
MASONIC SERVICE BUREAU

Just for Today

"The Penitent Mood of Lent." By I. Vincent Lloyd

During these Lenten days our thoughts are centered on the life of Jesus. Who is he? they asked, when Jesus came riding into Jeruslem on a beast of burden. It was a strange, bewildering sight - strange enough to arouse the people so that they took palm branches and scattered them before him. "Who is he?

We sit back now, yawn, and say to ourselves, "We know who he is, so that's that." But do we? We amy acclaim him as they did, follow him as they did, spread our possessions before him as they did, and yet not know who he is.

"Who is he? Jesus was the Man of men. He was thoroughly human; he had a normal body, he knew weariness, hunger. thirst, pleasure, suffering, death. He grew up as others did and learned as others learned. His spiritual life was human, too - he prayed not like God but like a man. He prayed in triumph when he healed the sick; he prayed in grief when in the garden of Gethsemane. He lived humbly. He lived like a man, utterly dependent upon the heavenly Father.

Yet there is a marked difference between him and other men. He spoke with authority. He did not cling to the skirts of a dead world. He had something to say. He lived and moved and had his being in God.

'Who is he?" He is the one who returns again and again, to remind us that religious values must be learned by our own personal efforts; that no one can achieve apiritual resource, growth, and enrichment apart from some from of sustained discipline. Lent then becomes a season of special penitence, self-denial, and a preparation for the great feast of Easter.

The decision to seek and understand who He is requires something of us. It requires a summoning of the will to act; the giving of time, but most important of all the surrender of ourselves to God.

This is the first time that Rochester Forest No. 133 has had an article in the Masonic News, and I am sure that many Masons are ignorant of our existence and our objectives. From time to time in future articles, I will try to give a little of the past history of our group so that we will be better known among the Fraternity.

We have a petition from a former resident of Rochester who has moved recently to our city. His former residence was in Brighton. From which Lodge must we request a lican Party, for his most Waiver of Jurisdiction?

Sect. 342 of the Book of Constitutions states that, "The jurisdiction of the Lodges in the County of Monroe over all candidates residing within said County limits shall be concurrent." Hence you may request the Waiver of Jurisdiction from any one of the 31 Lodges in the two Districts of Monroe.

Is a motion necessary to refer a petition to an Investigating Committee? I was present at a meeting where following the reading of the Petition by the Secretary, the Master asked: "Brethren, what is your pleasure on this Petition? Do I hear a motion?" There was no motion, and the Master returned the Petition to the Secretary without taking action.

Our Constitutions (Sect. 352) state that "a petition when received shall be referred to an Investigating Committee. This means that when a petition is received, (provided it has not been wrongfully presented, for ex., requiring a waiver, or from a petitioner under 21, no motion is required, but it must be referred immediately by the Master to an Investigating Committee. On page 15 of our "Standard Work" is the suggested wording. Incidentally, a petition is "received" when it is read off in open Lodge, and not when it is handed to the Lodge Secretary or any other Lodge of this able direction of this pro-


