It is with pleasure and pride that Damascus Temple and Rochester Consistory invite you to attend our combined Third Annual Clambake.

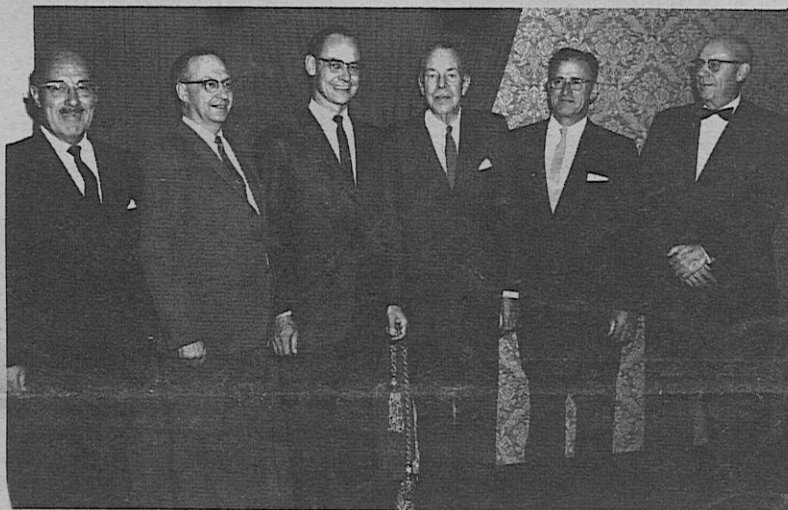

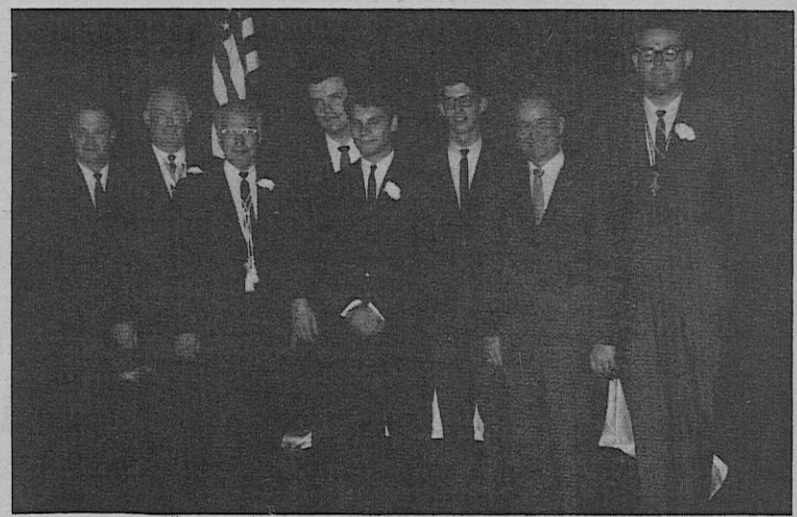

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Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c/o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

Q. I know that one of our great principles is harmony. But must a Masonic annual meeting be so cut and dried? I am a new Mason, and attended my first annual meeting. First came the annual reports, at the conclusion of each of which the Master announced, "The report will be received and placed on file." The budget was read, and the Master announced, "If there is no objection, the budget is adopted as read." Then came the election of officers, and now I expected that I would vote for the officers in accordance with the summons which I had received. A brother rose: "I nominate Bro.....to serve as Master of this Lodge for the ensuing year, and I ask unanimous consent to cast one ballot for Bro.....as Master." The Master then asked for a report of the tellers: "We find one vote cast for Bro..... for Master." The other officers were similarly elected. I wondered what I was doing there, and went away, promising myself never to attend another annual meeting. Why should't Masonry change its procedure and give the members the opportunity to actually vote for the officers?

A. This, my new Brother, is one of my pet Masonic peevs. I too, have writhed when visiting some lodges at their annual meeting, to witness an election similar to what you describe. Let me hasten to state that there is nothing in Masonry which prescribes such a procedure. Section 302 of the Book of Constitutions of the Grand Lodge states that: "The Master, Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Treasurer and Secretary of a chartered Lodge must be chosen annually by ballot." It is my belief that the ballot for officers is so fundamentally a prerogative of the brethren present, that such an election as you describe, if challenged, might be declared illegal. Of this I am certain, such a procedure does its share to keep many Masons away from the annual meetings. I like a procedure similar to that followed at our Grand Lodge elections. This involves nomination, seconding, and a question by the presiding officer: "Are there any further nominations?" If there is more than one nomination for any office, a secret ballot would be required. If there is only one nomination, a motion may be made: "I move that nominations be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast one unanimous ballot for Bro.....to serve as.....of this Lodge for the ensuing year." After the motion is seconded, "All in favor of this motion, signify by the ancient voting sign of a Master Mason." "All opposed by a like sign." The motion is carried (unanimously), I therefore declare Bro.....elected to serve as.....of this Lodge for the ensuing year."

An alternate method is for the presiding officer to state, "There being but one nomination, a vote by show of hands is permissible. All in favor of the election of Bro.....to serve as.....of this Lodge for the ensuing year signify by the ancient voting sign of a Master Mason." All opposed by a like sign." "The motion is carried (unanimously), I therefore declare Bro.....duly elected to serve as.....of this Lodge for the ensuing year."

Such procedure would not only be legally valid, but would give the brethren present the satisfying feeling that they are an important part of the meeting, and that it is their ballot which has elected the officers.

Q. Is there any significance to the names used in the roll-call of the Third Degree?

A. The names of the twelve craftsmen are those of the twelve tribes of Israel, as depicted in the Old Testament. These tribes, according to the Biblical account, stemmed from the sons of Jacob, except that Joseph was replaced by his two sons, Ephraim and Manassehand the tribe of Levi were set aside as the religious functionaries, and in the land of Israel were svattered among the other tribes.

The order in which the names occur in our ritual follows the line of march of the children of Israel through the wilderness. According to the account in the Book of Numbers, Chapter 2, the Israelites were divided into four battalions or "camps", each consisting of three tribes. Each of these "camps" had a leader, or principal tribe, which marched or camped at the head with its banner prominently displayed. The four principal tribes, and their order of march, were Judah, Reuben, Ephraim and Dan. Directly following each of these tribes in succession were Issachar, Simeon, Manasseh, Asher, and bringing up the rear of each in succession were Zebulon, Gad, Benjamin and Naphtali.

GROTTO CONVENTION

Lalla Rookh Grotto won the well-deserved "Host with the Most" title during the "Spirit of '76" convention of the Grottoes of North America in Rochester, N.Y., June 16-18, largest and most successful convention in the 76-year history of the organization.

The event celebrated the 76th birthday of the Mystic Order of Veiled Prophets of the Enchanted Realm founded in Hamilton, N.Y. in 1890 as the LeRoy Fairchild Deviltry Committee, which now has a membership of some 100,000 Masons in 201 Grottoes throughout North America. It is also known as "The Fraternity that Friendship Built." Immediate Past Grand Monarch Mueller, demonstrated the courage and good sport qualities of royal blood when he helped raise the 320 foot high Xerox crane to hang an antique lantern on its summit - signal to the world that a Grotto meeting was in progress.

A highlight of the convention was the gala parade on Saturday, June 18, when delegations from all parts of North America marched down Main Street between curbstones packed with watchers; and a languid Prophet billed as "Tired Blood" flipped a lethargic wrist in salute to Grand Line officials in the Reviewing Stand, while one watcher murmured "Tired blood is what these jumpling Prophets haven't got."

The Enchanted Lantern, symbol of the Prophets help to crippled children and the serious purpose of the organization, illuminated the convention. Prophets, presented a check for \$25,000 to Dr. Brewster Miller of United Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation, bringing their total contribution to date to \$275,000; and reported gifts of over \$1 million since 1960 to other worthy causes in their own communities.

Generous support was pledged for the coming year, and the conversation of Prophets' ladies centered not on bridge, hairdos and clothes, but on their visits to crippled children's centers and the joy that the smiles on the youngsters' faces brought them.

Prophets had honor not only in their own country, but internationally during the entire convention week. They were on television daily. Governor Nelson Rockefeller, and many other governors issued official proclamations decreeing June 12 - 18 as Mirth and Merriment Week in the Prophet's honor. The Right Honorable Lester B. Pearson, Prime Minister of Canada, wired congratulations to all the Master Masons who are members of the "Fraternity that Friendship Built." His message was read by Harry Mueller at the Grand Monarch's banquet in the Manger Hotel.

The "Spirit of '76" was a great convention, Mirth and merriment eddied out of Rochester and traveled across the continent. But beneath the froth of frolic surged Masonry's great spirit of reverence and concern for others, enveloping crippled little children in the protection of men who care.
