Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism. history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester, New York 14605.

In the February Issue, we responded to a question raised by a Brother, who stated that he had been told that in one of the states on the East Coast it is impossible for a brother of the Jewish faith to join the Shrine. Since the brother named the state, we wrote a letter of inquiry. The following reply came from the Potentate of the largest Temple in the state:

While I cannot answer for other Temples in this jurisdiction, --- Temple accepts all petitions, and they are acted upon in accord with the regulations of the Imperial Council. As the Potentate of --- Temple, I will be more than pleased to sign the application of a qualified person whom I personally know, without any question as to his religion. I might also add that there are members of our Temple who are of the Jewish faith.'

We are happy indeed to pass on this letter.

The word "shekinah" is used in some of the degrees. What does it mean?

The word "Shekinah" is in the original Hebrew "Shechinah," pronounces "Shecheenah," with the German sound of "ch." It means literally "the dwelling, or resting place," and is sometimes used as a substitute for the word God. It signified to the Sages God's radiance, that the dwelt in or rosted more those whose right-currences. He dwelt in or rested upon those whose righteousness merited His favor, whether an individual, a community or the entire Jewish people.

It came into use in the days of the Second Temple, when the reference to God in terms of physical attributes, i.e., as walking, talking, etc., came to be considered improper. The more abstract and symbolic term "Shekinah" came to be used as a substitute, meaning "God's presence." From this came the concept by the Sages of God as a spiritual essence, which they pictured as of indescribable heavity and explains affect. Some of the Sages described the beauty and exalting effect. Some of the Sages described the "Shekinah," (God) in physical terms as light and radiance. The Rabbis said that the "Shekinah" appeared before Moses at the Burning Bush, rested upon the Tabernacle erected in the Wildernesz and in the Holy of Holies (Sanctum Sanctorum) in the Temple of Jerusalem.


The audible instrument of the "Shekinah" (according to this tradition) was the "Bat Kol", meaning "the voice of God." Through it, His intentions, His judgments, His warnings, and His commands were made known to chosen individuals, even communities. The prophet Daniel speaks of a voice from Heaven which spoke to the Babylonian king. The Sages also refer to the "Bat Kol". This is also closely related to speaker designation of God as "Rusah closely related to another designation of God as "Ruach Hakodesh," meaning "the Holy Spirit." This term is frequently used interchangeably with "Shekinah" in the writings of the Rabbis. In Job we find, "The spirit of God hath made me," and in the Talmud we find the statement that "in the days of the Messiah when redemption comes, the radiance of the Holy Spirit will rest equally upon Jews and Gentiles, upon free men and upon slaces.

Some scholars see a striking connection between the concept of the "Shekinah" and the later neo-platonic idea of Logos, "The Word" which Philo (1st Century) introduced into Jewish philosophical thinking, and which (according to them) became an important part of Christianity. Thus, the Gospel of John begins with the words, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."
