attended lately come out, try it you'll like it.



Spread across many downtown billboards were large signs "TAKE GOD OUT OF THE CHURCH!" At first she was dismayed thinking "Could there be a great atheistic movement in this city?" and then slowing down for a traffic light, she saw on another sign in smaller print below "Take God With You."

# **Dear Brother Herman**

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, % Masonic Service Bureau, 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605.

At a recent meeting of my Lodge, a fine man, an outstanding member of his community and his church, was blackballed. At a time when Masonry is crying for members, why should a man of good character be rejected, perhaps by only one vote, and perhaps out of malice. Do you think this is right and just?

In the early years of our country, communities were small, and the Lodges were correspondingly small, and consisted of friends, neighbors, associates. It was therefore probably felt that a new member should be acceptable to every one in the intimate group. As a corollary it was probably also believed that the admission of an individual against whom only one member felt antagonistic or unfriendly would tend to destroy the harmony that should prevail. In any event, the principle became established and a part of the Constitutions of the several Grand Lodges, including our own, that a unanimous ballot is required to elect an applicant. The Constitutions of the Grand Lodge of New York (Sect. 354) state: "The ballot on a petition for initiation or affiliation (can be taken only at a stated communication) and unless the ballot is unanimous in favor of the petitioner, he shall be declared rejected."

As Lodges grew larger and larger, the rejection of good men has become a more irritating and insistent problem particularly in the larger cities, and Grand Lodges have tussled with it. In our own Grand Lodge, nearly a quarter of a century ago, one of our Grand Masters proposed an amendment to the Constitutions that, "on a favorable report of the Investigating Committee, at least two black balls shall be required for rejection of an applicant." The proposal was submitted to the Lodges for the sentiment of their brethren, and was overwhelmingly defeated. A similar proposal was more recently submitted in a questionnaire, and again rejected. Apparently, a majority of our brethren look upon the unanimous ballot as a safeguard against disunity and disharmony within the Lodge room.

May we be permitted a personal reminiscence. When we were Master of our Lodge, a fine, upstanding man and a good friend was blackballed. We felt saddened and chagrined as you did. We noted something peculiar. For four weeks in succession, a member of the Lodge whom I had never seen before at a meeting, attended regularly. The particular ballot was taken that fourth week. The brother then ceased coming, and we never saw him again. Of course, under our law we could not question this brother or any other brother about their ballot. To do so, would have constituted a Masonic offense. (Constitutions, Sect. 406).

We may note in passing that the United Grand Lodge of England provides that "three black balls shall reject, unless the by-laws of a Lodge require only one or two black balls." The Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Scotland provides that "three black balls shall exclude candidates." The Grand Lodge of Ireland, on the other hand, requires unanimity unless the Lodge by-law is to the contrary.

It is our hope that our Grand Lodge in the near future will modify the "unanimous" ballot.

This service is open to the public, and we urge the Brethren to invite their friends who are not Masons, to attend this beautiful service, and acquaint them with the Fraternal Fellowship that exists in all bodies of Free Masonry. In the event that any Blue Lodge in this area, that does not conduct an Annual Memorial Service for their departed Brethren, you may participate in this inspiring service by submitting the names of the deceased and the date of their departure during 1972-1973, also the name of the Widow or nearest of kin, to the following address, so that their names be included on the Roll Call, and a letter of invitation be mailed to them, assuring them that their loved ones are not forgotten. #### EASTER MESSAGE THE EMPTY GRAVE

# HIGHLIGHTS OF THE TRUMAN MASONIC CAREER

Grand Master, Masons of Missouri, 1940-41.

Grandview Masonic Lodge #618, Grandview, Mo.

Organized Grandview Lodge; first Worshipful Master when chartered, 1911 Served again as Worshipful Master in 1917.

Scottish Rite Consistory, Western Missouri, Kansas City, Mo.

Coroneted Honorary 33°, Scottish Rite Mason, Oct. 19, 1945. First President to receive the Honorary 33°.
Orient Chapter #102, York

Rite, Kansas City, Mo.; Shekinah Council, Scottish Rite #24, Kansas City, Mo.; Palestine Commandery #17, Independence, Mo.; Ararat Temple, AAONMS, Kansas City, Mo.; Court #54, Royal Order of Jesters, Kansas City, Mo.; Honorary Grand Master, Order of DeMolay; attended 81st Imperial Council Session, Chicago, when Past Imperial Potentate Frank S. Land presided as Imperial Potentate in 1955.

During his more active years in Ararat Temple he served as a member of its Divan, attaining the office of Oriental Guide before his 1934 election to the United States Senate prevented him proceeding further.

HE GRACIOUSLY wrote several letters in support of Imperial Sir W.W. Bennett when Imperial Assistant Rabban Bennett was campaigning for the Imperial line.

While in the White House, as well as in retirement at Independence, Mo. so long as his health permitted, he received each Imperial Potentate. The last one to see him at his home in Independence was Past Imperial Potentate C.A. Hogan, 1968-69.

Proud of his Masonic affiliations, he was known to go out of his way to meet a candidate about to receive his first Masonic degree.

Anecdotes by Imperial Sirs Frank S. Land and George M. Saunders, who probably were the Shriners who were closest to President Truman, are legion. Imperial Potentate Henry Struby recalls escorting him to a luncheon, sit-ting with him and when the Chief Executive found the menu printed in French he asked Imperial Sir Struby, "Why don't they print these (menus) in English, so we know what we are eating."

QUICK TO SPEAK his mind. and oft-embroiled in controversy over his decisions, he defended them by saying, "The buck stops here." He was known to never back

down from a decision he had made, as distasteful as it may have been after he had made up his mind.

He was quoted in TIME Magazine as saying that his term as Grand Master of Masons of Missouri was the greatest honor he had ever received. He defended the remark by saying that he campaigned for the Presidency, but that the office of Grand Master came to him unexpectedly, unsolicited and without him having to campaign in its

The resolution honoring his Memory, which Ararat Temple passed Jan. 10, it said in part, "Seldom does an organization have the privilege of including within its ranks a member such as Noble Harry S. Truman, and at a time such as this, the inadequacy of the spoken or written word to express our pride in his accomplishments and our sorrow in his loss is selfevident. To him we say, Noble Truman, well done."

Loved by many, hated by many, respected and admired by all for his "no holds barred" philosophy, he will be remembered by everyone.

The active patient list of Shriners Hospitals For Crippled Children, increased to 30,743 for the first 10 months of 1972, compared with 30,-063 for the same period in

Total patients discharged by the 22 Units was 3,910; 3,318 in 1971. The number of patients admitted increased to 7,117 from 6,948.

Average length of stay is 42 days, and the cost per in patient is now \$1,772.29.

Casts applied increased to 16,833 from 15,885 and the number of braces applied changed from 6,211 to 6,641. Surgeons performed 5,297 operations. There was a surge

in the number of outpatient visits, the total rising to 60,-351 from 36,334.



# THE PIPER'S CORNER

Joe Deklerow



There are many legends amd stories about Scotsmen and, like most of their kind, some are fact and some are not. One thing is for certain, these are a fierce, colorful people with an ancestry that is as proud as any. One of the most remarkable and distinctive features about the Scots is their style of dress. Although they didn't exactly invent the tartan itself (it was being used by Celts in very ancient times) the Scots did adapt, refine and perfect it. It was they who first identified their clans by the pattern and colors, (called setts). A Scottish soldier usually wore a Plaid or long length of his tartan wrapped diagonally across his chest with the long loose end dangling off his left shoulder. This was his blanket to ward off the cold, damp nite chill. It was held in place and fastened at the left shoulder by a large silver brooch with a semi-precious stone set in it called a cairngorm.

One legend has it that he

in battle, gave up his cairngorm to a comrade who buried the body and notified the next of kin. Another interesting story concerns the kilt pin found on every true Scots kilt at the right knee position. It was said that Queen Victoria while reviewing the Gordons at Balmoral noticed a young soldiers concern at the high winds, whipping the loose kilt end. Knowing that a true Highlander wears only himself under the kilt, she very kindly removed a pin from her own dress and se-cured the flap for him. Since that time the kilt pin has been an integral part of a Scotsman's dress. These come in a wide variety of forms and many are family heirlooms with a great value. The Pipe Band has several true Scotsmen in it's ranks and their tales of the old country are interesting and fascinating. There are many in our ranks however who just have a fondness for the pipes or drums. You don't have to be a Scotsman to learn to play. We have descendants of Germans, Poles, Statians, English and Irish in our ranks and we welcome everybody. We have lots of fun the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month at the Temple. 
