TEMPLE CIVIC CENTER REPORT FROM TRUSTEES

The following projects were completed during July and August:

- 1. Blacktopped weeded area alongside of sidewalks and east side of Auditorium and parking lot.
- 2. Erected 175 ft. of new fence in parking lot and repairing existing fence and installed barb wire.
- 3. Installed new coat rack, new hangers and replaced benches with ganged metal folding chairs and 10 straight back wooden chairs. Installed two new type Scott towel dispensers. All this in the Consistory Robing Room.
- 4. Repaired floor in Gothic Lounge.
- 5. Installed small mercury vapor light in small parking lot.
- 6. All Offices and hallways on Main Floor cleaned and polished. The long hallway, the sides were washed.
- 7. All Lodge Rooms thoroughly cleaned, woodwork polished, rugs dry cleaned. Clean drapes were put up in Room B.
- 8. Offices on second floor cleaned and polished.
- 9. Kitchens in basement, 2nd and 3rd floors thoroughly cleaned and inventoried. All

- appliances cleaned.
- 10. All Ladies' and Men's Room cleaned.
- 11. The chandeliers cleaned and old bulbs replaced in all Lodge Rooms.
- 12. The Robing Rooms cleaned.
- 13. Sixth floor floors washed and waxed.
- 14. All front and back -stairways washed down.
- 15. All windows on each floor washed on inside.
- 16. Four bathrooms in Auditorium cleaned. Cleaned hallways, steps going down, polished furniture, on 2nd and 3rd floor and washed all windows in Main Lobby of the Auditorium.

OPERATION AND RE-SEARCH COMMITTEE

The following projects were completed during July and August:

- 1. Replaced old electrical panel board in basement and separated Temple from Auditorium. Installed separate meter for Auditorium.
- 2. Installed new rugs in Doric and Ionic Halls.
- 3. Put down new floor in Fellowcraft rooms. Replaced chairs with new metal folding chairs. Replaced old tables with new dining room type table. Equipped each Fellowcraft room and snack bar with aluminum coat racks. Equipped snack bar with new stove, refrigerator and sink.

MASONS AND KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS STEAK ROAST

An event of what is certain to be looked upon as one of historical importance took place in Canandaigua Saturday evening, June 17, when the local Knights of Columbus and Canandaigua Lodge No. 294 Free and Accepted Masons held a joint steak roast near the shores of beautiful Canandaigua Lake. During and after a very delicious steak dinner prepared by the combined efforts of both organizations, the air of brotherhood reached from both sides across a centuries-old barrier which, it was felt by all, has existed far too long.

Just like a feeling of ease which exists between two individuals after a long quarrel, so did the feeling of the easing of tension between the members of the two groups, especially among the younger members, appear to be taking place. The sentiment of both groups collectively was that this beautiful starry evening should be only the beginning of a combined cooperation of all religious groups toward a common goal of mutual understanding and cooperation. This sentiment was expressed not only by the Roman Catholics and Protestants, but also by the members of the Jewish faith who were present. A combining of faiths and the two organizations in all probability will never occur and should not, but cooperation among all toward one common end should be stressed, it was felt by all.

The only formalities observed were a simple Grace and a short statement by the district deputy of each organization, both to the effect as to how wonderful and meaningful this evening's event were. The sentiment that similar events would certainly be held in the near future was prevalent among the entire gathering.

BRO. EARL HILFIKER A WELL TRAVELED MAN

Hardly had the curtain been rung down on the Hilfiker Show on February 26th before I headed out again. On March 1st I was in Connecticut on March 2nd in State College, Pennsylvania, on March 6th in Midland, Texas. So began a several thousand mile speaking tour that took me down into Old Mexico, back through the south west, the deep south, the midwest and finally to Rochester again for a short breathing spell before starting another longer trip to the far west to film new material. My most unusual luck was with pictures of mountain goats. This last trip took me back into the high country of Colorado,

thence to the Canyon country and the land of the Navajo. From there we traveled West through the south west desert to the Pacific and then headed up the coast north into Western Canada, back through glaciator, and the Dakotas to Rochester again.

In Little Rock I had a few hours time and took the opportunity to visit the beautiful building which houses both the Scottish Rite Temple and the Grand Lodge of Arkansas.

In Colorado we visited a restored mining town at Fair Play and one of the special points of interest was the room where the Masonic Lodge met. It was so small that almost, by just standing up from their chairs, the Worshipful Master could reach across and shake hands with the Junior and Senior Wardens. But it is eloquent evidence that Masons were active in the days of the gold rush and in the rip roaring mining town they exerted their influence for law, order and good citizens.

Ample evidence that Masons looked after their brothers lies in the cemeteries around the former mining towns such as Virginia City where those who came to their ends by being strung up or shot down were planted in Boot Hill. There the Catholic Church gave Christian burial to Irish miners and in a third cemetery there are the neat and sometimes impressive headstones of the Masons buried there.

At Powell Point on the South rim of Grand Canyon is a monument erected by the members for the Grand Lodge of Arizona.

At Toas, New Mexico, Kit Carson's home is maintained as a Museum by his Masonic Lodge as Memorial to the famous brother who was a Mountain Man, Scout, Indian fighter and finally a full Colonel who worked with and for the Apache and the Navajo.

At Carmel, California beside the church is a Biblical garden containing plants one reads about in the Bible, and those mentioned in Masonic teachings.

One high point is a visit to Santa Rosa, famous for its church made from the wood of a single redwood log but best known because of the work of Brother Luther Burbank of world fame as the plant wizard. Anyone who wishes to see what the accacia looks like can find fine specimen trees growing in his garden which has been made into a park. Anyone looking for the grave of Luther Burbank will find no headstone. His remains lie under the roots of a giant cedar of Lebanon which he planted in front of his home. Earl L. Hilfiker

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

Q. We have a request for a Masonic Service from the family of a Mason who was unaffiliated in 1954. Are we right in refusing the request?

A. A brother who is unaffiliated for non-payment of dues has lost the right of Masonic Burial. Grand Lodge, however, recognized that such refusal may cause mental anguish to a family bowed in grief. An explanation to the family that the brother was "unaffiliated," or "dropped from the rolls," (of which they may even have been unaware), may mean to them some form of "expulsion," and they would wonder what their husband or father might have done to be "expelled." Grand Lodge has, therefore, left it to the Master of the Lodge, at his discretion, to conduct the Masonic Service, if he so chooses.

My own feeling is that if a request comes from the family of a former member, whether unaffiliated or demitted, (if he has led an upright life), the Service be conducted, and no reference made to the family in any shape or manner, that the deceased was not a member in good standing.

Q. I have read in a Masonic book that a large assembly of Masons was held in York, England, over a thousand years ago. Can you tell us something about it?

A. The oldest Masonic document in existence, the Regius Poem, composed about the year 1390, gives King Athelstan of England a prominent place in Masonic history. He is named as the Patron of Masonry under whose authority the first general assembly of Masons was at York, in 926 A.D. This was repeated in the many Masonic documents which followed, and by masonic writers and speakers, right down to recent times. The story was that this authority was given by King Althelstan to his son, Edwin, (some documents say, his brother Edwin), who became a Mason, and arranged to hold such assemblies yearly.

There is no historical record which would prove that such a Masonic assembly was ever held. Masonic lodges during operative days, so far as it has been possible to discover, were purely local groups organized for mutual aid, protection and sociability. King Athelstan (also spelled Athelstane, Adelstone), grandstone of King Alfred the Great, ascended the throne in 925 A.D., was victorious in the wars with the Scots and Danes, and proclaimed himself King over all England. He had no son, Edwin, nor brother, and we must therefore assume that the account is legendary.

It is believed by some historians that the assemblies to which reference was made in the Masonic documents were actually general assemblies to which "lords, dukes, earls, barons, knights, squires," sheriffs etc. were invited to discuss and promulgate general laws and regulations. Masonic writers, centuries later, assumed them to be Masonic assemblies.

It is interesting to note further that those early manuscripts and the Masonic writers who followed trace Masonic "history" back, not to King Solomon, but to the period before Noah and the Flood (1200 years before Solomon), to the sons of Lamech, great, great grandson of Adam (according to the Biblical account). Lamech bore three sons, Jabell, Juball and Tubal Cain, "who with their sister founded all the crafts of the world, and gave birth to Masonry." All of this is, of course, pure legend.

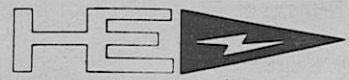

WHAT CAN I DO FOR FREE-MASONRY?

This is not just a rhetorical question. The collective answer given by some four million American Masons will determine whether Freemasonry shall continue its position of preeminence in our national life or be relegated to a status of impotence and decadence.

In our lodges and in our publications we have long gloried in the dominant positions and influence exercised by members of the Craft in the launching of this great Republic and in guiding its early destinies. In the signing of the Declaration of Independence and in the Constitutional Convention, the numbers of Masons far exceeded their proportion in the general population. These were not nominal Masons. They were deeply steeped in the Ancient Landmarks from long active participation in the affairs of their lodges. They believed with ardor in the tenets of the Order and saw in them the guide lines for a great nation. The significant thing is that these brethren knew Masonry, practiced Masonry and believed in Masonry. The principles and procedures of government which they devised have provided the noblest government known to man.

Despite one or two periods of persecution, Masonry grew along with the nation until about one man in twenty was enrolled in its membership. Lodges spread to remote hamlets and the movement became affluent. However, there are signs that changes in the philosophy and the pattern of American life pose a threat to our well-being as an institution. Signs of decadence are appearing. In the last reports, fourteen Grand Lodges show a net loss in membership. Blue Lodge attendance has fallen off nationally 5% to 8%. Masons in positions of leadership are

not, in the main, men who maintain an active interest in their lodges and are not deeply steeped in the principles of Masonry. While it is risky business to judge other men's purposes, from all one can tell they are using the Fraternity for their own gain.

What are some of the conditions which are causing our difficulties?

1. The proliferation of organizations and activities due in part to the urbanization of our population. Where once the church and the lodge occupied dominant positions in the social life of rural American, men now belong to a host of organizations each actively competing for their time. And, sad to say, Masonry seldom wins in the struggle.

2. The growth of giant corporations has produced a new breed known as the company man. His time and to all effects, his soul is owned by his employer. Small business men in the press of stern competition devote most of their waking hours to their businesses. It can be truthfully said that business manages men more than men manage business.

3. In large communities, applicants to lodges are known to very few of the members. Investigating committees frequently do an inadequate job. Men get into the lodge who should not be admitted. Lodges seem to be more interested in numbers than in quality.

4. Coaches teach ritual fairly adequately but fail, in a large part, to instill into candidates an adequate appreciation of the basic principles of the Order, its ideals and its demands. We need a new brand of coach.

5. We are not attracting the caliber of men into the officers' line that we formerly did. It is not enough that a Master be a fine character and a good fellow. He needs to be an excellent ritualist and an outstanding executive to plan and carry out an attractive program for the members. The ritualistic capabilities deserve more stress. There is nothing more desolating and interest-destroying for the members to sit thru an uninspired, inaccurate rendition of the ritual.

6. Despite the glib assent of many candidates to the interrogations of the Marshal, there is a measure of hypocrisy in the answers. There are some who are just curious and that curiosity is soon satisfied. We seldom see these men in lodge after the third degree. There are too many who hope to capitalize on their membership to advance their business, their social status or their political ambitions. The basic question asked by too large a proportion of our candidates is, "What can Masonry do for me?"

The answer to these problems is not an easy one. We are dealing with the frailties of human nature. The basic answer is what we need to put more Masonry into men. We need to change the prevailing question to "What can I do for Masonry?" Only in the early contacts of the lodge with the candidate can we hope to establish the proper attitudes.

It begins with the Investi-

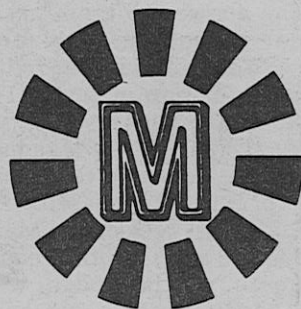

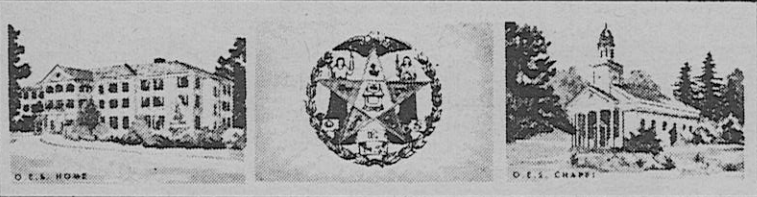

gating Committee. Its members have the difficult task of determining the motives of the applicant. It is not easy but, with skill, the interviewer can many times detect a desire for unworthy gain. A committee member, at this early state can frequently help to determine attitudes.

No candidate should appear for his first degree before the Master has met him in conference to explain what Masonry involves, what he can expect, and what the Fraternity demands of him.

It has already been mentioned how vital a role the coach plays. In the hours he spends with the candidate, he can help materially to instruct the neophyte in much more than ritual. He can specifically inspire him to want to render service to a new loyalty.

The Master should make every endeavor to find a significant chore for every newly raised member. The refreshment committee is the most commonly used but on a very transient basis. But, how about a Masonic dramatic actors group? There are several fine Masonic plays. Why not put new men on a reception committee at the door, the better to meet and know their new brethren? Or how about asking them to call on ill or elderly members? An ingenious Master can find other significant services that need to be rendered. The key issue is to make the new member aware that service is an integral part of membership, while he is yet young

in the Craft and more impressionable than he will ever be later if allowed to drift.

It may be brash to suggest that High Twelve, with its relatively small membership, can help bring about such a metamorphosis in attitude. Jesus entrusted the appallingly huge task of establishing his Church to a tiny band of humble ex-artisans, tax collectors and fisherman.

We have proved that we attract into our clubs the most idealistic and active Masons. If, thru the encouragement and leadership of High Twelve International and its State Associations, they were encouraged to carry this torch, we could have a fine constructive influence in changing the conception of the average Mason of his true relation to the Fraternity and of his obligations to it.

Behind this force of traitor Communists, continually gnawing away like termites at the very foundation of American society, stand a half-million fellow travelers and sympathizers.

If each of us does his duty, the outcome is certain. The Supreme Architect will give us strength, wisdom and guidance to triumph against the onrush of Red Fascism and Atheistic Communism.

Why Washington Became A Mason

"My first desire to become a Mason was due to the fact that many of Virginia's noblest sons were members of the Fraternity," wrote George Washington. "Therefore, it was not without forethought that on Saturday evening, November 4, 1772, in the village of Fredericksburg, I was made an Entered Apprentice Mason.

"The Masonic lessons I learned on my admission to Masonry and my contact and conversation with prominent Masons thereafter were of the greatest encouragement in after years when I encountered and underwent trials, especially those at the commencement and during the Revolution.

"It was at this time that friendly counsel reached my ears to the effect that some of the men regarded me as a slave owner and an aristocrat and that they abhorred my Episcopacy. I decided at once to dispel such thoughts from my comrades' minds and, on one occasion, sat in a Masonic Lodge at Cambridge of which an Orderly-Sergeant was Master. I made it a point to 'meet upon the level' and 'part upon the square' with all my comrades, regardless of rank or position, and my reward was the loyalty and friendship of all far beyond my expectation.

"There is no doubt in my mind that Masonry and its lessons were helpful throughout the Revolution both upon the battlefield and in the Legislative assembly."

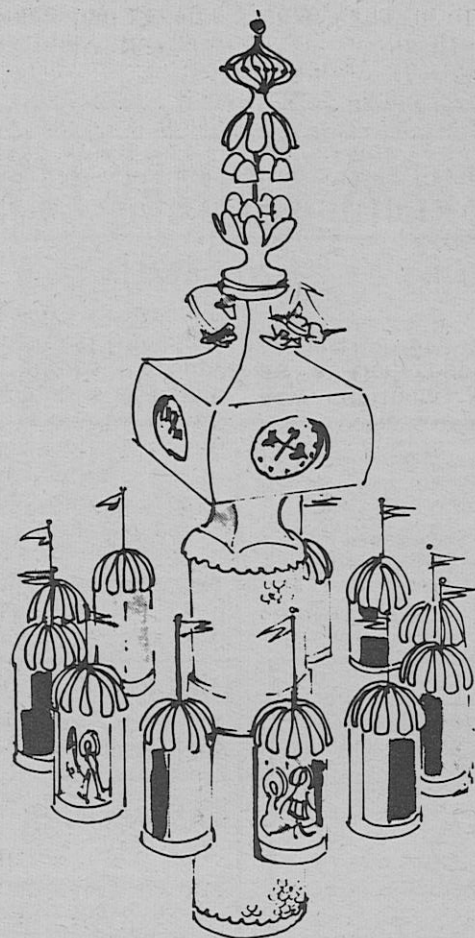
