HILFIKER Cont from Page 1 Gary Cooper became a U.S. Marshal who tried to keep law and order in a fight between sodbusters and cattle men. In the movie there were crops of corn "as high as an elephant's eye" until the cattle men drove their herds through the corn fields. Lily Langtry, the Jersey Lily was scheduled to give a performance in the opera house. There was a shootout between the marshal and the judge. The judge was killed and the last thing he saw was the vision of The Jersey Lily.

Langtry, Texas was originally called Vingaroon, the name of lizards that lived

there. The country is desert and 40 acres barely supports a scrawny steer. Twenty five men might be able to stand in the bar room of Roy Bean's Saloon but it would be crowded. The bar is about as long as the work counter of an average suburban house kitchen. The so called Opera House might seat seventy five people. Lily Langtry never saw Roy Bean and never visited Langtry, Texas until several years after he had died. Roy Bean was married to a Portugese wife, sired a large family and died in bed at a ripe old age. He never sentenced a horse thief or anyone else to be strung up.



Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism. history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

I note that few, if any, colored persons are Masonic brothers. I believe that most Negroes know little about Masonry, and are not apprised of the fact that they are welcomed into the fraternity. Should not our District Deputies establish a committee composed of one Officer from each Lodge to contact responsible Negro individuals and groups, explain Masonry and welcome petitions.

You show concern that there are "few, if any" Negroes who are members of Masonic Lodges. This implies that you are aware that there is nothing in Masonry to prevent a colored person, be he black or brown, or yellow, from petitioning a Masonic Lodge, and nothing to prevent a Lodge from electing him by the usual ballot. You are correct, however, in stating that there are not many Negroes within our Grand Lodge. There are Negroes in some Lodges in Metropolitan New York, and probably very few anywhere else in the state. We have had a number of Indians and Chinese active in Masonry. At present a chinese brother is Illustrious Potentate of a Shrine Temple in our State. Outside of our State, Alpha Lodge, Grand Lodge of New Jersey is wholly Negro. There is a Lodge of Negroes in the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, Canada, and there are many colored individuals in regular Masonic Lodges throughout the world.

You state that "Negroes know little about Masonry." You perhaps are unaware that Negroes have their own Masonry, organized as the Prince Hall Grand Lodge. which is a national association. There is a Lodge of Prince Hall Masons, under the Prince Hall Grand Lodge, in Rochester, and similar Lodges throughout New York State, and in most other states. I have been told that their ritual, which is identical with ours, is confirmed more effectively and more correctly than in many of our Lodges. In addition, the colored have their own Scottish Rite, York Rite, Grotto and Shrine, and take great pride in them.

You suggest that "responsible Negro individuals and groups be contacted, and, in effect, invited to petition Lodges under the jurisdiction of our Grand Lodge. This would be not only contrary to our basic prohibition against soliciting for members, but would be highly imprudent. If some desirable colored person, influenced by such a statement as you suggest, would petition one of the 31 Lodges in Monroe County, he might, under present attitudes and prejudices, be rejected. This could only result in heightened tensions and a negative reflection against our Craft.

May I state that I believe the day is not far distant when Prince Hall Masonry will be officially recognized by Grand Lodge as "legitimate." And some day in the future there will follow inter-visitation and cooperation.

If you are in an evangelistic mood, let me point out that there are many young men in the white community, fine and upright, who would make good Masons. Why not pass out copies of the "Primer of Freemasonry" which answers for the non-Mason basic questions about Masonry, and may lead to requests for petitions. Copies of the may be obtained from the Masonic Service "Primer" Bureau at Masonic Temple.

Should a Ruling Master be addressed as "Worthy Master"? Does he retain that address when he becomes Past Master? Or does he then become Right Worthy?

The title "Worthy" is not a Masonic title, but one used by the Eastern Star and other female organizations. In Masonry we use the title "Worshipful," which comes from an old Anglo-Saxon term "Worthshipful," meaning "worthy of respect." The Rulling Master is addressed as "Worshipful Master" on all formal occasions such as Lodge meetings, formal banquets, etc. On informal Masonic occasions such as after meeting luncheons, Ladies Night parties, etc., he may be addressed as Worshipful Brother (Jones, Smith, or whatever his last name may be). When he becomes a Past Master he retains the title "Worshipful Brother" the rest of his life.

The title "Right Worshipful" is given to a brother who becomes a Grand Lodge Officer. The list of Grand Lodge Officers who bear the title "Right Worshipful" includes the Deputy Grand Master, Senior and Junior Grand Wardens, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and the other Grand Line Officers, the District Deputy Grand Masters, Grand Directors of Ceremony, Grand Sword Bearers, Grand Stewards, Grand Chaplains, Grand Representatives, Grand Lecturer, Proctor, Grand Historian and a limited number of others. They retain their title throughout life. The title of the Grand Master is "Most Worshipful," and he retains the title as Past Grand Master.

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

SENECA PERSONALITY

Scanning Seneca's membership roster, one is impressed with the many vocations it represents in the arts and sciences-government at every level, law and the courts, education, music, engineering, printing and publishing, transportation, the ministry, manufacturing, commerce and about everything else we might have skipped. And, the more inter-

esting, our members are leaders in whatever their calling. Realizing we are talking about our active membership it is to be noted they are prominent too, in Masonry and all of its branches and in the Shrine.

While we refer to active membership let's not overlook the retirees-Bro. R. James Christie lost his voice when a cancerous larynx was removed in 1956. Determined to overcome his handicap, he studied the methods of esophageal voice schools located in New York and Boston. Esophageal voice is a process of speech made possible by swallowing air, with with the larnyx removed, an opening in the neck enables the laryngectomee to breathe. For speech, air is swallowed through the mouth, is vibrated in the upper esophagus and sounds are made through normal use of the tongue, teeth and lips.

Jim retired as district manager of Humble Oil Co. in 1959. Following retirement he organized the "Lost Chord Club" with fifteen members in 1960 and now has grown to 110. During the past decade he has taught the esoprageal voice method to nearly three hundred people, enabling them to hold their regular positions, some as executives and some as salespeople.

He estimes the incidence is at the rate of one in every twenty thousand and the ratio of men to women is ten to one. He says the length of time to develop the new voice is dependent on practice and motivation of the student.

In recognition of his leadership, he was elected President of the Inter ationa Association of Laryngectomees at its 17th Annual Convention, held in Portland, Oregon last August. The Association has 35,000 members in 132 clubs in 12 counties. He will meet with the fortyfive directions of the Association in various cities during his two year term of office.

Presently Jim devotes fifty percent of his time as an instructor in speech therapy at the Al Sigl Center.

Surely the foregoing suggests Masonry at work and we acknowledge with considerable pride that R. James Christie is a long time member of Seneca Lodge.

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

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

Our Christmas Party was called off becuase of sickness this year, but maybe 1969 will be different. We hope so.




Our last regular meeting was one of the best attended in recent years and is a good indication that we need projects, like our tape recorder purchases, to stimulate us to doing things for others.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS about the SHRINERS HOSPITALS FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN ORTHOPEDIC AND BURN UNITS

1. WHEN and WHERE was the first Shriners Hospital opened?

September 16, 1922, in Shreveport, Louisiana.

2. HOW MANY Hospitals are there today? Twenty-two -- nineteen Orthopedic Units and three Burns Institutes. There are fifteen Orthopedic and three Burns Institutes in the continental United States, one in Hawaii, one in Mexico, and two in Canada.

WHERE are the Hospitals located, HOW MANY beds does each have, and WHEN were they opened?

4. What was the CONSTRUCTION COST of the Units? There is a construction investment in the Orthopedic Units of nearly \$43,000,000. An additional \$10 million million has been allocated for construction of the Burns Institutes.

5. What is the COST per year to OPERATE the Units? Operating costs continue to move upward, and it is now well over \$10 million per year for the 19 Orthopedic Units alone. The Burns Institutes, as a recent undertaking of the Shrine, have not been in operation long enough to establish an accurate figure for the program, although current estimates run about \$1.5 million per Institute per year.

6. HOW MANY children are being cured or materially helped ANNUALLY? Over 6,000.

7. HOW MANY children have been hospitalized since the hospitals opened? 138,146.

What is the average number of DAYS STAY in the Hospital per patient?

Approximately 57 days per patient in the Orthopedic Units. Again, the Burns Institutes program is too new to arrive at an accurate figure.

9. What is the average COST per patient?

\$1,599.00 for Orthopedic patients during the past year. It has been estimated that the cost to treat a severly burned patient will be more than \$10,000.00. Already some cases in the Burns Institutes have cost in excess of \$20,000.00.

10. HOW MUCH has been spent to date for Hospital operating expenses? Nearly \$122,000,000.

11. Who is eligible for ADMITTANCE?

Children under 15 years of age -- regardless of race or religion -- whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for treatment.

12. HOW is a child ADMITTED?

Any Shriner can request admittance for a child by securing an application from the Recorder of his Temple or the nearest Hospital Unit.

In emergency cases for the Burns Institutes, the attending physician should call the Chief Surgeon or Administrator of the Institute, describe the case, and if a bed is available and the Chief Surgeon agrees an emergency exists, he may instruct the attending physician to arrange immediate transportation to the hospital. Then the application form shall be completed and forwarded to the Hospital and eligibility determined.

13. WHERE does the MONEY come from?

14. WHAT COSTS must the patient pay? Absolutely none. This work is 100% charitable. No pay-patients are accepted. Shriners Hospitals are operated by a national Board of Trustees and local Boards of Governors who serve without pay. These great Nobles give not only of their time and talents,

SPECIAL QUESTIONS ABOUT THE BURNS INSTITUTE

1. What are the PURPOSES of the Shriners Burns Insitutes? To save the children's loves and restore their bodies through instensive care to prevent the crippling effects of severe burns.

To undertake research in burns therapy to advance medicine's ability to care for and treat children with

To instruct medical personnel in the care and treatment of burned children.

2. Why did the Shriners CHOOSE "children's burns" as an extension of the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children? Severe burns in children, unless properly treated, are our country's greatest unmet medical need. Some authorities call burns the largest single hazard

3. What is UNIQUE about a Shriners Burns Insitute?

Special equipment and facilities enable the staff to provide superior observation at all times and electronic monitoring devices attached to a patient under intensive care transmit heart beat, temperature, blood pressure. and respiration to a central station. Special beds faciltate handling patients when necessary. Laboratory teams will constantly evaluate the patient's condition. The research program studies ways to improve the treatment of all types of burns.

4. What SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS are taken in treating burns?

Infection is one of the serious hazards in burns cases, therefore, unusual features for its control have been planned in the Institutes. Visitors are separated from patients under intensive care by a glass partition. A visit to a patient is by permission of the Director only.

5. What is a SEVERE BURN?

Second and third degree burns affecting 15% of the body or more.

Second degree burns, with good care, will recover without difficulty.

Third degree burns damage the skin in depth and must have skin grafts to cover the wound.

6. What is the size of the STAFF?

The staff will number about 200 per institute, including surgeons, nurses, technicians, orderlies, food and maintenance personnel.

7. How many PATIENT DAYS have been registered in the **Shriners Burns Insitutes?** Almost 30,000

8. How can idividual Shriners HELP?

The most urgent need is for blood donors. A patient may need as many as 50 pints of whole blood in the intensive care period due to loss through the open wound before skin can be grafted. A Shriner and his friends can donate blood for use in a Shriners Burns Insitute through any hospital that is a member of the American Association of Blood Banks accreditation program. This program allows the transfer of blood credits from a member hospital to one of the Shriners Burns Insintutes.

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
