Dear Brother Herman

Q. Why do Shriners claim that theirs is the greatest philanthropy in the world?

A. When we endeavor to designate anything the "greatest", there are bound to be differences of opinion. Ask any individual who is the greatest American or the greatest painter, or the greatest poet, or the greatest football player, and you will receive a variety of answers.

Why does the Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine call theirs the "greatest philanthropy in the world? The "philanthropy", of course, refers to the 19 Hospitals for crippled children, and the three Burns Hospitals.

There are several reasons which would appear to justify the title "greatest".

1. The Crippled Children's Hospitals are established to take in and treat children up to age 14 who are crippled or deformed, to make crooked limbs straight, to give normal or near normal life to those who might otherwise remain a burden to themselves, to their families and to society. Over 6,000 children are treated yearly.

2. The Burns Hospitals are established to heal badly burned children, to restore them to normal or near normal health.

3. These hospitals admit children only whose families cannot afford the costly treatments required.

4. They treat the children without any cost to the parents. Average cost per patient in the Crippled Children's Hospital about \$5,000. in the Burns Hospitals and \$18,000. We recently read of the case of a child admitted with burns over 80 to 85% of the body. The skin to be grafted could only be taken from the heels. The child is now perfectly normal, cost to the hospital over \$30,000.

5. These hospitals represent a construction cost of over \$50 million, and an operating cost of over \$12 million per year. These costs are borne by the Shrine and its members without any financial aid from local, state or the national government.

6. This project is 100% charitable, since no pay-patients are accepted and Shriners Hospitals are operated by local Boards of Governors who serve without pay, and give not only of their time and talents, but often times of their finances as well.

In view of the above, it would appear to us that there is justice to the title, "the greatest philanthropy in the world."

MEMORIAL SERVICE

On Thursday Night, May 10th, at 8 O'clock, a Public Masonic Memorial Service will be conducted in Cathedral Hall, 875 Main Street East, to honor the memory of our departed Brethren who were called by the Supreme Architect of the Universe, to Eternal Rest. This service is sponsored by the York Rite Mason's of Monroe County and surrounding districts. If your Lodge has not conducted an Annual Memorial Service, you may participate in this service by submitting the names of the deceased Brethren, to the Chairman, Rev. William T. Plews, who will arrange to have their names announced during the Roll Call. Master's of all Lodges in this Masonic Jurisdiction are requested to announce the date of this service during their next communication. Remember the words found in the First Great Light of Free Masonry: Inasmuch as Ye have done it unto one of the least of these my Brethren, Ye have done it unto Me." May we have your support and cooperation.

THE PIPER'S CORNER

by Bob Borsching



Early European rulers had a great tendency to equip their military units in colorful, some even say fanciful and gaudy uniforms. There were many reasons for doing this. Peasants, attracted by the colorful garb, pomp and ceremony contrasting with their own drab garments and existence, were easy to recruit and retain in large peace time armies. Frederick Augustus I of Saxony added a novel touch by equipping a unit of the Polish Army in 1732 as bagpipers. Distinctive in their array, their uniforms were red with blue cuffs and undergarments. The pipes of the unit were rams heads, complete with horns of a type said to still exist in Eastern Europe. Carried by the piper cradled in his left arm, these pipes resembled a ram looking over the pipers arm. The inflation tube or blow pipe entered just back of the neck and the chanter plugged in just beneath the chin. The two horns served as drones for the pipes and extended back over the pipers left shoulder.

Upon the death of Frederick in 1733 the War of

the Polish Succession broke out because both his sons (Agustus II and Stanislaus Leszczynski) laid claim to the throne of Poland. They served well and honorably these soldiers of melody, their tunes comforting and omspiring the line soldiers. Some were killed in battle still playing. We salute them, the Proud Polish Pipes of Saxony.
