

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism. history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

In the center of a circular stained glass window above the front door of our church in Webster, is a six-pointed star, consisting of two triangles interlaced. I am told it is the "Jewish Star." What is its significance? Why would it be inscribed in the church window?

A.

The six-pointed star which you describe is called the Shield of David (Mogen David, in Hebrew). It is the symbol of the Jewish faith, and is the emblem of the State of Israel. The organization in Israel corresponding to the Red Cross is called the "Red Mogen David," or the "Red Shield of David."

A shield is "something that protects." The ancient Hebrews believed that the Shield of David would act as a talisman or amulet to protect them against evil. This symbol has been found on a Hebrew seal dating from the seventh century B.C., (2,600 years ago), on a synagogue in Capernaun dating from the third century, in the Jewish catacombs in Rome, and many others.

It is also known as the Seal of Solomon, and as such was widespread among many other nations in the Orient. They held King Solomon in high esteem, not so much as a wise monarch, but as a great magician. The tradition was that he wore a signet ring, on which this talismanic seal was engraved and enabled him to accomplish most extraordinary feats. This symbol in ancient days was probably as widespread as any emblem, except perhaps the cross. It has been found in the cave of the Elephans in India, in Abyssinia (now Ethiopia) as the Order of the Seal of Solomon, on an Arabic amulet of the ninth century, and in the relics of the Knights Templar.

In more recent times, the mystic powers were discarded, and the Shield of David became the symbol of Judaism as the Cross is the symbol of Christianity. It is also the emblem of the State of Israel.

Meanwhile, during the Middle Ages, the magical powers of the Seal of Solomon were gradually forgotten, and it was adopted by the church as one of its symbols. The two triangles were given varying interpretations, sometimes of prayer and meditation, sometimes of prayer and remission, of creation and judgement. Finally, the church fathers seemed to have agreed that the triangles represent the two natures of Jesus, the human and the divine. It is this symbolism which the Star probably represents in this symbolism which the Star probably represents in church sculpture, and perhaps in your window.

But there is probably a more local reason for its selection. Following the disappearance of William Morgan, there was bitter controversy throughout the state and virulent hostility against the Masonic order. In 1830, the Baptist Church in Penfield was sharply divided on the issue, and the Pastor of the church, Elder Jason Corwin, who was a Mason, was forced to resign. Because of the bitter controversy, a number of members, mostly Masons, left the church and organized the North Penfield (now Webster) Baptist Church, and selected Elder Corwin as the Paster. The congregation being christian and largely Masonic, had high regard for King Solomon, who plays a big role in Masonic ritual, and probably chose the Seal of Solomon as the symbol to be placed over the church entrance.

THE ROCHESTER **REGIONAL RED CROSS BLOOD PROGRAM**

A great many members of our Masonic fraternity believe that we have some sort of a Masonic blood bank to care for the needs of our fraternity. We formerly did, several years ago, when the late Brother William Craw developed and worked diligently to keep our blood bank going. That was also about the time when the late beloved Al Sigl continually solicited donors for his blood program. Since that time, however, the American Red Cross has organized and promoted a program covering twelve adjacent counties. This is the only known bloodcollecting program in the United States where need alone determines eligibility. There is no charge for the blood itself, there is no limit. to the amount of blood you may receive, and as a resident of the Rochester Region, you are eligible to receive

blood anywhere in the United States or Canada. The entire supply of blood is from voluntary donors. Many donors give their blood at the Blood Center but most give right in their neighborhood or where they work. This is possible because of the visits of the Bloodmobiles through the twelve counties on scheduled visits. About 4,500 pints of whole blood are used each month in this 12 county region.


If you or anyone in your family needs blood, you are entitled to it but it is urged that this blood be replaced by someone so that the supply may be kept for others. Giving blood is painless and has no ill effects. Within less than 48 hours your body replaces the donated blood.

To give blood, you must be in good health, be at least 18 years old and not over 60 years, weigh at least 110 pounds and have not given blood within the past eight weeks. However, you can give as often as five times per year. Donations are never taken from persons with a history of hepatitis, jaundice or malaria.

It is through the charity and thoughtfulness of others that assures you that blood will be available to you if you ever need it. You can and should repay them by donating your blood to the Blood Bank.

Please join the thousands of people who help to give the truly priceless gift of health and perhaps life itself.


