appeal on the general topic of Lodge Attendance. Special functions sponsored by the Masonic Service Bureau, the Masters and Wardens Association, an individual Lodge or a Concordant Body are usually well attended. At least a large number of Masons are present though probably only a small percentage of those eligible. However, this does result in a good representation of Masonic Bodies throughout the District. The Grand Lodge Annual Communication can be very interesting, something all of us should be concerned with. It is expected that the Masters will have an interesting and informative report on the events of the meetings when they return. So make a note to be present on this occasion too, to hear all about it; you will be glad that you did.



Your selections will be sent to you by parcel post. There is no charge for this service other than the return postage of the book. Ask for their Service Letter on "Masonry at Home" and "How to Use Your Masonic Library and Museum." This is your Library; use it.

Dear Brother Herman

Our Lodge, owing to a large deficit on its Ladies' Night Party, has used up all funds allocated in the budget for "Refreshments and Entertainment," does that mean that we must cut out luncheons and social affairs, unless they are self-supporting?

A budget is defined in the dictionary as "an estimate,

A budget is defined in the dictionary as "an estimate," A often itemized, of expected income and expenditures.' budget is, therefore, a guide for the Lodge in gauging its expenditures for the year, based upon expected income. But a budget, even though it had been adopted by vote of the Lodge, does not become a hard and inflexible limitation on Lodge expenditures. Furthermore, adopting of the budget does not constitute authorization to expend any funds. It has been held a number of times that the control of Lodge funds rests with the Lodge, and funds may be disbursed only "by order of the Lodge, when certified by the Master and Secretary." (Const. 312) "and no by-law is valid which substitutes for the vote of the Lodge membership the action of the Master, ... a committee, or any other body.

Hence, even though an item is in the budget, the actual disbursement of funds for the item must be by vote of the Lodge for each expenditure. When the amount appropriated in the budget has been totally used up, the Lodge may still continue to vote expenditures for that item.

Q.
Our Master announced that a brother is waiting to receive the Second Degree, and asked if there was any objection. A member rose and stated that he objected to the brother receiving the degree. The Master asked why he objected, and instead of giving a reason the member requested that a ballot be taken. The Master consulted with a Past Master, and then ruled that a ballot could not be taken until the next communication, and that he would appoint a committee to "look into the matter." Was the Master right?

A.
The Master was wrong on at least three counts: 1. When the brother, a member of the Lodge, raised objection to the advancement of the candidate, the Master should not have asked for the reason, but should have postponed the conferral of the degree, and sent the candidate home. Section 358 of the Constitution states: "An objection must be respected, and will defer the initiation of a candidate or the advancement of a brother until a subsequent communication." The Section further states that if objection is raised at a subsequent communication against the same candidate for the same degree (whether by the same or another brother), the Master may ignore it and announce that there being no objection, he will proceed with the

It is, of course, embarrassing to send a candidate home who has been invited to receive a degree. A simple plan is for an officer to go out and inform the candidate that "we are very sorry that we are not in position to confer the degree this evening. You will hear from the Secretary

when the degree can be conferred.'.

2. The Master was wrong on the request for a ballot. It should have been taken immediately, without any question or discussion. Sect. 358 States: "a ballot for each degree is an undeniable right if demanded ... and ... may be taken at a Stated, or a Special Communication called for the purpose of conferring the degree." The effect of the ballot, if cloudy, upon a candidate for initiation (before the first degree), differs from its effect upon a candidate for advancement (before the second or third degrees). A ballot taken before the First Degree has the same effect as the initial ballot following the report of the Investigating Committee. If the ballot is "cloudy," the candidate is rejected and must wait twelve months before submitting another petition to the same or any other Lodge. A ballot taken before the second or third degree, if cloudy, holds up the advancement. The petition may be resubmitted at the next Stated Communication, and a ballot taken at the succeeding Stated Communication. If the ballot is still cloudy, the procedure may continue for six months. After six months, the brother may petition any other Lodge within our Grand Jursidiction for the remaining degrees and for membership in that Lodge. The Petition will then take its usual course, and if the ballot is favorable, the Lodge, upon receiving a waiver of jurisdiction from the original Lodge, may confer the remaining degree or degrees upon him, and upon signing the by-laws, becomes a member of that Lodge. (Const.

Sect. 359).

3. The Master was wrong in appointing a committee.
From time imemorial, the ballot has been held sacred, and any inquiry into the kind of ballot cast by a brother, or disclosure of how a ballot was cast is a Masonic any disclosure of how a ballot was cast is a Masonic offense. By implication, it would appear to me that an inquiry of a brother as to why he requested a ballot, or raised an objection would be entirely out of order. In fact, our Constitutions specifically state that "the name of the brother objecting or making a demand for a new ballot shall not be entered on the minutes."

May I state in conclusion that these situations are discussed in our School of Lodge Administration. Had either the Master or the Past Master who advised him attended the School, they would have known how to handle the

IONIC CHAPTER NO. 210 ROYAL ARCH MASONS

YORK RITE MASONRY

What is York Rite Masonry, that, which, "every Master Mason of the Sublime Degree should be?" Masonry stands for the continual promotion of Brotherly Love, Religious Freedom, and a Democracy which will bring Peace and Happiness to men of all Creeds and Nations. Then, Continuing ones' Masonic Education, each Master Mason should take the following steps in the Capitular Rites. This is known as the "Fourth Step", and con-sists of four degrees that are legitimate, ancient and traditional, and are: -

1. Degree of Mark Master Mason. This Degree is perhaps as old as, if not older, than any other Degree of Ancient Craft Masonry. It is so ancient, in fact, that its real origin cannot be exactly traced, but in 1598. in Scotland, Statutes were issued which required the Operative Mason to register his "Mark". It was then similar in its lesson and application to our first section of the degree, and these lessons relative to the "Mark" and its uses have not since been materially changed. With the Entered Apprentice Degree, their origin reaches back into "Time Immemorial".

2. Degree of Past Master

Mason. Records indicate

many historians have made. a deep study of the Craft, but, unfortunately, made no mention of the fact that in our earlier Masonic history in England, a declaration as to what constituted pure Ancient Craft Masonry, but stated very conclusively that it consisted of only three degrees, namely: Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft, and Master Mason, "including the Holy Royal Arch", This declaration was made when the two Grand Lodges of Freemasonry in England, formed a union in December 1813. The regulations were also such, that no Master Mason could receive the Holy Royal Arch, unless he had been "duly elected and regularly installed to preside over and govern" a regular and duly Constituted Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons. This Ancient regulation so limited the numbers of Royal Arch Masons that the Degree of Past Master was developed, and gives the privilege of "Passing the Chairs". It is an old Degree, and on May 12, 1725, it is of record that two Brethren were "passed Masters" in an English Lodge. In 1744, they mentioned "Brethren" as having "passed the Chairs". Four Brethren were "installed Masters" in a Lodge in Bolton, England, November 30, 1769. This probably is the oldest known record of installing Candidates and presumably seating them in the "Chair".

3. Degree of Most Excel-

lant Master Mason, Without question this is one of the most beautiful and impressive degrees in Freemasonry. Dealing with the Completion and Dedication of King Solomon's Temple, and is definitely in line with some of the work you have already witnessed, and is a very fitting prelude to the Royal Arch Degree. Tradition informs us that at the completion and dedication of the First Temple, King Solomon instituted a new "Order of Masons", and bestowed upon them the honorary appellation of Most Excellent Masters: and none but the meritorious and praiseworthy; none but those who, through diligence and industry, have advanced far towards perfection; none but those who have been seated in the Oriental Chair, by the unanimous consent of their Brethren, can be admitted

to this Degree of Masonry. The foundation of the Temple was laid by King Solomon in the year of the world, two thousand nine hundred and ninety two, and was finished in the year three thousand. About seven years and six months were consumed in its erection. It was dedicated in the year three thousands and one, with great solemnity, and in the presence of the assembled people of Isreal, to the worship of Jehovah.

The Degree of Holy Royal Arch Mason, will be given in the next issue of the Masonic News.
