The 1974 Masonic Brotherhood Fund campaign is in full swing and by now all Brethren should be well aware of the urgent need for funds. The first report for the Monroe Districts is included in this issue and indicates that we are off to a good start. However, we still have a long way to go to meet our objectives for this year.

The report for the 2nd Monroe includes a special carryover gift from last year of \$1,625 from Genesee Falls Lodge No. 507. With this gift deducted, results from this years campaign totals \$3,726. This puts the 1st Monroe out ahead -- so LET'S GO -- 2ND MONROE.

One of our objectives this year is to increase the percentage participation by all Lodge members, hopefully to at least 50%. I am happy to report that East Rochester Lodge No. 1020 has already exceeded this goal with 52% participation as of this report. Special mention should also be made of Charlotte Lodge No. 1088 with over 22% participa-

tion and well on the way.

At the district level, the Bausch & Lomb Masonic Club and Past Masters Supper Club have made contributions since our last report. All you members of ancilliary Masonic organizations, units, clubs, etc. are asked to talk it up and get your organization listed on the Brotherhood Fund

Honor Roll. This year our task is exceptionally difficult. There is no question that inflation, rising taxes, and shortages are creating budget problems for rich and poor alike. Our activities supported by the Brotherhood Fund are equally faced with these problems. Money is urgently needed.

Brethren, look into your hearts, and this year contribute all you can. For those of you who haven't contributed, join in the crusade, and realize the true joy in giving.

Our thanks to all who have given and all who are working so hard to make this campaign a success. Keep up the good work and keep the money coming in.



While browsing through the archives of my Lodge, I came across an article written by Wor. Bro. Elmer J. LeFevre, a Charter member of Craftsman Lodge No. 969 and its Master in 1929.

This article entitled "A Brother Mason" which ap-peared in May 1926 in our Lodge publication, seems

very appropriate for today.

"The Astronomer has fixed the 21st day of March to the 21st day of June as the Spring Season. The Mountain Goat is most at home on the wind swept ridges of the highest mountains and seldom leaves them, even in winter. It is one of the chief actors in the film, "Land of the Bighorn, Goat and Grizzly.

"You must have the patience of Job." This is the comment that Brother Earl Hilfiker has heard, again, and again, over the years wherever he has presented one of his Travel, Adventure and Wildlife films. "No, rather the

patience of Lucifer," has been his reply. His formula for getting his wildlife shots, he says is simple, "All you have to do is be in the right place at the right time with the right conditions, the right light, the correct equipment and a cooperative critter." Sometimes finding that "cooperative critter" has not been easy. It has been a matter of going to the right place at the right time again and again, sometimes year after year before he managed to get the footage he was after.

On the other hand, he has had some incredible luck in getting some of his footage. There was the family of beavers that came out, in the open, in bright sunlight and went about their work paying no attention to the camear and the camerman. there was the sandfill crane that came up within thirty five feet trying to get him to follow her instead of her young one. There was the family of marmots where theyoung wrestled and played. There were the three bear cubs sliding down hill on a snow bank,

even their mother joined the sport. Two days later there was the nearly full grown cub that disobeyed his mother and found out that she was still boss. There is also the time when the curious grizzly approached within forty feet of the camera. Earl is very glad that the grizzly was just curious, not hostile. Earl says "critters do not take directions worth a cent."

His film LAND OF THE BIGHORN, GOAT & GRIZZLY which he brings to the Auditorium Theater on Friday, March 8th at 8:15 P.M. has proved to be the most varied and the most popular he has ever done. He had fifteen years to get the footage he used to make it. He had several months to edit it and has shown it on the Audubon Screen Tour Series on a number of occasions across the country.

Earl's shows have an appeal to the outdoors minded of all ages, especially to children. This is a family night affair. Children under twelve with adults are admitted for a dollar, so, also are boy and girl scouts in uniform with leaders.

This year, special new projectors are loaned to us through the generousity of friends at Graflex and Dunbar and De Zeng.

#### **Dear Brother Herman**

Rt. Wor. Herman Sarachan will answer questions on Masonic ritual, symbolism, history and law. Address your questions to BROTHER HERMAN, % Masonic Service Bureau, 875 Main Street East, Rochester, New York 14605.

To settle an argument in my Lodge, will you inform us how many St. Johns there are in our Masonic tradition?

Masonic tradition includes three Saint Johns: - John the Baptist, John the Evangelist, and John the Almoner.

John the Baptist, the forerunner of Jesus, was a Nazarite from his birth and lived a rigid life of self-discipline. At length, he appeared at the Jordan River to preach the doctrine of repentance, and introduced the rite of baptism. According to tradition, he was imprisoned for denouncing Herod Antipas, ruler of Galilee, and was beheaded at the behest of the rulers sister, Salome. The Festival of John the Baptist is celebrated on June 24th.

John the Evangelist is an uncertain figure, believed to be the Apostle John, Son of Zebedee, and the author of the fourth Gospel (the Gospel According to John), Revelations, and the Epistles of John. Modern scholarship disputes these authorships. In early Masonry the Patron Saint was Solomon. Later John the Baptist became the Patron Saint to whome Lodges were dedicated. John the Evangelist did not appear in Masonry until the 18th century, when one or the other was used by Lodges as the Patron Saint. Gradually both were adopted as the Holy Saints John, and this custom prevails in this country. In England, Lodges are dedicated to Solomon. The Festival of the Evangelist is December 27th.

John the Almoner, "The Holy Saint John of Jerusalem," was the son of the King of Cyprus, and lived in the sixth century. In early maturity, he left his country and the hope of a throne, to go to Jerusalem. Here he founded a hospital to care for the sick and wounded, and a hospice to aid and assist Knights and pilgrims. He was canonized by the Greek Orthodox Church with festival on November 11th, and by the Roman Catholic Church with festival on January 23rd.

TRAGEDY HAS STRUCK. and although the victims are not a part of our Masonic fraternity, we have always extended Masonic charity to any member of the human family "in a like destitute situation" whenever the need arises. You may recall reading or hearing about the house fire in the middle of February in which a 2 year old child was killed, and the home completely destroyed. The surviving victims of the fire are a young couple in their mid-29's, their 2 year old son and 8 month old daughter. Everything they owned was lost in the fire, and apparently none was covered by insurance. Especially needed are clothes for the husband, who wears a size 46 jacket and has a 40 inch waist and 30 inch trouser length, and clothes for the 2 year old boy. Clothing for the wife, who wears size 10 to 12, and the 8 month daughter would also be appreciated, although their need is not as great due to the generousity of others. The family is presently staying with the husband's parents, so that food, furniture and shelter are not a problem, although furniture will be needed as soon as they find anotherplace to live. ## CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

#### **GOD MANIFEST**

During the past few weeks in many of our Churches, Transfiguration Sunday was observed, a remembrance of the time that Jesus led the three beloved disciples, Peter, James and John to a high mountain. There his clothing and sppearance was whitened, He conversed with Elijah

and Moses and a voice from above said "This is my Son."
That was a manifestation of God. God had however been manifest from the very beginning. After creation we find that He walked in the Garden of Eden where He had placed all created creatures.

In 5th Genesis record is made of Enoch who walked with God and then was no more because God took him.

Moses had many manifestations of God when he ascended Mt. Sinai for instruction to get the tablets of law - known today as the Ten Commandments, and at the end of his days on earth when he climbed to the top of Mount Nebo where God directed his view to all the land that Twelve Tribes would inherit, and then took him also like Enoch.

Elijah was in frequent communication with God, he was shown how to expose the false priests of Baal and restore the faith of his fathers.

In the prophecy bearing his name, Isaiah saw God, confessed that he had done wrong, was cleansed of wrong-doing; heard the call "Whom shall I send? and answered "Here am I, send me!"

All these knew and talked with God. The new Testament simply continues the chain of events, for the record there

is that God was manifest thro' His Son.

Today we have the fullfillment of all the promises of the ages but we have no prophets, nor divinity living in our midst in person. Now the task is for all of us to manifest the power and place of our Creator to a sorely troubled

In I Kings 19 we reread how Elijah sought God and in response to his word ascended the mount before Jehovah. There was a great wind that literally broke the rocks, but God was not in the wind, nor in the earthquake that followed, or in the great fire that followed. Then a still small voice was head and Elijah knew that God was there.

Our world needs to look beyond the spectacular today, the massive show of might, and power, to be still and hear that still small voice for to each and everyone of us is given the commission of being transfigured and going forth to manifest God that the whole world may be one and the glory of the Creator known thro' the peace and joy of life, lived in keeping with His eternal plan and promises.

There is an old tale of the stranger who attended a Quaker meeting for the first time: there was no special music, no Biblical reading nor sermon merely a few prayers and after the hour of meditation all present started to leave. The visitor inquired of one "When does the service begin?" and was told "Service begins when this meeting ends."

Our service begins when we leave our house of worship, be it synagogue, Temple, or Church or Cathedral, and as Masons, when we go forth from the Lodge.

Then indeed shall our Creator be made manifest to all the world. Then shall we be sons of God.







Companions:


