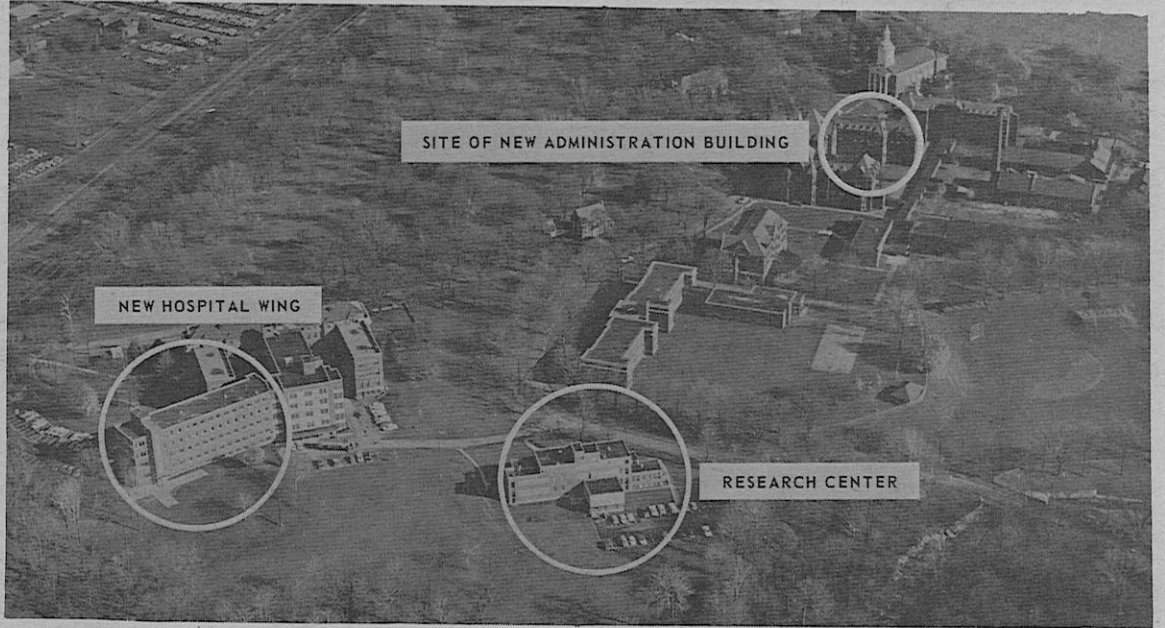


PROGRESS AT UTICA SPURS FUND DRIVE

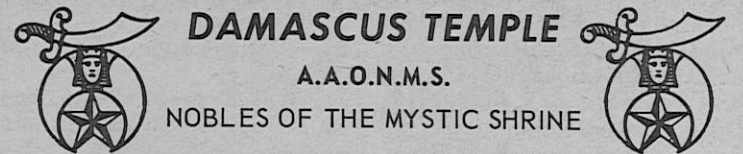

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

Q. I visited a Lodge recently where the chairs of the Masters of Ceremony were on the platform on each side of the Senior Warden, and the chairs of the Stewards were on a level with the Junior Warden. Didn't the Grand Lecturer tell us that they must be on the floor level in front of the platforms?

A. In spite of our efforts at the District Convention, and in the Schools of Ritual and Lodge Administration, some lodges still violate this rule of Masonic practice. There is even a layout in the Grand Lodge Monitor, facing page 1, showing the chairs of Masters of Ceremony and Stewards on the floor level in front of the Wardens' platforms. No officer should sit on a level with Master or Wardens, save the Chaplain on the left of the Master, and an honored guest or guests on the right who may be invited to a seat in the East.

Brethren:

The two Monroe Districts are about to embark upon a great undertaking -- the 1966 Brotherhood Fund Campaign.

When I visited your Lodge during the fall, I mentioned some of the responsibilities we accepted upon being made Master Masons. One of the greatest responsibilities we have is benevolence. internationally known on television and at film festivals and that he has been traveling across Canada and the U.S.A., and out to Bermuda and the Bahamas with his film lectures and is widely recognized as a wildlife expert and widely respected for his work in conservation education.

This year's show was filmed in the red rock country of Arizona and Utah. It shows Bryce, Zion, and Creek Canyons. The Navajos in Monument Valley, Glen Canyon Dam, Lake Powell and the threat to Rainbow Bridge, but especially the Grand Canyon. Earl filmed it from the air. He saw and filmed the bottom of the canyon as it is seen when traveling on foot by horseback. He went down among the Havasupi, the people who live at the bottom of the Grand Canyon and came out with superb pictures of them and of the superb waterfalls of Havasu Creek.

Wildlife subjects range from the rare and beautiful Kaibab squirrel to the bighorn sheep.

Once again, Union Star Lodge #320 of Honeoye Falls, N.Y. is carrying the ball but every lodge and every Mason should get behind this affair. Bring your family, bring your friends and sell as many tickets as possible to non Masons. There is no better opportunity to promote Masonry and bring our works to the attention of the community.

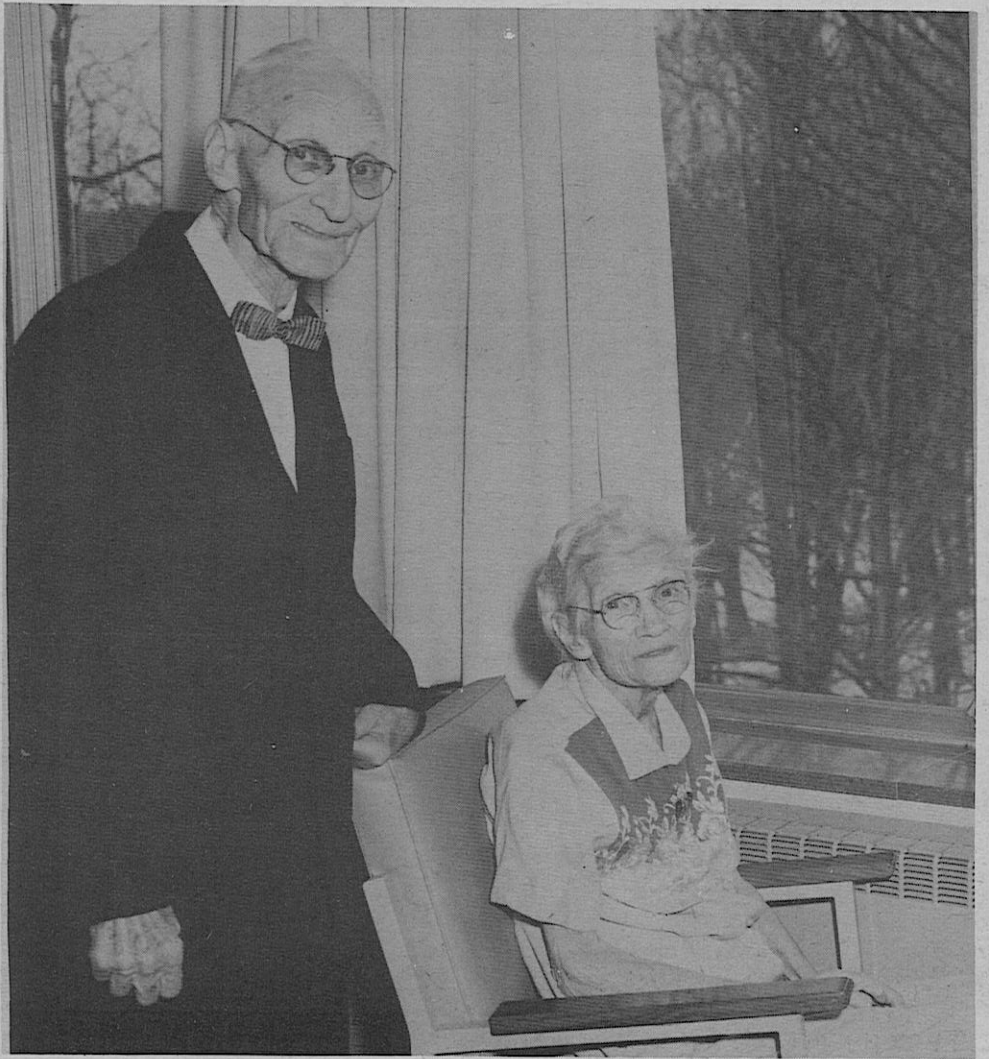
DEMOLAY & TRIANGLE AID BROTHERHOOD FUND
