MORE ABOUT THE SHRINE

The Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine (A.A.O.N.M.S.) was the creation of two men. Dr. Walter M. Fleming, a noted New York physician and surgeon and William Florence, a very popular actor who had successfully toured America and Europe. Both were active and dedicated Masons.

Dr. Fleming had the idea of an organization purely for fun, with membership limited to Masons who had taken the Consistory or Knight Templar degrees. While in Europe, Billy Flemming had attended some fantastic parties given by visiting Oriental nabobs, and on his return to this country, he told his friend, Dr. Fleming, about these colorful affairs. Between the two of them, thirteen charter members held a meeting and organized Mecca Temple, the first Shrine Temple.

From the simple beginning came the huge organization which today boasts 170 Temples in the United States, Canada, Hawaii and Mexico, with a membership approaching one million.

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

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism. history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, c o Masonic Service Bureau, 875 East Main Street, Rochester. New York 14605.

My son is a successful young attorney. He knows I am Past Master of my Lodge, but he sees nothing in Masonry to attract him. Will you comment?

It is a highly regretable fact that sons of members of the craft, by and large, do not petition for membership.

This is true even of very active and devoted Masons.

Standards of living today are very high. Young men are interested in making much money, living in a fine home or costly apartment, drive a showy car, and belonging to a country club, and perhaps a professional organization. For them, Masonry has nothing to offer. Added to these is a distorted image of Masonic initiation. There hear of initiation cheremonies, including a Third Degree, and they equate it to their High School and College fraternity initiations, which were often crude and embarrassing. They do not know that the ceremonies in Masonry are dignified, meaningful and inspirational.

Another negative is the lamentable fact that many, many Masons have very few contacts with Masonry, all too often

restricted to mailing in their dues once a year. The truth is that there is much activity in Masonry. If a person likes Bowling, his Lodge has bowling parties, often with the Ladies. He may bowl on the Lodge Team in the Masonic Bowling League, and may participate in the State Masonic Bowling Tournament, held last year in Rochester. The Masonic Fellowship Committee sponsors s State Golfing Tournament, a Fresh Water Fishing Tournament, a Salt Water Fishing Tournament, and encourages many other activities, such as gun clubs, archery, trap and skeet shoots, card clubs, chess competitions, softball, hiking, etc. Individual Lodges have Ladies Night Parties, banquets, picnics, Christmas parties for young and old, The Masonic Community has an annual Grand Ball, and other country-wide

For a member who wants to be active in the Lodge, there are many opportunities for service; working on committees, visiting the sick, acting on entertainment, picnic and other functions. If he chooses to become an officer there is work, but there are rewards. I know of no man who has progressed in line and served as Master, who did not grow mentally, who has not developed latent abilities of leadership, of maturity, or self-confidence, which have benefited his life at home and in business.

If the member goes on to Scottish or York Rite, there are many more opportunities for participation in degree work in drama and as an officer, and in social and enter-

tainment programs. If he goes on to the Shrine, the "Playground of Free-asonry," there are new opportunities. If he likes riding, masonry," there are new opportunities. If he likes riging, he may join the Horse Patrol, if a musician he may join the Band. Or he may affiliate with one of the uniformed marching units. If he likes to sing, he may join the Chanters, and not only find pleasure, but the opportunity with the group to entertain in hospitals, Homes for the Aged, the Retarded, etc. If he likes pantomine and make-up he can join the Clowns, and bring smiles of happiness to young and old in hospitals, the Aged, and along the line of march of Shrine parades. Finally, as a Shriner he may take his family on the annual Shrine Pilgrimage to the particular

Convention City for fun and festivity.

There are also organizations related to Masonry for women (Easter Star, Amaranth, Daughters of the Nile,

etc.) for boys)DeMolay) for girls (Triangle, Rainbow, etc.)
But there is another side to Masonry besides the purely
personal one. When the member is active, or merely duespaying, he supports many philanthropic and humanitarian projects. Our own Grand Lodge maintains a Masonic Home and Hospital at Utica for indigent Masons, their widows and orphans. This is one of the outstanding institutions of its kind in the country. In addition, our Grand Lodge through voluntary contributions by Masons, maintains and operates a Research Laboratory on the grounds of the Home, for the study of Geriatrics and Gerontology, which has won national acclaim.

Each of the other Bodies supports its humanitarian project: Scottish Rite - Mental Diseases and Schizophrenia; Commandery - Eye Diseases and an Eye Bank; Royal Arch Masonry - Polio; Royal and Select Masters - Hodgkins Disease, etc. Perhaps the best known are the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children (19), and Hospitals for Badly Burned Children (3), which are entirely supported by the Shrine, and treat children without any cost to parents.

Finally, for the active member there is one other important ingredient, FRIENDSHIP, - an intimate relationship among men who work together, which makes them BRETH-REN, in the true sense of the word. This friendship is a priceless commodity which cannot be bought, but to which every active member will freely attest.

Perhaps some Brothers who are not Royal Arch Masons are reading this column and wonder what is the background and teaching of the Mark Degree. What would you benefit from receiving the Degree.

The Mark Master is the first of four Degrees in the Chapter and in it the candidate is still symbolically laboring on an unfinished temple as in the preceding degrees of the Blue Lodge. He is taught the nobility of labor and that in the erection of his moral and spirtual temple he must determine and prepare the materials of which that temple is to be constructed and to have due care that in so doing the work which he shall present, bearing his mark, shall be such as to designate him as one worthy of admission to "that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." This Degree is perhaps as old as, if not, older, than any other Degree of Ancient Craft Masonry. It is so ancient, in fact, that its real origin cannot be traced exactly; but in 1598, in Scotland, Statutes were issued which required the Operative Mason to register his "Mark" No Degree in Freemasonry can hardly be more interesting, more inspiring or more instructive, than that of the Mark Degree.

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
