Q. The Senior Warden of our Lodge has suffered a severe illness, which will confine him for several months. Could he be installed by proxy, or in a ceremony at the hospital or his home.

A. The Master cannot be installed by proxy (all other officers may be installed by proxy), Installation ceremony must be in a tiled lodge, and cannot be in a hospital or

You may elect the Senior Warden as Master, and let the present Master continue to serve until the Masterelect is ready for installation. At that time request from the Grand Master dispensation to hold installation at that

Another method would be to elect the Junior Warden as Master, and elect and install the brother in question a year later.

A less desirable method would be to elect a Past Master to serve as Master, and elect the brother the following year. This would hold back the entire line a full year.

Nearly every race, religion, nationality or culture have their share of folklore and legend. Much of this is, of course, fancy, founded upon superstitions, fear and assumptions. January is shaping up to be a busy month and, to put it across we will need the assistance of all our members. So make that resolution now that you will participate in more of the Post's activities in the coming year.






