down to them from many generations past. This is a generalization, I know, but an exageration best expresses this

Why is not the principle of the Brotherhood of Man more recognized by non-masonic advocates? The idea of this principle should be part of our problem in activating ideas to held a confused and troubled world.

After attending the Warden's seminar in Buffalo, then listening to our District Attorney address a large Masonic gathering that same evening, it makes one stop to wonder where we are heading as Masons, and as citizens of this great country of ours. I truly believe Masonry has to make a different approach to our societies problems of today.

Masonry is a type of educational institution. It is a difficult task though to get the people of our younger generation to learn it's teachings if they are not interested in joining our group. Maybe we should change to a more understandable language understood to modern readers. Most often our disagreements with the younger people's views is mere dislike for their ideas, and their manner in presenting them. On reason for the decline of young men to join our ranks is that they may be reluctant to associate themselves with an organization teaching tolerance, understanding, and ideals associated with the laws

and principles of our (so called) dead past.

Through Masonic education I believe solutions to educating the prospective brethren may be worked out. I believe a committee must be set up in each district in New York State, reporting to a Grand Lodge Committee whereby a diligent study be made pertaining to the streamlining of our basic educational methods to prospective as well as newly made brothers. We must keep in mind the purpose of making Masonic ideals and symbols intelligible to much of the confused thinking of some of our youth of today. Perhaps we must find ways to make inroads of our ideals to our children even before they reach the age of eligible membership. I believe a thorough study should be made. The sooner we get started, the sooner we will reap the harvest of making the younger generation aware that we have plenty to offer them and that they are passing it up. Through a cooperative effort between our DeMolay leaders (youth) and some of our great fraternal minds, some solutions to disturbing and perplexing problems may become a reality. Let's try!!
