

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Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, % Masonic Service Bureau, 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605.

We received a petition for initiation and it was referred to an investigating committee, and following the report, the candidate was duly elected. When the candidate was notified to present himself for initiation, we received his reply from a distant city to which he had meanwhile removed, asking that we "disregard his petition." How do we handle this?

It has been held (Dec. of G.M. 1966) that the removal of a petitioner for initiation to another jurisdiction before the petition had been received and referred at a state communication deprives the Lodge of jurisdiction. Removal after receipt and reference does not, and the Lodge may proceed with the investigation and balloting. In your case, the petitioner has been duly elected and the Lodge could proceed to confer the degrees upon him. Your petitioner, however, has asked that his petition be withdrawn.

If the ballot had been "cloudy", the petition could not be "desregarded", and the petioner would have to be informed of his rejection. In this case, the petitioner was declared elected, and he may now withdraw his petition. Sect. 360 of the Book of Constitutions covers this situation as follows: "no intiation fee or any part thereof shall be forfeited to the Lodge, in case the candidate shall fail to present himself for initiation", unless the petition signed by the petitioner carries a statement to the effect that a fee of \$.... must accompany the petition and is not returnable.

I therefore, suggest that you return the petition, with any deposit which may have accompanied it.

We conferred the First Degree upon a candidate. He now states that he "wishes to withdraw from membership," and requests that we refund two-thirds of the fee, what do we do?

A candidate does not become a member of a Lodge until he has received the three degrees and signed the by-laws. Your candidate has received only the first degree, and hence cannot "withdraw" from a lodge of which he is not a member.

Our Constitutions (Sect. 360) states specifically that the initiation fee is for conferring the initiatory or First Degree. The Second and Third Degrees shall be conferred without fee." Since the brother has received his First Degree, there is no "refund" due him. You should explain to him that, at anytime when he has proven proficiency in the lectures of the First, and later the second degree, he may receive the second and Third Degrees without further payment.

For the lodge records, the candidate has been, or should be assigned his place and number on the roster, which remains blanks until or unless he proceeds, at some later date, to take the succeeding degrees.

After a reasonable time, his name should be removed from the list of "candidates awaiting ballot."

those who cross themselves before a replica of the virgin or bow their heads before a Cross of wood or stone. It would be equally silly to ac-cuse Masons who believe in the Almighty God of the Bible as being pagans.

Masons are criticized for their broad concept of religion and their centuries-long effort to bring about a better understanding of the meaning of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. These critics accuse Masonry of omitting all re-cognition of Christ as the Son of God and offer this as the reason for their attacks on Masonry. If this be true, it could be pointed out that the Roman Church approves, even sponsors, a joint organization of both Christians and Jews, one segment of which fails to recognize the divinity of Christ.

Freemasonry is not a religion. It is a fraternaly organization of attempting to bring about a meeting of minds on certain moral fundamentals among adherents of various faiths. About 85 percent of all Masons are Christians and attend Christian churches, finding nothing in Freemasonry that would forbid or restrict their choice in that practice. Masonry does require the profession of be-lief in God and accepts no one who does not.

When Masonry's critics attack the Fraternity, they are in reality directing their ac-cusations against those of its members who are Moslems. Jews or adherents of other faiths that do not accept Jesus Christ as Saviour. Can Freemasons, then, be justly called bigots when they say to all men who believe in Almighty God as our Creator and loving Father, "Come and join with us in a common cause that we may bring about better understanding among men?" Or should those be called bigots who say, "Be-lieve as we do or suffer the stigma of being called pagans and idol worshippers.

The Bureau acts as a clearing house for Masonic Relief and information the benefit of every Masonic organization in Monroe County.

The Bureau renders counsel and assistance to widows, orphans, the elderly and shutins. It conducts investigations for Lodges and Eastern Star Chapters located in other parts of the country whose members now reside in Rochester or vicinity.

The Bureau provides emergency financial relief to members of distant lodges and Eastern Star Chapters in distress, advancing funds guaranteed by their Lodges or Chapter.

We are affliliated with the Masonic Relief Association of the United States and Canada which enables to give nation-wide and international service in matters of relief and employment.

The Bureau assists applicants to gain admission into the Utica Home and the Eastern Star Home at Oriskany.

We assist in cases of illness or death. Arrange for funeral services, etc.

Aid is given in securing welfare in cooperation with the County Department of Social Welfare.

The Bureau helps Masons to secure employement, also furnishes employers with applicants for work. Cooperates with the New York State Employment Bureau in job placement and counseling.

We have a supply of sick room equipment, such as crutches, walkers, wheelchairs, hospital beds, etc., which are loaned to any Ma-


