Everyman Canvas Follow Up Calls Underway

2707, one of the milepost numbers on the road to success for the 1966 Masonic Brotherhood Fund Drive was passed on Monday, March 14, only 36 days after the February 5 campaign starting date. February 5 was mailing date for the first of two letters sent to over 12,000 Masonic brothers of Monroe County.

2707 has significance to the Campaign Committee because it represents the total number of contributors to the Fund during the 1964-65 campaign, who gave a total of \$15,074 to the combined Brotherhood Fund of all New York's Masonic

1390 contributions were tallied at the first REPORT MEETING at the Temple on February 24, an enthusiastic gathering of the two Monroe County district committee members, Masters of the Monroe County Lodges and the Lodge Chairmen of the Every-Member Canvas Committees.

Grand Master, the Honorable Clarence J. Henry, feature speaker at the February 24 dinner meeting, commended the fund drive organization on their new format for the drive and the energetic campaign being waged. He reported wide-spread interest in the state-wide Masonic organization in the new approach for Brotherhood Fund support program and predicted possibilities for this being the testing ground

for a state-wide program with a new look in 1967.

Since the February 24 REPORT MEETING, Dave Crumrine, Seneca Lodge and Campaign Chairman for First Monroe District, reports a steady flow of contributor envelopes coming into his office at the rate of 30 - 50 daily.

These returns, added to the 1390 First Report meeting tally, on Monday, March 14 bring the grand total to 2721

During the past several months the writer has devoted much time and effort in promoting the Brother-hood Fund Drive. This is as it should be because its importance to our Fraternity cannot be over-emphasized. However, as in all such cases, it is conceivable that over-emphasis can produce

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

The Secretary of my Lodge has asked me to confer the Second and Third Degrees on a candidate who has not learned the Lecture of the First Degree. The Secretary states that he is "tired of carrying this candidate."

The Law is very clear on this point. A candidate must show "suitable proficiency" in the preceding degree, by examination in open Lodge or before an Examining Committee, before he can be advanced to the succeeding degree.

There appears to be a definite misunderstanding on the part of some lodges, and particulary lodge secretaries, with regard to candidates who have been initiated. When a Lodge confers the First Degree upon a candidate he becomes a Mason, but he is not a member of the Lodge until he receives the Third Degree, and signs the by-laws. After that he is carried on the books as a member. In the meantime, the Lodge merely assigns a number to him in the By-laws Book, and enters his record in the Historical Register.

In practice the Secretary maintains a list of candidates proceeding through the degrees, but after a reasonable time the name of the laggard should be dropped from the current list. A good way is to enter his name in pencil following the number reserved for him in the By-laws Book, enter the appropriate information in the Historical Ledger, including the date when the First Degree was conferred, and then forget about him, until or unless he "comes to life," learns the work, and is ready for the next

In my lodge, I maintain contact with an initiate for one year. at the end of which, if he has shown no interest or desire to learn the work, he becomes merely a statistic in the books mentioned above.

Q.

The son of one of our officers will be 21 on May 10. Can_ we receive his petition and vote on him so that he may receive his First Degree on his birthday?

A similar situation was presented to Most Wor. William S. Farmer in 1920, and he ruled that "No petition can be received from a candidate under twenty-one years of age, irrespective of the fact that he might attain that age before any degree is conferred upon him." This was approved by Grand Lodge, and became part of our Masonic Law.

In 1947, one of our lodges in Monroe County requested special dispensation to receive the petition of one under age. This request was refused by Most Wor. Gay H. Brown on the grounds that the Grand Master possesses no authority to override the law as established.

The law, then, is that the applicant must have reached his 21st birthday before his petition may be presented to the Lodge. It, thereupon, follows the usual course: Referral to a Committee of Investigation, report and ballot.


