

Gordon L.Stringer, son of Bro. & Mrs. B.Stringer and a member of Rochester Chapter, Order of DeMolay, is presently attending the State University Agriculture and Technical College at Alfred, New York majoring in Re-

search Chemistry. This Scholarship is available for use for study at an accredited four year college university. ## Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism. history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

I attended a Lodge meeting in Illinois, and noticed that they vote with the right hand, and not with the left. Which is correct?

We are so accustomed to vote with the left hand, which we call "the ancient viting sign of a Mason", that we assume that this is the universal practice.

Let me again state that we have 49 indepedent Grand Lodges in the United States, nine in Canada, and many more througout the world. Each of these Grand Lodges is solely responsible for its laws, rules, regulations, and customs. A limited number of basic principles and customs are common to all, and certain of them are mandatory for the

Grand Lodge of New York to extend Masonic recognition.
In the Grand Lodge of New York we vote with the left hand, and this practice prevails in a number of eastern Grand Lodges. In the large majority in this country, in England and other Grand Jurisdictions, the right hand is used which they call "the usual voting sign of a Mason." The practice dates back to 1736, when the Grand Lodge of England adopted the rule that "the opinion or votes of the members are always to be signified by each holding up one of his hands.

In a few Grand Jurisdictions in this country, I understand that Virginia is one of them, voting is by "aye" and "nay."
