SPECIAL BULLETIN

All members of the Masonic fraternity who have suffered flood damage and who are in need of immediate financial assistance are urged to contact the Master or the Secretary of their Masonic Lodges at once.

The Grand Master of Masons in New York State, Lloyd S. Cochran, in issuing their bulletin said, "We have endeavored, in our program of flood relief, to personally make contact with all distressed Masons in the flood area. Our deepest concern is that there may be some Masonic families we have inadvertently missed, some areas we have overlooked. I must also stress that our efforts have not been and will not be strictly limited to members of the Fraternity. We seek to aid all whom we can with our limited resources until more long term and extensive relief from local state and federal agencies can be processed."

I wish to thank all of you for your kind expressions for being appointed District Deputy Grand Master for the Second Monroe District. When I look over the impressive list of Past Deputies who have preceded me, my one prayer is that following my year as District Deputy I will have truly earned my right to join this fine group of men. 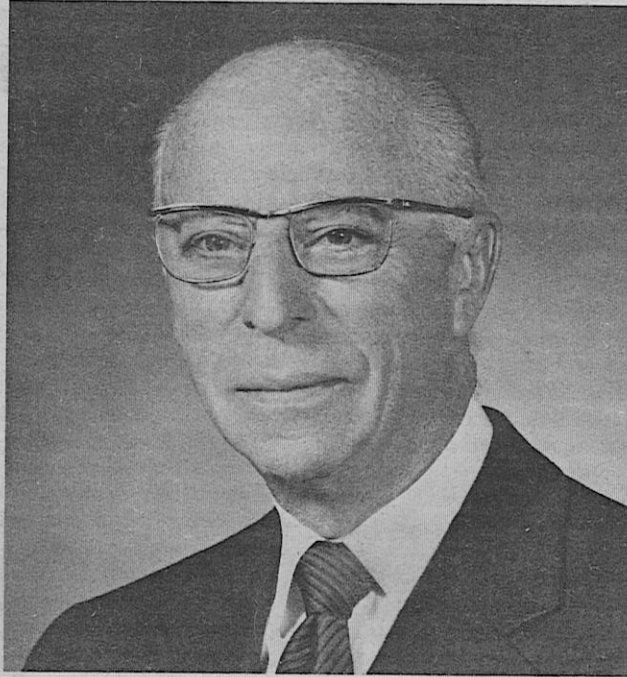

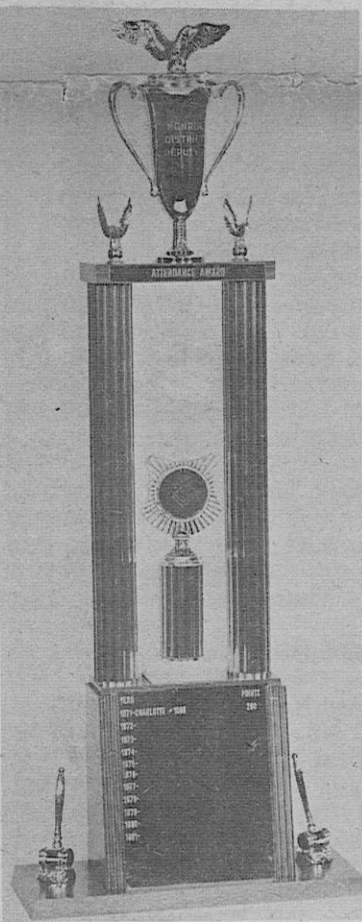

ARE YOU AN EXILE?

Across the pages of world history, pass many who are exiles. Adam and Eve were exiled from the Garden of Eden, their first son became a voluntary exile after he killed his younger brother and could not face the others.

The Children of Israel became voluntary exiles in Egypt when their was a famine in the land where they were living but it ended in their enslavement, Freed with the help of Moses under God's direction they became wanderers for 40 years because they were afraid to enter and take possession of the promised land when they first arrived at its borders. Centuries later after a long period of independence, they became exiles when conquered and led away to Babylon.

There are exiles in our midst today, some political, others for some wrong doing-there are places which simply do not hold minor offenders but free them on condition that they go away, and do not return.

Masonry and Statue of Liberty

Frequently one hears the question, "How old is the Statue of Liberty, and what part did the Masonic Order take in the erecting of this world-famous object of interest in New York harbor?"

According to the encyclopedia, the Statue of Liberty was erected on Bedloe's Island on October 28, 1886. The cornerstone was laid by the officers of the Grand Lodge of Masons of the state of New York on August 5, 1885.



Dear Brother Herman

Q. Last June I attended a meeting of my Lodge. The weather woutside was 80°, and very humid, and much hotter inside. Two elderly brethren, one a Past Master, arrived wearing sport shirts and were told they couldn't enter without wearing suit coats. They were very much upset and left. Are there any written rules in the constitution pertaining to code-of dress in order to attend Lodge meetings. If there are no written rules, what action can I take to correct the Master's attitude?

A. There is nothing in our law that prescribes the clothing to be worn at Lodge meetings, except the Masonic apron. There is not even a law that the Master must be covered: The wearing of a hat by a Master, as a symbol of his office has been a custom recommended and even urged by Grand Masters, but it is not a law. A similar custom in many lodges is for the officers to wear tuxedos or even full dress.

While it is true that dignity and decorum in a lodgeroom are highly desirable, it is also true that the wearing of a suit coat on a hot night is a hardship. We have been to Lodge meetings where the Master invited the brethren to remove their coats. In some cases, even the officers removed their coats. We do not believe that the dignity of Freemasonry suffered the least bit.

It is perhaps true that the Master of a Lodge has the prerogative to insist that coats be worn at meetings. What he fails to realize is that, with Lodge attendance poor enough in many cases, this attitude will tend to drive away even the loyal members.

The only suggestion I can make is that the matter be presented to the District Deputy, or even to the Grand Master himself, who might consider it desirable to advise the Master.

Q. A brother who was unaffiliated several years ago has paid what he owed at the time of unaffiliation, and requests a dimit, as he is thinking of affiliating with some lodge in his new location. Our Past Masters maintain that before the Lodge can issue a dimit, he must pay this year's dues. Are they right?

A. It is our opinion that the difficulty arises because in our everyday language we use the term "dimit" to cover two different situations: (1) when a member of the Lodge wishes to withdraw from membership, and (2) when a brother who has been unaffiliated wishes to clear himself on the books.

1. In the case of a member who wishes to withdraw the Constitutions are clear. Sec. 369 states that "Any member of the Lodge against whom charges are not pending ... and whose dues and indebtedness to the Lodge are paid, may withdraw from membership ... and shall be entitled to a dimit setting forth the fact." In this case, since dues are payable January 1st, the dues for the current year must be paid before the dimit can be issued. Sec. 669 and 670 in the Hand Book of Masonic Law suggests the forms to be used. It has been further ruled that when the request for a dimit (which must be in writing) has been presented to an appropriate officer of the Lodge, compliance by the Lodge at its next stated constitution is conclusively presumed, the brother ceases automatically to be a member, and is entitled to a dimit setting forth the fact. Note, too, that refusal of a Lodge to issue a dimit is a Masonic offense, subject to the rules set down in the Code of Procedure.

2. An unaffiliate who pays his arrears is covered by Sec. 758 in the Handbook of Masonic Law, as follows: "It is the duty of a Lodge to grant a certificate to any brother who has been unaffiliated for non-payment of dues, and subsequently pays them" The suggested form, commonly referred to as a "Clearance Certificate", is given in Sec. 759, and differs very little from the suggested form for dimit. Note that in this case there is no requirement that the current dues be paid since the brother is required to pay only what he owed at the time of unaffiliation. In both Case 1 and Case 2, the brother becomes a non-affiliate, and may at anytime in the future petition for affiliation with any regular Lodge in any part of the world.

We believe there is good reasoning why the brother in Case 1 is required to pay the current dues. The Lodge on January 1st has obligated itself for all the per capita charges representing his membership. In the city Lodges, this includes Grand Lodge per capita (\$5), rent per capita (\$5), plus such other per capita charges as subscription to the Monroe Masonic News, Masonic Service Bureau, etc.

In the case of the unaffiliate (Case 2) no such charges are incurred for the current year. They were incurred and paid by the Lodge for the years prior to his unaffiliation, which he has satisfied by paying his arrears.

One other situation should be mentioned, the case where the unaffiliate requests to be restored to membership in the same Lodge. Such a request for restoration requires a ballot. If within five years from date of unaffiliation. Voting is by show of hands and by majority. If after five years, a ballot is required which must be unanimous. Then, if elected, the brother becomes subject to the current year's dues, for which he is then billed.

SHRINE CELEBRATES 100TH ANNIVERSARY

The Shrine is an organization as American as apple pie -- despite its name!

It began in 1870, when William J. Florence, a distinguished American actor, returned from a European trip where he had been inspired by the pageantry and Oriental splendor of a private ceremony sponsored by the Arabian Consul at Marseilles, France. From notes and material submitted to him by the actor, Walter M. Fleming, eminent physician, Civil War Veteran, 33rd Degree Mason, and a Knight Templar, a ritual was contrived.

On June 16, 1871, Fleming, Florence, and 11 Masonic friends, meeting in New York City, endorsed a proposal for the formation of a new Fraternal order to be composed of Knights Templars and 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Masons, based on Fleming's ritual with its background of Oriental glamour, pageantry, and mystic splendor. Meeting at the Masonic Hall on East 23rd Street, New York City, on September 26, 1872, the 13 charter members held their first official session and formally organized "Mecca Temple" of the Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. Dr. Fleming was elected

Illustrious Grand Potentate. The original ritual, prepared by him in his own handwriting, is now displayed in the Mystic Shrine Rooms of the Masonic National Memorial at Alexandria, Va.

For a number of years Noble Fleming, Potentate of Mecca Temple from its inception, considered the organization of a national body. The second Temple of the Order, Damascus Temple in Rochester, New York, was set to work under dispensation on February 8, 1875, and chartered June 7, 1876 ... On June 6, 1878, in New York City, the Imperial Grand Council of the Shrine for the United States was Organized. By June 14, 1886, the word "Grand" was dropped from the name "Imperial Grand Council" and from the titles of the offices in the Council. The title of Imperial Council of the Shrine for the United States was changed to the Imperial Council for North America following the chartering of Rameses Temple, Toronto, as the first Canadian Temple. The year 1888 was a banner year with 12 new Temples, and for the first time the Imperial Council met outside the United States.

Today the Shrine has grown to

a total membership of nearly 900,000 in 172 Temples throughout Canada, Mexico, Hawaii, the Canal Zone, every State in the Union, and the District of Columbia. Shrine Clubs in many countries make today's Shrine a truly International Fraternity. The Shrine has thus been superimposed on the structure of Freemasonry. One out of every five Masons in the United States is now a Noble of the Mystic Shrine. Official head gear of the Shrine is the red fez; the insignia consists of the scimitar and crescent. The Shrine has gradually become the humanizing agency of Masonry, seeking to keep alive in men the spirit of youth. Mankind must have periods of relaxation, the Shrine offers wholesome companionship; yet this same enjoyment in large measure supports the Shrine's humanitarian effort, which is the 19 Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children and the three Shriners Burns Institutes -- the "world's greatest philanthropy". These Hospitals and Institutes continue their vital role of returning crippled and burned children to their rightful place in society.

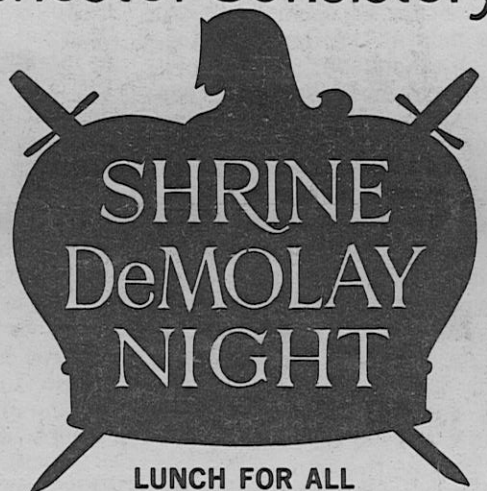

"V. S. L."

Most Brethren are well aware that the Old Testament of the Holy Bible is the Volume of the Sacred Law of both Christian and Jewish Brethren but it is not so widely known that Brethren of other faiths use different books. The term "V.S.L." therefore does not only distinguish the Bible. A description of these other books is provided by the Singapore Lodge, No. 7178, E.C., for the information of members and visitors. It is not uncommon for Lodges in Singapore, India, and other places for several Vs. S.L. to be placed on the Lodge altar.

The Sacred Volumes reposing in Lodge Singapore at the present time number six and comprise the following:

- (1) The Holy Book of the Sikhs, the Sri Guru Sahib.
- (2) The Holy Bhagavad Gita, the Holy Book of the Hindus. It may be opened and touched by hand but not by the lips.
- (3) The Khordeth Avesta of the Zoroastrians, the Holy Book of the Pharsees.
- (4) The Holy Koran of the Moslems. Customs vary in different countries as to how this book is to be treated. The Imam of Kehah has stated that the Holy Koran should be held above the head of the person taking the oath but he may neither touch it nor seal it. Otherwise it can be treated as is the Holy Bible.
- (5) The Holy Bible of the Christians, the Old Testament of which is also the V.S.L. of the Jews.
- (6) There are two sects of Buddhists, the Hinayana who come from India, Ceylon, Burma, Cambodia and Thailand, and the Mahayana who hail from Chila, Korea and Japan. The former do not recognize a Supreme Being but the latter do and regard the Phammappada as their sacred book.
