BROTHERHOOD FUND SETS RECORDS



BROTHERHOOD FUND DRIVE REPORT MEETING OF APRIL 1, 1966

Dear Brethren:

By now all of you are aware that our current FRED J. Brotherhood Fund Drive, which has been making progress, is drawing to a successful conclusion. The returns to date show that the increase in the number of contributors, as well as the increase in the dollar value, is substantially higher

than last year's figures. Based on this, it is reasonable to assume that before the campaign is officially over with on May 31, 1966 that over 40% of the Masons in the two districts will have contributed to this fund. This figure represents an approximate increase of 100% over last year's contributors. Dollar-wise, we expect that the income from the two districts will increase in the same proportion.

Both of these achievements represent a major improvement over our usual Brotherhood Fund Drive results. If we were to examine the reasons for this marked improvement we could only conclude that these accomplishments would not have been possible without the unceasing efforts on the part of many, many people. While it is always hazardous to risk mentioning names, because of the possibility that someone may be overlooked, I will nonetheless accept this hazzard because of our indebtedness to so many dedicated people.

At the outset we were fortunate in having for our Upstate Chairman a fellow of R:W: Leonard Parker's stature who was so ably assisted by the two Area Chairman - R:W: Everett VanPutte and R:W: Sidney Odell. Closer to home and in our own two districts we were particularly pleased in obtaining the services of Brother David Crumrine and R:W: Don Walzer, who agreed to act as the General Chairmen of the First and Second Monroe Districts. These two gave unceasingly of their time, efforts, and dedication to their task. They provided the driving force which sustained us

throughout the campaign.

As the plans developed for the mailing portion of our campaign it soon became evident that much assistance would be required to perform the countless chores on hand. We found unlimitless help in the person of George Wetzel and Emery Carey of the Masonic News, Both of these brethren cooperated splendidly with respect to all matters pertaining to addressing the thousands of letters and otherwise providing all sorts of printing services. In addition, they gave freely of space in the News to publicize the campaign. After the envelopes were prepared the collating and stuffing of the several pieces of literature would have been impossible without the help of the Triangle girls and the DeMolay boys of both the Rochester and Genesee Valley Chapters. These GRAND BALL youngsters donated approximately twenty hours apiece, and we had a total of about twenty-four in attendance. (I fully believe that were it not for their help I would still be stuffing envelopes in preparation for the campaign.) At the other end of the spectrum, as the returns began to come in, David Crumrine solicited the help of some of his office staff to help sort and re-mail the returns. I understand that his office staff is still behind in their work because of their generous support.

Early in the campaign Brother Stewart Rice, who is in the advertising field, suggested that an extensive newspaper publicity campaign might be very helpful in selling our cause. When it finally developed that this would not be possible, he countered with a germ of an idea that perhaps a documentary film might be of tremendous value. In this new undertaking, which was suggested by the Masters of 1965, many people (Brothers and others) extended themselves in the belief that the Brotherhood Fund Campaign should and would be a success. They were not denied -- all previous Monroe records have been surpassed and as the final solicitations are made, nearly 40% of the Brothers from the Lodges in the Monroe Districts will have contributed about \$25,000 to the Fund.

The cooperation and publicity of the Monroe Masonic News and the individual efforts of its W: Emery Carey and W: George Wetzel made a significant contribution to

this successful campaign.

Brother Stu Rice gave unselfishly of himself in developing the idea and having produced the TV film programs and its by-product, a film which can and will be used throughout New York State. The difficult and frustrating problems encountered in producing a film like this are beyond comprehension and defy the imagination but were overcome by the diligent efforts of Brother Rice.

The direct mailing was made possible only by the energy and ththusiasm of two youth groups -- the Triangle girls and the DeMolay boys. The efforts of the Lodge Chairman assured a successful campaign by following up the general mailings and the TV programs with an every member canvas. They did the leg work, alot of book work and carried the campaign to its final goal. Of course, they had their industrious committees

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual. symbolism, history and law.

EDITORS NOTE: As we go to press R: W: Bro. Herman is recuperating from an emergency eye operation. The Masonic News staff wish him a speedy recovery.

I came across a news item from Birmingham, Michigan, that a Rabbi and his congregation, which had been meeting in the Masonic Temple, were asked to find another meeting place because the Rabbi had announced recently that he was an atheist, and that his congregation now concerns itself with 'the development of man, rather than with belief in God. I always assumed that all Rabbis who serve Jewish congregations were basically believers in God.' Am I wrong?

When Rabbi Sherwin T. Wine of the Birmingham Jewish Temple came out in public with his views several weeks ago, it created a great deal of discussion among Jewish religious leaders. With very few exceptioned, the great majority felt that a Rabbi who holds such views ought to give up the rabbinate.

The foundation of the Jewish religion, accepted by Reform and Orthodox alike, is a firm belief in God. The basic prayer, proclaimed at every religious service, is 'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might. (Deuteronomy, 6:4 and 5). This principle is repeated many times in the laws of Moses, in the Prophets, and in the Psalms.

The second great principle of the Jewish faith is the 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.' (Leviticus, 19: 18), and repeated in many forms throughout the Bible.

When Rabbi Wine announces himself as an atheist, then in my judgement he and those of his congregants who remained with him have read themselves out of the Jewish faith.

It should be noted that Judaism has no supreme or central authority that has the power to try them and officially pass judgement. Hence the Congregation can continue to call itself Jewish, even though it denies the very foundation of Judaism. However, since religion in its broad sense is a basic principle of Freemasonry, I concur with the action of the Grand Master of Michigan in asking them to find another meeting place.
