M:W: Lloyd Cochran, recently (May 3rd) elected to a second term as Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York, has announced the appointment of several men from the 1st and 2nd Monroe Districts to his staff of Grand Officers effective immediately. The new District Deputies are R:W: Myron L. Dox, D.D.G.M. of the 1st Monroe District, and R:W: John T. Skalny of the 2nd Monroe District. R:W: Frederick A. Stahl has been appointed Grand Director of Ceremonies from the 1st Monroe District and R:W: Frank W. Fulreader has been appointed Grand Steward from the 2nd Monroe District. In addition, the Grand Master has reappointed R:W: I. Vincent Lloyd and R:W: Paul R. Gleason, Jr., as Grand Chaplains.

R:W: Bro. Dox was Master of Valley Lodge #109 in 1964, having been raised in 1954. He has been active in the ritualistic work of his lodge since his Mastership. His father, W: Myron L. Dox, Sr. was Master of Valley Lodge in 1927. R:W: Bro. Dox is with the Rochester Fire Dept. and is Vice President and a Director of the Fire Dept. Benevolent Fund. He and his wife, Martha live at 81 Florack St. in Rochester with their two sons, who are active in the Order of DeMolay.

R:W: Bro. Skalny was raised in Craftsman Lodge #969 in 1950 and served that lodge as Master in 1970. He is presently a Trustee of Craftsman Lodge and a member of the Gothic Masonic Bowling League, a member of Rochester Rotary, the Chamber of Commerce, Rochester Small Business Association, and a past Chairman of the Trustees of St. Casimir Polish National Catholic Church. R:W: Bro. Skalny is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the L. Skalny Basket Co. He and his wife, Leona live at 133 Allwood Drive in Rochester. They have 2 sons, a daughter and 4 grandchildren.

The new Grand Director of Ceremonies, R:W: Frederick A. Stahl, was raised in 1951, and served Frank L. Simes Lodge #990 as Master in 1959. He has since been active in the degree work of his lodge, and served a term as Lodge Trustee. He was Vice President of the 1959 Masters and Wardens Association, and was Secretary of the School of Education in 1960. He is a member of Rochester Consistory, Hamilton Chapter R.A.M., Doric Council R. & S.M., Monroe Commandery K.T., and Damascus Temple of the Shrine. President of Rochester Lumber Company, R:W: Bro. Stahl has served on the Board of Directors of the Fairport Baptist Home and the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Temple of which he is now Treasurer. He and his wife, Harriet reside at 3 Rollingwood Drive in Pittsford.

The new Grand Steward, R:W: Frank W. Fulreader, became a Mason in 1948. He has served two terms as Master of Rochester Lodge #660, once in 1955 and again in 1967, which was the Centennial year for Rochester Lodge. He has represented his lodge on the Board of Trustees of the Temple Civic Center for the past 12 years and is presently the Chairman of the House Committee of that group. A past Secretary of the School of Instruction, R:W: Bro. Fulreader is also a past President and charter member of the Masonic Stamp Club. He has been active in Rochester Community Chest, The Rochester Community Players and the P.T.A. of Allen Creek School. A communications supervisor with American Tel. & Tel., R:W: Bro. Fulreader and his wife, Henriette make their home at 66 Alpine Drive in Rochester.

The formal investiture of all the grand officers will take place on Saturday, June 16th as a part of the annual St. John's Day visitation to the Masonic Home at Utica.

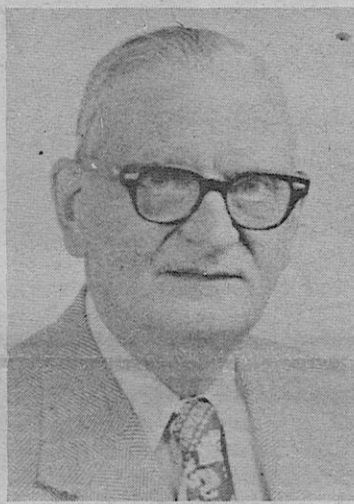

1972-73 BROTHERHOOD FUND CAMPAIGN

The 1972-73 Masonic Brotherhood Fund Campaign was closed officially as of May 31, 1973. Final results will be forthcoming sometime later in June. Actually, the books will be held open until June 6, 1973 to receive last minute donations and reports.

As of April 30, 1973, there were 161,000 Masons in the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York who had not made their contribution, over 7,000 from the two Monroe Districts. R:W: George C. Dietel reported on April 30th that \$794,661.23 had been collected state-wide. At this writing (May 15th), it seems unlikely that our original goal of \$1,400,000 will be obtained.

In our Monroe Districts, we are holding our own dollar-wise as shown in the accompanying breakdown by Lodges for the First and Second Monroe Districts. The First Monroe is ahead of the last two years totals, largely due to F.L. Simes Lodge #990's special campaign for their 50th Anniversary and Flower City Lodge #910's special auction, the latter figures not shown in the Grand Lodge report. Second Monroe is only \$750 away from last year's total and is slightly above the previous year. Both Districts - their District Deputy Grand Masters, District Chairmen and Lodge Chairmen - are to be congratulated for this. However, the percent participation for the First Monroe is only 26.8% and that for the Second Monroe is only 28.7%. Participation by more members is needed if we are to meet the increased needs of the Charities supported by the Brotherhood Fund

CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

TRUE VALUES

Some 2700 years ago, the prophet Isaiah in the 55th Chapter of the prophecy bearing his name, sounds a very modern note.

"Ho everyone who thirst, come to the waters; and he who has no money, come, buy and eat. Come buy wine and milk without money and without price."

Centuries later Jesus taught:

"What doth it profit a man if he gains the whole world and lose his soul - what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"

About half a century ago there appeared a searching little volume entitled "Your Money's Worth" which was the start of the consumer's movement. There arose a number of organizations which sought members, equipped laboratories and testing devices and regularly notified its subscribers or (better members) of it's findings, to enable them to spend their money more wisely.

Isaiah may have had that in mind long ago for he questioned:

"Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy?"

Spiritual leaders for centuries, have pointed out the need of a spiritual guide for all mankind. There is no need to hurry out to seek and organize many so to be able to begin printing a religious guide - we have it already in our Scriptures.

There are 3 points which I believe we all need to seek there, life, love, and God, and all are available and may be found by seeking. Life is a treasure emphasized from the beginning when God created man, when He cared for that wandering tribesman as he went forth in faith to seek a better country, when God gave His Son, who taught and trained a small body of followers, wept over the condition of mankind where He resided, and finally gave His life on the Cross. "What shall a man give in return for his life?" is still the most important question asked of everyone here in our lifetime - we need answer it there is no side-stepping. Choose Life - God centered life!

A second value throughout that great guide is love for without that quality life is not worth anything. We note the vast dimensions in God's continued care all thro' the Old and New Covenants, and that care did not cease with the simple benediction at the end of the Book of Revelation.

Years ago, late one evening, I was entertained in the home of a very successful, wealthy lawyer in Syracuse. He said very simply - a bit wistfully, "If I were young and starting over again, I would cultivate friends, many friends. that is the best advice I can give youth. I wish I had received it at your age."

And that is what we need today - to cultivate and treasure both friends and love.

We cannot gain the most of life and love without God, however we cannot buy His friendship - it is not for sale on the counters of the world markets, neither in the small neighborhood stores not the vast shopping centers. We return to Isaiah 55 and read "Incline your ear and come to me. Hear and your soul may live. Seek the Lord while He may be found. Call upon Him while He is near and to our God for he will abundantly pardon"

The top values in God's system are not reserved for a few alone but available to the poorest individual in the most remote place on the globe. Paraphrasing Isaiah "Cease spending your money for that which is not bread and your labor for that which does not satisfy."

Seek dilligently Life, Love, and God from this day forward forevermore!!

Dear Brother Herman

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, % Masonic Service Bureau, 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605.

Q. In reading the Monroe Masonic News, I notice that some Lodges give the names of their candidates who are to receive, or have received, the First, Second or Third Degrees. Isn't this contrary to what you have told us at School?

A. Section 800 of the Handbook of Masonic Law, covers this point explicitly, as follows:

"The practice of mailing to any members of a Lodge or any members of the Fraternity written or printed notices giving names of candidates for Degrees or names of those on whom Masonic Degrees have been or will be worked, has been forbidden unless such notices are sent in sealed envelopes properly addressed and marked "Strictly Personal."

This is our Law. But let us consider the practical side of this. Suppose a notice is given open publicity that Mr. John Doe will on a specified date receive the First or initiatory Degree. At this meeting, when the Master asks if there is any objection, a brother rises and states that he objects to John Doe receiving the Degree. (Incidentally the brother need give no reason for his objection, nor can he be questioned about it). In that case, the objection must be respected (Handbook, Sect. 562) and the petitioner sent home.

Worse still, if a brother demands a ballot, it must be taken (Handbook Sect. 571-572), and if found "cloudy," it has the same effect as if declared on the original ballot; the candidate is rejected, and must wait 12 months before he can submit another petition.

If a ballot is demanded before advancement, and is found "cloudy," (Constitutions, Sect. 358; Handbook Sect. 572) the brother may be proposed for advancement at any subsequent Stated Communication, must lie over until a following Stated Communication, and a clear ballot must be had before he can be advanced (see also Handbook Sect. 573).

The brethren present at the Communication when such an objection is raised or request made for a rebalot, will understand the process, or it might be desirable for the Master to explain the law involved.

But imagine the reaction, after such a public announcement, upon brethren from the particular or other lodges, who may have come to witness the Degree. Even more important, imagine the ill-will created outside the fraternity upon relatives and friends who learn that the Degree had not been conferred. By sending such notices in sealed envelopes marked "Strictly Personal," (H.P. 10035) a good share of the embarrassment and ill will can at least be avoided.

The situation is very different after a brother has received the Third Degree and signed the by-laws. He is now a member of the Lodge and of the fraternity, and there is nothing wrong with giving the name of and welcoming the new brother.



THE TWELVE COMMANDMENTS OF THE GROTTO

1. To draw the Master Masons of different Lodges into closer and more friendly relations.
2. To create and maintain a spirit of fraternity among us.
3. To discountenance jealousy, enmity and illfeeling.
4. To teach us that we are not only members of one Blue Lodge, but belong to the fraternity at large.
5. That there are good Masons outside of our own Blue Lodge and they are worthy friends and companions.
6. To build up and strengthen the character and individuality of the Mason, and to teach, recognize and develop the principles of Masonry outside the Lodge room.
7. To teach that a Mason is not judged by his actual appearance or worldly wealth.
8. The Grotto meets all Masons on the level, not figuratively, but actually and teaches that Masons are brothers on the street as well as in the Lodge room.
9. That Masonry must not be used as a means of advancing the material interest of any man.
10. To get out of the rut into which we too often fall.
11. To forget our cares, for there is good in all of us.
12. The Grotto is a social organization for Master Masons.



It was announced that the total amount contributed to the Brotherhood Fund to date was \$647,000 and a great deal of effort would be needed to reach our goal. It was also stated the \$133,000 was contributed to the relief of flood disaster victims. At this time the annual election of officers was held and the same line of Grand Lodge Officers was elected for another year. Immediately following, the installation of the elected officers was held and Grand Lodge was closed for another year. I have more detailed information available should you wish to request it.

Our June 12th meeting will be move-up-night. Come as you are (no need to dress up) and see next year's officers do their thing. The meeting will be followed by Strawberries and ice cream. Also on the schedule is a Euchre Tournament with Charlotte Lodge on June 5 at their Lodge at 4455 Lake Avenue. 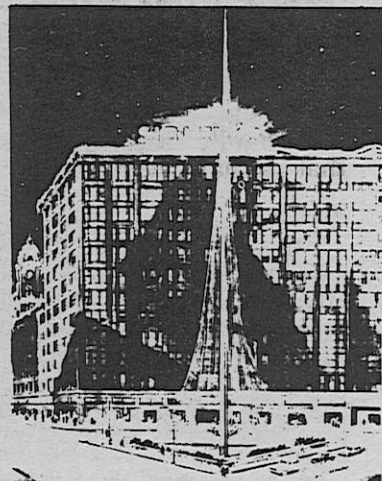

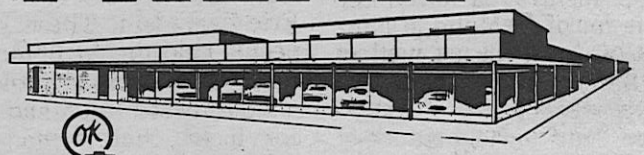


