MR. SPOCK OF "STAR TREK" **HEADLINER for '74 CIRCUS**

Leonard Nimoy of "Star Trek" and "Mission Im-possible" will be the guest star of this year's 50th annual Damascus Temple Shrine Circus, Feb. 13 thru 16 at the


War Memorial.

Prior to "Star Trek's" debut, Leonard Nimoy worked in several films, including Jean Genet's "The Balcony" with Shelly Winters and Peter Falk. Another Genet play, "Deathwatch," was the genesis of a five year venture that paid off handsomely. Nimoy starred in the film which he co-produced with Vic Morrow.

An episode of "The Lieutenant" attracted the attention of producer Gene Rodden-berry and led to Nimoy's casting as "Mr. Spock" in "Star Trek", a Roddenberry produced series, for NBC-TV. The highly rated science fiction series, brought the lean six-footer three successive Emmy nominations for his co-starring performance as the half-Human, half-Vulcan Second Officer of the Enterprise Spaceship.

He appeared in an NBC World Premiere entitled, "Three Faces Of Love" and a guest starring role in the "Columbo" series starring Peter Falk. This was followed by Nimoy's directorial de-but on Rod Sterling's series, "Night Gallery." The episode was titled, "Death On A Barge." After completing his directorial duties, he was cast in a starring role in a "Night Gallery" episode titled "She'll Be Company For You". He then joined Henry Fonda and Larry Hagman in an ABC-TV Movie of the Week called, "The Alpha Caper."

The Circus, which is presented for the benefit of Damascus Temple's Shrine activities, is perhaps the top annual indoor winter extra-vaganza on Rochester's entertainment calendar. In recent years, since transfer to the War Memorial in 1961,

each Circus has drawn more than 50,000 admissions on a day and night schedule that includes three Saturday

Again this year the Shriners will provide free transportation, refreshments, as well as admission for some 10,000 handicapped and underpriviliged youngsters and for many senior citizen groups. These admissions and tamment are paid for by Shriners who contribute to a Circus Daddies fund each year.

Among the acts to be seen in the three ring set up are: Johnnie Cline's Elephants;

Ladimir's Duo-Rolli-Polli Act; The Smahas Dressage Horse Act; Bobby Berosini Monkeys and The Navarros Bicycle

There will be the usual entertaining trained animal acts, performing ponies, "tons of elephants" in amazing and intricate routines; and a galaxy of traveling clowns who have created laughter for kids at circuses all around world

The Damascus Temple Band, under direction of John Cummings will play at all performances and the grand opening tournament of marching uniformed Shriners.



CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

Shortly after New Year's, the critic, Gene Shalit, on the "Today" show presented the names of the 10 worst movies for 1973, and then added the 10 best as a balance.

Down through the ages, we note that those who have lead well balanced lives, have been those who did not devote their time to one avenue of endeavor. We all are acquainted with those persons who are apt to become lopsided because they become so involved in one movement, some new idea, that they neglect to live a well balanced

Dr. Cabot, a noted physician, professor at the Harvard Medical School, was wont to take a cross with four equal arms in length, stating they they represented worship, love, work, and play, of which every life should share. He stated that he has found that many of the ill, who came to him, suffered from ills that were traceable to disturbed emotions which were the result of lives which lacked one or more of these necessary qualities.

The great leaders of both the Old and New Testaments were people who worked hard, had time to play, love of family and fellowman, and never forgot to worship their

Physicians and scientists have studied and investigaged the lives of people in various parts of the world, who have attained great length of life and are advancing the conclusion that the longer one works, the longer life that person may have. Sounds like we should not find the largest softest easy chair at 65, and simply fold our hands.

Play has a part in life. Physicians also have a word here - and I am not referring to a small number who have achieved popularity by recommending vacations at some faraway, expensive, retreat. There are those who believe a vacation may be restful and healing without excessive recreation, and within the patient's pocketbook. I have met one who asks "When did you last take a vacation?" Paul the Apostle has given a superb exposition of the meaning and need of love in that 13th Chapter of First Corinthiansit is worth reading again and again.

The need of worship is certainly a factor in life - one of the greatest epidemics in our world today, is our failure to participate in worship. We find so many with problems, hatred, hurts, real or otherwise, and while religious service is not a cure all, it certainly may help. Many ministers are able to tell of distressed persons who have come seeking help; they have listened, commented, suggested as much as possible - frequently it was mostly listening. The individual may have gone away, suddenly appeared at a worship service many months later, enthusiastic, aglow, apparently adjusted, thanking the one who had given him so much help, by which time that pastor had completely forgotten what he had said. Give what you can to those in need to the troubled, you may never know the dividends you have declared in another life.

A well balanced life - four sides - Worship, Love, Work and Play this year - live on the square - on every side.

THE GROTTO CARES

An eight year old girl with Cerebral Palsy will walk again because outgoing Monarch Franklin A. Smith traveled to Happiness House in Geneva, New York to present them with an \$800.00 check for the Grotto Philanthropic Fund. Happiness House is a Cerebral Palsy clinic and day care center for handicapped children. In addition to replacing full leg braces for the little girl who had outgrown her previous set, the money will also be used to provide for a complete dental evaluation of all children enrolled at Happiness House. Children with severe dental defects and lack of funds will be referred to our Supreme Council's Denistry for the Handicapped program.

Our Grotto units are also taking an active role in the philanthropic work to benefit the children at Happiness House. The Greeters have contributed a height-adjustable creeper and a Pathway evehand coordination training device, and the Legion of Honor has undertaken a project to build stand-up tables which provide the child with a working surface and support him in a functional position.



Dear Brother Herman

At a meeting of the Temple Trustees, I learned that there is a new Masonic body, called Maccabeus, can you tell us about it?

The Order of Judas Maccabeus was founded about a year ago as another York Rite body.

As you doubtless know, there are two sets of "higher degrees," so-called, which a Blue Lodge Mason may follow the Scottish Rite or the York Rite.

The Scottish Rite consists of four bodies, each with its own set of Officers. The Lodge of Perfection confers the 4th to the 14th Degrees; the Council of Princes of Jerusalem confers the 15th and 16th; the Chapter of Rose Croix, the 17th and 18th; and the Consistory, the 19th to the 32nd Degrees. The local bodies are united structurally and financially and with the same Secretary and Treasurer. All Scottish Rite bodies are governed by a Supreme Council, of which there are two in this country, the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction governs the bodies in the States north of the Mason-Dixon line and east of the Mississippi River, plus Wisconsin. The remainder of the country is in the Southern Jurisdiction.

The York Rite consists of three bodies which are sovereign and independent of one another. They consist of Chapters of Royal Arch Masons under State Grand Chapters which confer four degrees; Councils of Royal and Select Masters under State Grand Councils which confer two degrees and one honorary degree; and Commanderies of Knights Templar, under State Grand Commanderies which confer three orders. Most of the State bodies are joined in a rather loose confederation, as a General Grand Body.

For some time there has been discussion aimed at combining the three bodies into one York Rite, under a Supreme

One of the stumbling blocks has been that the Commandery is a distinctly Christian body, which excludes those of other faiths. Another is, that it has a military aspect, with uniforms, drills, inspections, etc. The suggestion then arose for a creation of a body parallel to the Commandery, which

shall be non-sectarian and non-militaristic.

Sparked by Brother F. William Young, presently Right Eminent Grand Commander of the State Grand Commandery, Genesee Valley Assemblage, Order of Judas Maccabeus was organized in February 1973. It consists of two degrees or orders, - Order of David, which teaches unselfish brotherly love, and Order of Judas Maccabeus which teaches loyalty and fidelity to Faith. Applicants must be members of a Council of Royal and Select Masters.

There have been positive reactions from members of Councils outside of Monroe, but at the present time only the local body exists.



On Jan. 11th, 1974, over 40 Masters and Brotherhood Fund Chairmen of the 31 Lodges in the two Monroe Districts met with District Officials at the Masonic Temple to review progress and map further strategy for the 1974 Brotherhood Fund Campaign.

Reports to date are encouraging, although the delay of kits from Grand Lodge delayed the start of total member canvassing in some of the Lodges. Several Lodges reported that their campaigns were well under way and that contributions were running ahead of last year. It was also reported that 200.00 was received from Fidelity Triangle No. 4 and that 68.00 was received from the 1973 Senior War-

dens from proceeds of the pancake supper they sponsored prior to the District Convention in October. Next month, a complete report for the District will be available for publication in the Monroe Masonic News.

It was determined, that to meet the urgent needs of the Brotherhood Fund, each of the two Monroe Districts must raise over 20,000 this year. To do this, each of the Lodges was assigned a goal to increase their contributions by at least 15% over last year. It was also stressed that we should strive to have more participation from our Brother Masons. Statewide, less than 40% of the membership contributed last year. MASONIC RESEARCH LABORATORY

During the past 10 years about 2500 pages of solid biomedical research results have been published in internationally circulated scientific journals - about twice the output of a medical school department of comparable size.

In the field of cardiovascular research, for example, one can hardly pick up one of the specialty journals without finding a reference to path-finding work done in Utica.

To include the Home in your will, or to arrange the plan best suited to your individual case for giving while living, consult your attorney about any gifts through insurance policies, the proceeds of which are to be paid to the Trustees of the Masonic Hall and Asylum Fund.

GIVING WHILE LIVING...

A gift of money in any amount can be made. Presently donations up to 30% of your adjusted gross income may be used as deductions for income tax purposes and contributions in excess of the annual 30% quota can be carried over to the next five years subject to certain adjustments.

Often it is advantageous to make your gift in the form of securities or other property instead of cash. For example, you may have some stock worth \$10,000 for which you paid \$5,000. If you gave the stock to our Home, you would have no capital gain tax to pay and you may deduct the entire \$10,000 as a charitable contribution.




