Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism. history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

One of the books sent to me in my Grand Lodge Reading Course made reference to "The Thomson Masonic Fraud." Can you tell us what this fraud was?

Almost from the formation of the premier Grand Lodge of England in 1717, Freemasonry in Europe, as well as in the United States, has been forced to contend with spurious or clandestine Masons. Our history notes a number of outstanding fakers and frauds of this character who purported to represent Masonic bodies, and who conferred so-called Masonic degrees of all sorts and kinds. One of the most preeminent among these charlatans was an American, born in Scotland, named Matthew McBlain Thompson.

A paper hanger and painter by trade, he became a member in Scotland of two lodges, and Past Master of one of them. In 1881 he settled in Montpelier, Idaho, became a member of a Lodge there, and was even honored by the Grand Lodge of Idaho with an appointment as Grand Orator. But he soon left under clouded circumstances, and returned to Scotland where he proceeded to prepare a large number of "higher degrees."

In 1898, he returned to Montpelier with a dimit from his Lodge in Scotland, and with a patent from a "Scottish Grand Council of Rites," which he and a friend had created in Scotland. On the basis of this spurious organization, he opened offices, hired deputies and agents, and granted them exclusive territories, where they carried on the sale of

200 to 300 "degrees. Denouncing all Grand Lodges in the United States as irregular, he organized the "American Masonic Federation," proclaimed himself the champion of true and universal Freemasonry, and proceeded to use public advertisements, pamphlets, and a monthly magazine to propagandize and to sell his "masonic" degrees. Charges ran from \$35 to \$50 for the craft degrees, to \$135 to \$200 for the Scottish Rite, 4th to 33rd, and for an extra fee, the Knights Templar and Shrine. They were sold mostly to humble, thrifty immigrants, and to Negroes, who were thrilled with the glorious lifetime titles which they received as knights, princes, kings and emperors.

The "American Masonic Federation" reached its peak during the war period; 1917-1918. At that time it occupied a stately building in Salt Lake City, from which Thomson controlled his vast network, supplied all literatur and materials, received his share of the degree fees, but profited most from the sale of certificates. More than 200 lodges were in operation at that time, with a membership of about 10,000, but it is estimated that the number initiated probably ran well over 100,000 in America and abroad.

Thomson managed to win for the "Federation" recognition from a number of regular Masonic Jurisdictions in Europe and South America. He even had the audacity to call an "International Convention of Masonic Jurisdictions, which was held in Zurich, Switzerland, in 1920 and which was attended by representatives of 12 Grand Jurisdictions. Meantime one of his salesmen had been arrested in St. Louis, Missouri, on the change of using the mails to de-fraud. The Post Office Inspector assigned one of the ablest men on his staff on the case, who spent two years (1919-1921) working up evidence. The United States attorney for Utah then, (1921) drew up an indictment for fraud and deceit against Thomson and his two associates. They were tried before a Judge of the U.S. District Court, a non-Mason, and before a jury of non-Masons, and were convicted and sentenced to two years in Ft. Leavenworth prison and fined \$5000.00 each and costs. Thus ended the career of Matthew McBlain Thomson and his American Masonic Federation.


What is the meaning of the word "Zizon?"

And then-she dies: Let her be silent, secret, reserved, dignified; heep her what she has always been, a mystery, a secret force for good in the world, an Order which men cannot join save they be worthy-and her power increases.

If we are truly concerned about our image, let us provide inspired leadership in the timeless Masonic tradition, and the image will take care of itself.


