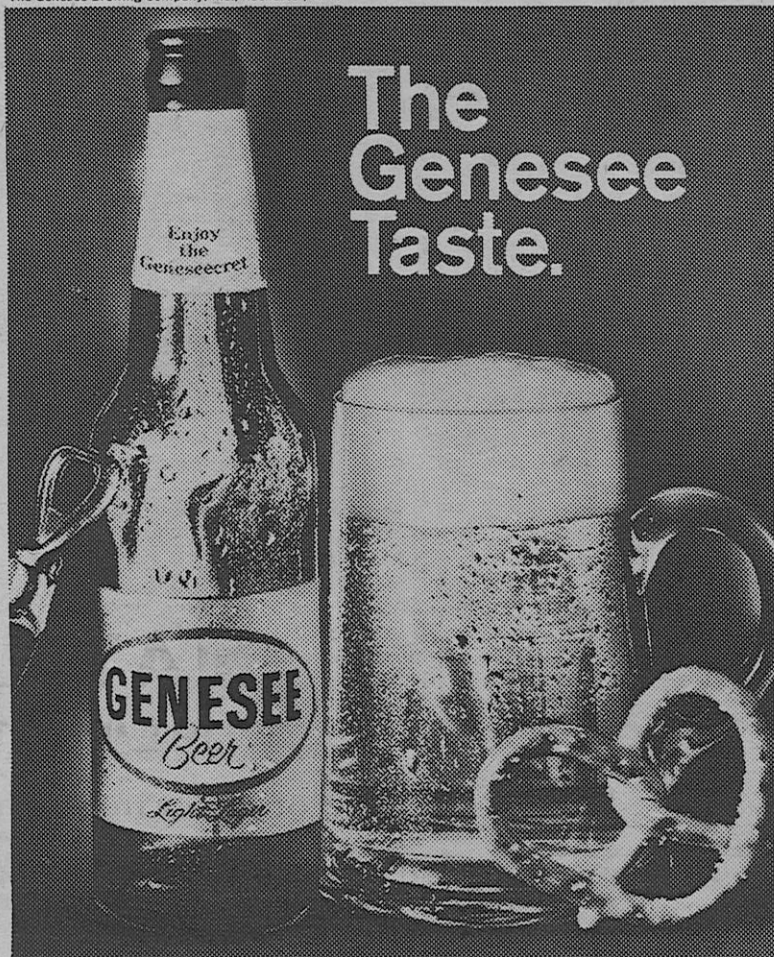
The position of the altar in a Masonic Lodge is by no means accidental, but is very insignificant. It is a symbol of what Masonry teaches the altar should be in actual life, a center of union and fellowship and not a cause of division, for Masonry is neither a religion nor a sect, but a worship in which all men may unite. It does not attempt to explain or dogmatically settle those issues by which men are so frequently divided.

In English lodges, as well as in the French and Scottish Rites, the altar stands in front of the Master in the East. In the York Rite it is placed in the center of the lodge or more properly a little to the East of the Center. It is not merely a piece of furniture for the display of the Greater light, but by its presence and situation it identifies Masonry as a religious institution.

Some research students declared as a result of their study of old manuscript that the obligation was formerly conferred without an altar. No doubt they are correct so far as the ceremony is concerned, but the mistake they make is in supposing that there was therefore no altar in the lodge room. Too much is included in the conclusion. Undoubtedly there were both altar and lights, but the latter never had anything to do with obligations and have nothing now.

The custom prevalent in some localities of placing the three burning tapers or three symbolic Lesser Lights East, West and South near the Altar, is somewhat changed so that these respective lights are burning on the pedestals of the Master and

ARE YOU A STRANGER IN YOUR OWN LODGE?

A Freemason may be himself at fault if he is a stranger in his own Lodge, but the Craft is at fault if that same Brother is allowed to be a stranger in another Lodge.

The probable reason for a Brother being somewhat of a stranger in his own Lodge is due to the fact that he has long been conspicuous by his absence at the meetings and the officers having changed and so many newcomers having been initiated he actually knows but a few, if any. Lodge attendance is voluntary, and if a Member fails to attend, he must accept the obvious penalty.

This strangeness can, however, be remedied rather quickly. By attending Lodge, new friendships will be established and old friendships will be renewed.

When a Brother visits a Lodge, other than his own, it is the manifest duty of the Brethren of the Lodge to make him feel welcome—a duty which is oft-times neglected. It has been wisely stated that 'Lodge visitors constitute the strongest link in Freemasonry's chain of fraternal good will and amity that encircles the globe. Their presence supplies the Lodge a rule with which to gauge its own hospitality, and furnishes it an insight into the character and integrity of the Fraternity in that Jurisdiction.'

A Lodge that has many visitors can't help but be a well informed Lodge. It can't help but be a popular Lodge, a friendly Lodge and a Lodge that is ready at all times to accept responsibility and handle it with confidence and dignity.

It has also been cited that nowhere is a visitor so welcomed, nowhere is he so entertained, nowhere is his visit so productive of joy and satisfaction to all concerned, as in a Lodge that understands the principles and purpose of a Masonic examination, and the courtesies due the Brother who has proven himself worthy and well qualified. There is an officer on hand to greet him. There is a seat in the Lodge within a circle of cheerful faces, wreathed in true smiles of Brotherhood and affection, and there are friendly hands waiting and willing to grasp his own.

Being a stranger in your Lodge or allowing a visiting Brother Master Mason to remain a stranger in your Lodge, is not in keeping with the traditions of Freemasonry.

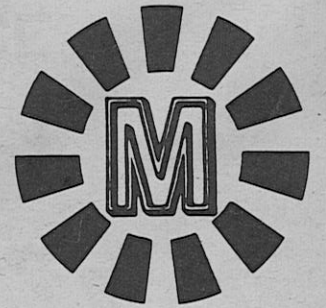

Effective January 1, 1966, a new policy will be effective regarding subscribing organizations to the Monroe Masonic News.

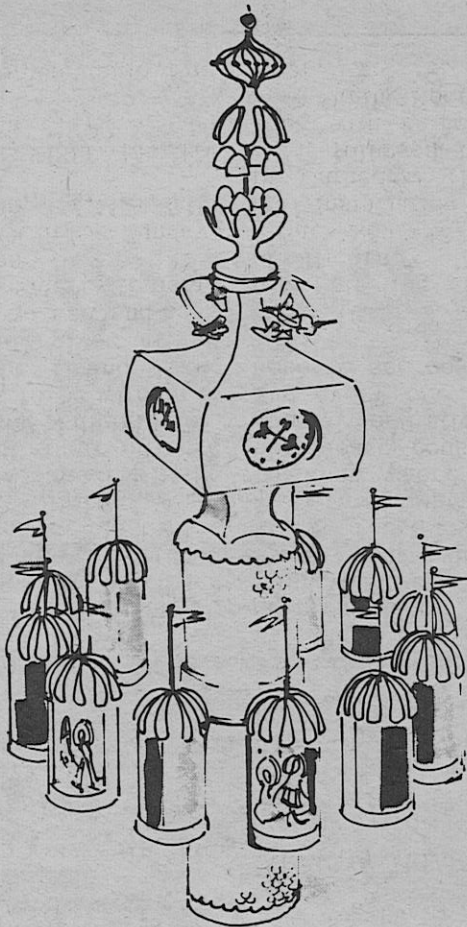
In order to protect the interest of the Organizations presently supporting the News, new subscribers will be charged for the costs of making addressograph plates at 10 cents each, for the first year.
