Dear Brethren: MUNICH MURDERS AND MASONRY, although unrelated, have a direct relationship with our principles and highlight the purpose of our very existence.

To say that Masons deplore the Lod airport massacre and now the fanatical slaughter of Israelis at the Olympic Games in Munich, is an understatement of the year! The barbarous and treacherous crime by the Arab terrorists not only disrupted the Olympic Games, but destroys the good-will and promotion of brotherhood which has been the main objective of these international games.

It has provoked retribution by lightning-fast reprisals from Israel, but who is to say that this little country, the only vestige of democracy in the Middle East, is not justified by taking such measures. Doesn't the enormity of the

crime cause the ire of mankind to rise above boiling point? We all realize that there are respectable, decent Arabs who are repelled by terrorism, and they must feel the weight of this catastrophe just as you and I bend our shoulders to bear it. It is for the good of humanity, however, that we as Masons be vocal in our condemnation of such acts. We don't solve problems - even violence - by running away from it.

Masonry teaches us that the "Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God" is essential to a stable, well-meaning civilization. Masonry in its international relationship with all mankind can exert greater influences to spread its teachings and doctrines. It can encompass more and more men into its fold to help formulate the universal acceptance of these traits, so that future generations of youth will not be denied the fruits of fellowship or of athletic aspirations.

I swallow hard in an attempt to dispel this tragedy from my mind but, in conclusion, I should like to remind you that the new Masonic year has commenced, lodges have resumed their fall schedules, official visitations of your District Deputy have begun, the spirit of Masonry is on the upgrade. Please give serious thought to your involvement in Masonry. Make a real effort to attend lodge communications and to become a real part of something great.

CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

WANTED PEOPLE

There is an old, oft, told tale of the little Church which was very noisy one Sunday morning. It was long before the hour of morning services and a member passing by wondered if some planning committee was being held and certain members were shouting to be heard. When he went in, he was amazed to find nobody present but the various parts of the building were each claiming that it was the most important, the large stones, "We hold up the Church" the beams "We provide place for the walls and support the roof": the walls, "We keep out the cold," the window: "We let light enter": the pews, "We provide place for members to sit down, if we were not here, many would not come", the organ "I provide beautiful music, many come to hear me" There was no word from the furnace, probably it was too busy getting the place warm to enter the argument.

That morning the minister arrived early to practice a special sermon but when he found what was going on, he said in turn to each, "you stones if you were not part of the building, would be piled in a corner of the field so that you would not be in the way of the plow, you beams and planks would be weathering out in the lumber yard, you windows would be simply piled in the glass factory-it is only as you are together, that you count at all-and it takes people to make a Church"!

Our Lodge appointments may be beautiful, furniture, lighting, tastefully decorated, well carpeted, fine organ but it still requires people to make a Lodge. Long ago one of the early Church fathers in writing to a Church which he had served said "So we who are many, are one in God. and several members. one of another".

Both your Church and Lodge need you-when were you present at the last service-at the last communication?

SOMETHING LACKING FOR THE CANDIDATE IN MODERN LODGES

In the era of the Builders Guilds, so we are told, a master builder took a young man, about 12 years of age, under his tutelage to instruct him in the elements of the building profession. After about seven years and when the young man had progressed satisfactorily he was allowed to present a piece of work to the members of the guild or lodge. If the work passed the inspection of the builders he was entered on the books of the lodge as an apprentice. After more years of learning his trade the young man presented another piece of work and if approved was listed as a fellow of the craft. Later when he had demonstrated his ability to handle larger projects in building and direct other workers he became a master builder with all the rights and privileges of that position.

During all the years of his training the young man was being made ready for one lifetime job - that of building. His whole life was directed toward one specific purpose.

In our lodges today we symbolically guide the candidate through the same training which the earlier learners were given.

But, something is missing. Is there a job waiting for the candidate when he completes his training? He has been educated for one specific purpose. Are the plans laid out on the trestle board for him?

Is the initiation, passing and raising of candidates the only purpose of a Masonic Lodge today?

ORDER OF DEMOLAY

The New York State Chapter of the Order of DeMolay held its annual Convention during the weekend of August 18 at the Campus of the State University at Binghamton. The Convention marked the 50th year of DeMolay service in the State. 15 members from Rochester Chapter, located in Rochester, were among the 700 people in attendance at the Convention.

Delegates to the Convention participated in a variety of activities, including swimming, softball, basketball, and golf. The main order of business was the election of Bob Krayenvenger from Buffalo, New York, as State Master Councilor. Mr. Henry O. Dormann will serve as president of the State Organization.

The highlight of the affair was the installation of State Officers which was held on August 20. Guests present included Grand Master of DeMolay, J.W. Nutt, International Master Councilor, Christopher Pedigo, Henry O. Dormann, New York DeMolay Executive Officer, and Lloyd Cochran, Grand Master of Masons in New York.

DeMolay is an organization for young men between the ages of 13 and 21, and strives to build active young men who are "interested in themselves, other people, and the world around them."

MASONIC DEMOLAY CRUSADE

A historic moment for the Order of DeMolay and Freemasonry in general took place on Feb. 21, 1963, in Washington, D.C., when ten presiding officers of national and international Masonic Bodies signed a "Declaration of Principles" in support of the Order of DeMolay.

The signing took place in special ceremonies in the main chamber of the House of the Temple of the Supreme Council 33°, A.S.S.R., S.M.J.

Basically the declaration pointed out the faith and interest that was manifested in DeMolay, and pledges of individual support as well as organizational support where possible were made. The pledged support included both moral and financial, with no intention or desire on the signers' part to determine DeMolay policy.

The presiding officers of the following Masonic Bodies affixed their signatures to the Declaration:

Grand Encampment, K.T., U.S.A.; Supreme Council 33 Degree, A.A.S.R., S.M.J.; Supreme Council 33 Degree, A.S.S.R., N.M.J.; General Grand Chapter, R.A.M.; General Grand Council, R.&S.M.; Shrine of North America; Mystic Order of the Veiled Prophets of the Enchanted Realm; Red Cross of Constantine; Royal Order of Scotland; The Grand Masters' Conference.

The Declaration has served as wonderful impetus for assistance coming to DeMolay. Freemasons in organizations and as individuals are recognizing the worth and importance of the Order of DeMolay in relation to their Masonic landmarks.

DEMOLAY TODAY
"A Nation's Greatest Is Its Youth!"

DeMolay today has over 150,000 members in 2,400 Chapters in 12 countries around the world. The organization serves as an agent for molding the character of the youth of today in the interest of better citizenship and better leaders tomorrow.

The organization's purpose is to offer the teenage boy of today:

- A wholesome occupation for his spare time.
- Worthwhile associates.
- The best of environment.
- An interesting and complete program of all-around youth development.

Any organization with such laudable purposes and goals is important to every right thinking and interested citizen of the nation.

Masons should particularly be interested in this outstanding youth movement. With the influence and inspiration the young men receive from the Masons serving as their adult advisors and from Masonic buildings housing their activities, they cannot help but become familiar generally with Freemasonry, and thus be in a better position to seek Masonic light upon reaching their years of adulthood.

SENIOR DEMOLAYS IN MASONRY

Both formal and informal surveys have been taken throughout the DeMolay Movement to determine what percentage of DeMolays petition Masonry after reaching their majority. It has been proven that wherever you find strong chapter with able Advisors, you will find a large percentage of Senior DeMolays going into Masonry. An estimated fifty percent of DeMolays are applying for Masonry after reaching 21.

Senior DeMolays are also beginning to occupy prominent leadership posts in Freemasonry now that the youth movement is nearing its 50th anniversary.

OUR MASONRY IS NOT OF MATERIAL THINGS

Masonry is not a material thing; it is a science of the soul. It is not merely a creed or doctrine, but a universal expression of the Divine Wisdom. We are dedicated to Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth, and there is no doubt in our minds that the freedom of worship that we hold dear and enjoy is the keystone of all freedoms. Masonry does not subscribe to any particular creed or cult. But it does require that anyone accepted within its precepts must affirm a belief in a Supreme Being. We stand as soldiers in the great Masonic army of the world; we guard with vigilance that priceless heritage passed down to us through the years and which is now our keeping. Our cause is just. Faith in the ideals and principles of our institution unwavering.

Q. I attended a meeting of the American Lodge of Research at which a Paper was presented on the history of the Masonic Lodges in the area. The historian who presented the Paper began by stating that "Masonry dates back to Biblical days." He then went on to speak of the part Masons played in the founding of our country, and stated that 53 of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence were Masons. Shouldn't Brethren who attempt to write Masonic history be better informed?

A. We agree that Masonic historians should use great care in verifying the statements which they make. Unfortunately, the fact that our ritual uses King Solomon and the building of the Temple at Jerusalem nearly 3000 years ago, as the framework for its teachings, is taken by many Masons to be literally true. They don't seem to understand that what they are viewing is "ritualistic drama." The dramas used in ritual select a historical person, and/or a historical episode and build around them a drama designed to teach the lessons intended to exemplify. Such dramas are either wholly or largely legendary.

Many dramas are built around Solomon and the building of the First Temple at Jerusalem. Others are based upon the period of Zerubbabel and the building of the Second Temple. We find dramas based upon the life of Jesus of Nazareth. The story of Joseph and his brethren, Noah and the flood, the Crusades, the period of George Washington, etc. etc. are used. None of these should be taken literally.

The second part of your question illustrates another fiction which has been repeated again and again. Masons played a distinguished part in the American Revolution, far out of proportion to their percentage of the population. But it is a gross exaggeration to say that nearly all the members of the Continental Congress, or who signed the Declaration of Independence, or attended the Constitutional Convention, or who served as generals in the Continental Army were Masons. The number who have been authenticated are perhaps 15 percent to a possible 20 percent. This is still a record of which all Masons should be proud.

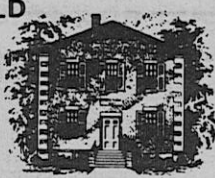

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
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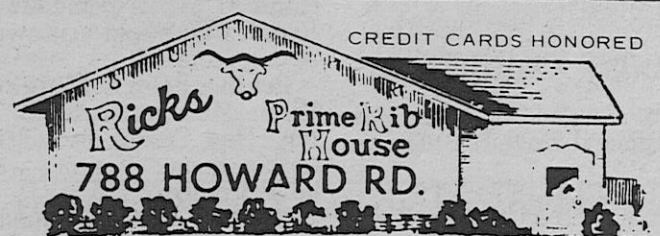

LONG WAITING PERIOD REQUIRED BY SWEDEN

It takes about 15 years to receive eight degrees in Masonry in Sweden, according to Henric Sollbe, Norrkoping, Sweden. Br. Sollbe spent a few days in South Dakota and told of Masonry in his country.

More than 95 percent of the people of Sweden are Lutherans. The first three Masonic degrees are grouped into what is known as St. John's Lodge. The fourth and fifth degrees are the same so with these are the sixth and seventh, all of which make up St. Jacob's Lodge. The eighth degree is as high as can be petitioned. The ninth and tenth degrees are honorary. These three make up the Chapter. All degrees are under the control of the Scottish Rite.

In taking the degrees the candidate waits one year between the first and second and one year for the third degree. During the waiting period his conduct is checked carefully by the lodge. One of the requirements is that the candidate must attend all meetings of the lodge.

There is no shortening of the time between the various degrees.

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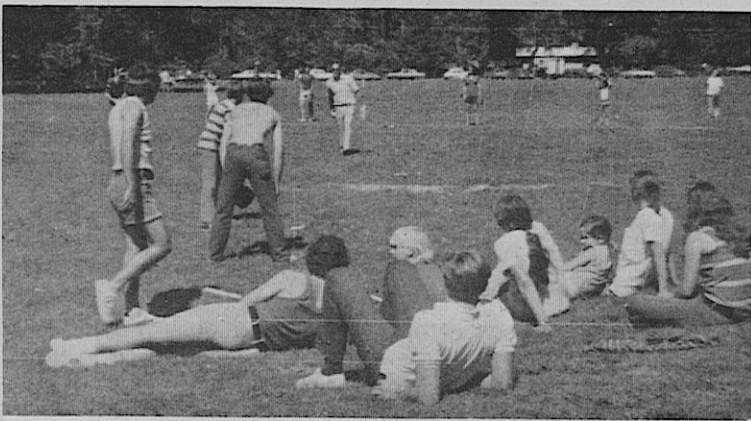

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A BRIEF HISTORY OF SHRINERS HOSPITALS

Every Shriner believes that while pleasure is something we can take out of life, or something that we can put into it, happiness is something that we share. Each Noble of the Mystic Shrine realizes that no man has any real right to play unless he has also contributed to the happiness of others. Out of such thoughts and principles came the idea of the "World's Greatest Philanthropy".

From virtually the outset in the Mystic Shrine of North America there were those who realized that it must become something far greater than a playground The first step toward adoption of a project to justify existence of the Shrine came in 1914 when the Imperial Council appointed a committee to consider establishment of a tuberculosis sanitarium for afflicted children of Shriners. The following year, the committee announced rejection of the proposal.

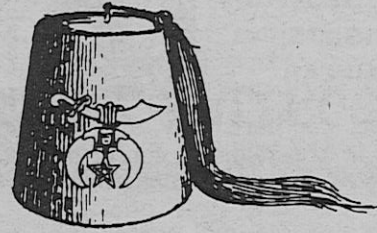
In 1919 when Honorable W. Freeland Kendrick launched the idea that the Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine should undertake, as an organization, to do something for friendless, orphaned, and crippled children.

It was at the 46th Imperial Council Session at Portland, Oregon, in 1920, that Imperial Potentate W. Freeland Kendrick presented a formal resolution to establish a Shriners Hospital For Crippled Children. His resolution was adopted unanimously after a lengthy discussion. Thus, Noble Kendrick came to be known as the "Father" of the Shrine's great philanthropy.

It was decided at the outset that the hospital would be open to all children, regardless of race, or creed whose parents were unable to pay for the needed surgical, medical and hospital facilities.

A seven-member committee, was appointed following the 1920 session, to set machinery in motion to launch the hospital program. At the 1921 Imperial Council Session, a majority report was approved, which called for a chain of hospitals. The Council changed the name to the Shriners Hospitals For Crippled Children. In the ensuing year, steps were taken to establish the first of the eventual 22 Shriners Hospitals For Crippled Children at Shreveport, La., on September 16, 1922.

The Shrine wanted to expand its facilities of services and so in 1953 a study of disaster burns, which could later result in orthopedic problems for children was started. It was found in these studies that this was a field of service that was being by-passed, that the only burn center in the United States had been established by the Government. After several years of deep study on the subject, the Burns Committee was ready to report its recommendations to the Representatives at the Imperial Council Session at Toronto in July of 1962. When the meeting reconvened in regular



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session the resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote.

On November 1, 1963 the seven-bed wing in the John Sealy Hospital at the University of Texas, Medical Branch campus at Galveston, was opened by the Shriners as an interim operation in the care of violent burns in children. At the time, the Shrine opened a seven-bed ward in the Cincinnati General Hospital on the campus of the University of Cincinnati, which got under way February 1, 1964, for similar work. A third interim operation of a five-bed ward was opened March 13, 1964 in the Massachusetts General Hospital, under the Harvard Medical School. During this interim period . . . the building of special units to be known as Shriners Burns Institutes; the plans called for each of these special Units to be 30-bed intensive care units, with all of the modern facilities available in the care, treatment and research in burns. The first of the Shriners Burns Institutes was opened March 20, 1966 at Galveston.

Since opening the first Shriners hospital in 1922, more than 160,000 children have been cured or materially helped. This achievement represents a significant investment in the future of our country. In its great Philanthropy the Shrine not only found its soul, but discovered that the soul is the spirit of the Shrine.

HIGHLIGHTS OF SHRINEDOM

The Shrine traces its history back to about 1870. It was the brainchild of Dr. Walter Millard Fleming and actor Billy Florence. The initial idea was to set up a new fraternal order in which Masons could join together in fellowship and fun.

The first Shrine Temple in the United States was formally organized on Sept. 26, 1872, in Masonic Hall, 114 East 13th St., New York City.

In 1919 Noble W. Freeland Kendrick, who was to be Mayor of Philadelphia, launched the idea that the Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine of North America should undertake, as an organization, to do something for friendless, orphaned and crippled children. The idea gave Shrinedom its soul.

The first Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children was opened on September 10, 1922 in Shreveport, Louisiana.

Twenty Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children are in operation today in the United States, Mexico, and Canada. They cure or substantially help approximately 5,000 youngsters each year.

The latest Shrine humanitarian effort is aimed at solving the problem of disaster burns that often result in orthopedic problems of children. The Shrine is establishing three centers where burn victims may be treated and research in the treatment of burns can be conducted.
